## Attitude

<sup>22</sup> You were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; 23 to be made new in the attitude of your minds; <sup>24</sup> and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.

Ephesians 4:22-24, NIV

"The problem isn't the problem, the problem is your *attitude* about the problem."

Captain Jack Sparrow

Captain Jack Sparrow is a fictional character and the main protagonist of the *Pirates* of the Caribbean film series. The character was created by screenwriters Ted Elliott and Terry Rossio, and is portrayed by Johnny Depp. Sparrow is one of the nine pirate lords in the Brethren Court, the Pirate Lords of the Seven Seas. He can be treacherous and survives mostly by using wit and negotiation, rather than by force, opting to flee most dangerous situations and to fight only when necessary.1 Captain Sparrow got it right, and his wit exemplifies the importance of attitude.

Paul wrote the fledgling church in Ephesus and admonished them in verse seventeen: "So I tell you this, and insist on it in the Lord, that you must no longer live as the Gentiles do, in the futility of their thinking." In verses twenty-two to twenty-four, Paul makes an argument to reinforce his admonition. The emphasis is on the mind, or the outlook, of the believer, their attitude. Ephesians 4:22-24 is an explanation of the believers identity with Christ through Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. As Christians, we have not just changed our names, rather we have been changed in body and mind. We belong to God's "new creation" in Christ, and therefore, the ideas and desires of the old creation no longer controls our lives.

Through Christ, once and for all, we have been given a new attitude in the spirit of our mind. It has been said we are what we eat, physically; but spiritually, you are what you think; "As you think in your heart, so are you" (Proverbs 23:7). Winston Churchill stated, "attitude is a little thing that makes a big difference." I believe that if we spend time daily reading and meditating on the Scriptures, praying, and fellowshipping with the Holy Spirit our attitudes would be in line with God's will. Paul admonishes the Philippians, (4:8): "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

### Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

What is high blood pressure? High blood pressure (hypertension) is known as the "Silent Killer." This is due to the fact that most of the time it doesn't cause symptoms. Many people don't know they have it until other problems develop. In most cases, high blood pressure often will require lifelong treatment.

The circulatory system is made up of the heart and blood vessels that carry blood through the body. Your heart is the pump for this system. With each heartbeat (contraction), the heart sends blood out through large blood vessels called arteries. Blood pressure is the means of how hard the moving blood pushes agains the wall of the arteries.

In a healthy vessel, the blood moves smoothly through the vessels and puts normal pressure on the vessels walls. High blood pressure occurs when blood pushes too hard agains artery walls. This will cause damage to the artery walls and then the formation of scar tissue as it heals. This will make the arteries stiff and weak. Plaque sticks to the scarred tissue narrowing and hardening the arteries. High blood pressure also causes your heart to work harder to get blood out to the body. High blood pressure raises your risk of heart attack, also know as acute myocardial infarction, or AMI, heart failure, and stroke. It can also lead to kidney disease and blindness. Generally speaking, if you have high blood pressure, keeping you blood pressure below 130/80 mmHg helps to prevent these problems. Your healthcare provider may prescribe medicine to help control blood pressure

It's important to know your blood pressure numbers. Blood pressure measurements are given as two numbers. Systolic blood pressure is the upper number. This is the pressure when the heart contracts. Diastolic blood pressure is the lower number. This is the pressure when the heart relaxes between heartbeats. Blood pressure is categorized as normal, elevated, or stage 1 or stage 2 high blood pressure.

if lifestyle changes are not enough.

NORMAL BLOOD PRESSURE: Is systolic less than 120 and diastolic of less than 80 (120/80) ELEVATED BLOOD PRESSURE: Is systolic of 120 to 129 and diastolic less than 80

STAGE 1 HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE: Is when the

systolic is 130 to 139 or diastolic 80 to 89

**STAGE 2 HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE**: Is when the systolic is 140 or higher or the diastolic is 90 or higher.

High blood pressure is diagnosed when multiple, separate readings show blood pressure above 130/80 mmHg. Talk with your healthcare provider if you have questions or concerns about what your blood pressure goals should be.

