The Meaning of Money

²⁰ Then he said to them, “Whose head is this, and whose title?” ²¹ They answered, “The emperor’s.” Then he said to them, “Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor’s, and to God the things that are God’s.”

Matthew 22:20-21 NRSV

There’s certainly a lot of meaning to be found in money. Jesus knows that money is a major factor in the shaping of our lives, and he focuses on it a great deal in his ministry. In fact, his focus on money is second only to the kingdom of God.

For Jesus, money is to be used: to pay taxes to the emperor, but also to advance God’s work in the world. Money is never an end in itself, a treasure to be socked away. What would be the point of that? You are going to leave this world long before you see the kind of appreciation you desire, and you can’t take it with you — as the saying goes, “There are no luggage racks on hearses.”

The meaning of money is that it’s an asset, a resource for us to put to work in the world. If you listen carefully, your money is not saying, “Keep me.” Instead, it is saying, “Use me.”

It needs to be said that good stewards are people who use the resources that they have been given to advance the interests of their master in the world. That’s precisely what we’re supposed to be doing in the work of Christian stewardship. Everything we possess has been given to us by our loving Lord in a wild gesture of generosity. We don’t really own anything ourselves, but instead we care for the things that belong to God for as long as we are allowed to walk this earth. We relish them, we delight in them, we

manage them ... but then we let go of them. So why not let go in a way that advances God’s interests?

In a loving and generous God we trust, with liberty to support God’s work in the world.

That’s the meaning of money.

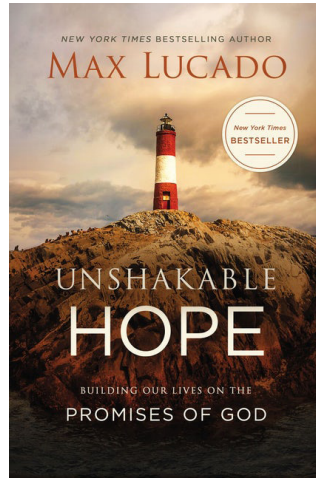

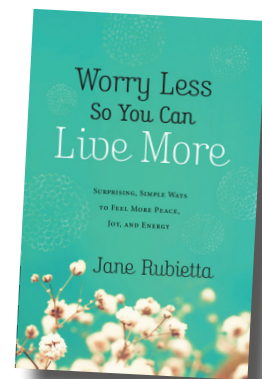

Health & Wellness: *From our Parish Nurse, Teresa Field*

August is National Immunization Awareness Month: Immunizations help prevent dangerous and potentially deadly diseases and viruses. I realize we have all been inundated with information on the COVID-19 vaccines. If anyone is still hesitant or on the fence in their decision, I encourage you to google “cdc covid vaccine” and read up on the latest facts, talk to your healthcare provider, or give me a call to talk about your concerns, and I’ll listen. Even though no vaccine is 100% effective, during the last 50 years, immunizations have saved more than a billion lives and disabilities in the U.S. Vaccine preventable diseases (such as measles, mumps, whooping cough, meningitis, and meningitis B) are still a threat.

Why vaccinate? Vaccinations’ immediate benefit is individual immunity. The second benefit is herd immunity, also known as community immunity. Herd immunity refers to protection offered to everyone in a community by high vaccination rates. When enough people are immunized against a given disease/virus, it is difficult for the disease to gain a foothold in the community. This will offer some protection to those who are unable to receive vaccinations, including newborns and people with chronic illnesses, reducing the likelihood of an outbreak that could expose individuals to the disease and complications of the disease. It can also protect vaccinated individuals who may not have been fully immunized. This is why, for example, it is extremely important to receive one’s annual flu vaccine. When community vaccination rates drop below the threshold of herd immunity, widespread disease outbreaks can occur. Vaccinations do more than just protect an individual: they protect entire communities and the world.