Feeling ok does not mean your blood pressure is under control. Likewise, feeling

bad doesn't mean it's out of control. The only way to know for sure is to check your blood pressure. Medicine is only part of controlling high blood pressure. You also need to manage your weight, get regular exercise, and adjust your eating habits. High blood pressure is usually a lifelong problem.

But it can be controlled with healthy lifestyle changes and medicine. Hypertension is not the same as stress. Although stress may be a factor in high blood pressure, it's only one part of the puzzle. Blood pressure medicine needs to be taken every day. Stopping suddenly may cause a dangerous increase in pressure.

Other suggestions would be to stop smoking as smoking increases blood pressure and damages blood vessels. Limit alcohol: drinking too much alcohol can raise blood pressure. Men should have no more than two drinks a day. Women should have no more than one. A drink is equal to one beer, or small glass of wine, or a shot of liquor.

This column is from the organist, Andrew J. Mertzenich. The column provides history, facts, and information on musical selections upcoming this month. For July, we are exploring the tunes and texts of the organ postludes. Enjoy!

#### July 11, 2021 | Paul Manz: God of Grace

Originally, the author of the hymn text, Harry Emerson Fosdick, intended for this hymn to be sung to tune of REGENT SQUARE (a.k.a. Angels from the Realms of Glory). However, the welsh tune CWN RHONDDA has taken hold as the most popular tune. Fosdick recalls "That was more than a hymn to me when we sang it that day—it was a very urgent personal prayer. For with all my hopeful enthusiasm ... there was inevitably much humble and sometimes fearful apprehension." The text is often paired with the gospel of Mark, and is a prayer for divine power and encouragement in a time of challenge. While nearly a century old, the themes of the hymn are timeless and find new and compelling expression.

### July 18, 2021 | Kingsfold "I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say"

The tune KINGSFOLD is an English or Scottish folk melody. The hymn text, however, is still surrounded in mystery. Loosely based on John 1:16, there are many scriptural allusions to the text. Each stanza begins with a statement, followed by the words and promises of Jesus, calling sinners to repentance and divine truth. The true message, through the solemn and joyful verses, is that all our nights give way to the eternal morning of Jesus, star and son.

#### July 25, 2021 | Jesu Meine Freude: Jesus Priceless Treasure

Johann Franck, a German poet and lawyer, wrote the text to this hymn. Toward the end of the thirty years' war (1618-48), his hometown suffered at the hands of invading troops. In the face of this devastation, Franck chose to put his trust in Jesus, writing this text to remember that God's unfailing love remains to a broken humanity. Traditionally and acceptedly Lutheran, this text and tune are found in many hymnals of many denominations. The text reminds us that, through strife and turmoil, it is Jesus advocating for souls that should bring pleasure over all worldly treasures.

Open: Tuesdays, 2-5 p.m. and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to noon

#### 8409 N. 2<sup>nd</sup> Street | Machesney Park 61115

Open: Wednesdays, 2-5 p.m. and Saturdays, 9 a.m. to noon

**Electronics with Fees (TVs and Computer Monitors)**: TVs /monitors <19 in. (\$15), tube TVs or flat screens or monitors >19 in. (\$20), Projection TVs (\$25), Wood console TVs (\$25)

**Electronics (No Fees)**: printers, cell phones, hard drives/CPUs/towers, laptops, keyboards, mice, cables, DVD/CD players, but NO DVDs or CDs

**Clothing**: clean, wearable or not, purses, shoes, boots, belts, hats, fabric, yarn

Paper goods (preferably in paper bags): books, junk mail, magazines, newspapers

Cardboard: chipboard, non-Styrofoam egg cartons, NO food containers that have any grease on them

Containers: clean glass bottles and jars, clean metal and aluminum cans, clean plastic bottles or containers

Your household trash hauler may take some of the above categories of items. Check with them for a complete list.



**Items NOT taken by KNIB**: hazardous waste, plastic bags, window glass, propane tanks, fire extinguishers, paint, smoke detectors, CO detectors, gift wrap, Styrofoam, plastic lawn chairs, sharps, needles, syringes, food waste

Household hazardous waste materials may be taken to the site run by the City of Rockford at 3333 Kishwaukee Street. Contact them for more information at (779) 348-7175. Hours of operation are Saturdays, 8 a.m. to noon and Sundays, Noon to 4 p.m.