Two vaccinations I’ll write about are the shingles and whooping cough. Shingles (*Herpes Zoster*) is the same virus that causes chickenpox. Shingles can develop only after an initial infection with chickenpox or, more uncommonly, after a vaccination for chickenpox. Many years after the initial infection or vaccination, the virus can be reactivated. Shingles can occur at any age but is most common in people over the age of 60 and in people with weakened immune systems. It can recur, but most people who experience shingles have it just once, and about 1 million cases occur in the U.S. each year.

A person with shingles can transmit *varicella zoster* to a person who is not immune to the virus. In that case, the person would develop chickenpox not shingles. The most common complication from shingles is a condition called post-herpetic neuralgia. It happens when the infected nerve is damaged and causes pain even after the shingles blisters disappear. Pain can be mild to severe and may last months or years. The vaccine reduces the risk of shingles about 50%, and it reduces the risk of post-herpetic neuralgia by nearly 70%.

In recent years, there have been reported whooping cough cases and large outbreaks of this disease in different parts of the country. Whooping cough is a highly contagious disease that can be serious, even fatal, for infants. Many people who spread whooping cough may not even know they have it. It is easily spread through coughing and sneezing. It may appear like a common cold, with a runny nose, congestion, sneezing, and maybe a mild cough, mild fever. But after 1-2 weeks, severe coughing fits begin and can last up to three months in adults.

Beginning as infants and ending at age 4-6 years, children receive a series of Tdap vaccines to help protect against *diphtheria*, *tetanus*, and whooping cough (*pertussis*). But remember, immunity from whooping cough and other vaccines fade over time. It is very important to stay up to date with all your immunizations and be aware of new vaccines. It is a fact that about half of babies under the age of 12 months who contract whooping cough need to be hospitalized. Infants are too young to be fully vaccinated against whooping cough and adults can help protect them.

The CDC recommends everyone, including those around babies, to make sure their whooping cough (pertussis) vaccine booster is updated every 10 years and to receive the vaccine two weeks before coming in close contact with an infant.

Ask your doctor if your vaccinations are current for you and your family members. Keep a personal record of your immunizations and the dates given, so you will have a record when it’s time for booster shots. Do it for yourself, your family members, and your neighbors.

One Bread, One Body | 08/01/2021

This arrangement of the popular communion hymn, “One Bread, One Body,” is from an American Jesuit priest, John B. Foley, who is a composer of Catholic liturgical music and a professor of liturgy. Among his better-known compositions are *Earthen Vessels* (1975), *Come to the Water* (1978) which we heard in July as a benediction response

Just As I Am | 08/08/2021

In 1828, at the age of 32, Charlotte Elliott, author of the hymn “Just As I Am, Without One Plea,” suffered a serious illness that left her a semi-invalid. This caused depression, and within the year she experienced a severe spiritual crisis. Swiss evangelist Henry A. Cesar Malan was visiting her family, and she confessed to him that she didn’t know how to come to Christ. His famous response was, “Come to him just as you are.” She took up pen and paper, and wrote down her own “formulae of faith,” remembering those words of the visiting evangelist. In the end she had the text “Just as I am, without one plea.”

How Great Thou Art | 08/22/2021

Okay, side note, “How Great Thou Art” was my great grandfather’s favorite hymn. It moves me every time I get to hear it or play it. The text has an international history. Its first source is a Swedish text by Carl G. Boberg (“O store Gud” – “O great God”), who wrote its nine stanzas one summer evening in 1885 after he had admired the beauty of nature and the sound of church bells. The English text in modern hymnals is usually credited to Stuart Wesley Kene Hine. The hymn gained great popularity after George Beverly Shea began singing it in the Billy Graham Crusades, beginning with the Toronto Crusade of 1955.

The Gift of Love | 08/29/2021

“The Gift of Love” is a contemporary hymn text written by Hal H. Hopson (b. Texas, 1933). Hopson is a prolific composer, arranger, clinician, teacher and promoter of congregational song, with more than 1300 published works, especially of hymn and psalm arrangements, choir anthems, and creative ideas for choral and organ music in worship.
