Laughter

Our mouths were filled with **laughter**, our tongues with songs of joy. Then it was said among the nations, "The LORD has done great things for them."

Psalm 126:2, NIV

Psalm 126 is a song of joy after the people of Israel's return from Babylonian captivity. It seems too good to be true that they were returning to Jerusalem, the city of peace. It was like a dream; they couldn't believe it. And because of that experience they wanted to give testimony to the world of their God's faithfulness and love.

The human dilemma is that we spend a lot of time probing in the dark, hoping to find a light that will reveal the meaning of life, or a lantern that will light our way. What we need is a Savior, the Light of the World, to come to us and reveal the truth, and perhaps to remind us that the treasure we've been seeking isn't the true treasure after all. As we enter into the season of Pentecost, Jesus offers us the necessary resource to seize those precious moments of laughter and joy: the Holy Spirit!

I pray you will be blessed by Maria Shriver's reflection on the subject: "Laughter is a gift we give ourselves. Make sure you keep including it in your life, no matter how old you get, no matter how much your knees and your back hurt. Laughing at yourself changes how you physically feel. The power of laughter heals, rejuvenates, rests our spirits, and brightens our outlook. Don't let it slip away."¹

"*Dear God*, thank you for the joy I have in my life. Thank you for the gift of laughter, how it lightens my heart. Help me to be a messenger of joy for others, and help me to laugh at myself. Amen."²





Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

June is National Safety Month. Including myself, many members of the church have grandchildren/great grandchildren who will be visiting them this summer. Childproofing your home may need to be addressed once again. As the saying goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

What are the highest risk areas for injury and accidents in our homes? According to the CDC, most accidents happen where there is water. The bathroom, kitchen, swimming pools, or hot tubs are places where young children should never be left unattended. Where there is heat or a flame, such as in the kitchen, by the fireplace, or at an outside grill, is another high risk area. Be aware

of toxic substances under the kitchen sink and in the laundry room (detergent pods) or where you may keep cleaning products. Protect potential unsafe areas by using safety locks or protective knob covers when loved ones are visiting. Kitchen counter tops or easily reached cabinets without a safety device where you may keep your medications are another high risk area. In a purse, where medications may be kept, is often a place that is overlooked. Keep coin batteries or "button batteries" and any devices

that contain them like hearing aid batteries out of the reach of children; they can be fatal if swallowed. A garage or garden shed is also a place to be checked for safety. Keep sharp tools and chemicals stored properly and out of reach. Be aware of areas where falls can happen like stairs, slippery floors, high windows, or tipping furniture. Use anchors to prevent furniture like TVs, ranges, or dressers from tipping over. One child is treated every 30 minutes for a TV related injury according to the American Academy of Pediatrics study.

Devices to keep loved ones safe:

- 1. Safety latches and locks for cabinets to help prevent poisonings and other injuries
- 2. Outlet covers
- 3. Corner and edge bumpers to help prevent injuries from falls against sharp edges on walls,

furniture, and fireplaces

- 4. Knob covers, which snap over door knobs, or door locks to prevent young children from opening doors
- 5. Use cordless window coverings to prevent strangulation. Dangling pull cords or blinds that have an inner cord for raising the slats of the blind can be very hazardous
- 6. Use smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside sleeping areas. Make sure to check them regularly (every month) and change the batteries yearly. Remember you can't smell smoke when you are sleeping
- 7. Use a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm to prevent CO poisoning

Be prepared:

- 1. Keep a watchful eye on infants and children at all times.
 - 2. Learn first-aid, including CPR.

3. Keep important phone numbers in an easy to find location.

4. Practice with your loved ones a fire escape plan and where to meet outside of your home.

5. Be prepared for tornados and have a plan in place.

May 30, 2021 (Trinity Sunday)

Opening Hymn: Holy, Holy, Holy Tune: *Nicea*

It is uncommon when researching hymns to find one included in just about every hymnal written with an almost universally similar text. And yet, this is the case with Reginald Heber's, "Holy! Holy! Holy!" first published in 1826. The few variations that are found reside in versions sung by non-trinitarian churches (e.g. the latter-day saints churches). Heber wrote the hymn specifically for Trinity Sunday, which we celebrate today, May 30, 2021.

The name of the Tune, *Nicea*, subscribes to an equally majestic story. In 325 AD, Church leaders convened in the town of Nicaea in Bithynia (today, western Turkey) to formulate a consensus of belief and practice amongst Christians. What resulted was the Nicene Creed, a testament passed on through the ages as one of the pillars of church doctrine. The primary function of the creed was to establish a firm belief in the Trinity. This tune, composed by John B. Dykes for Reginald Heber's text, is also titled *Nicea* in recognition of the text, which evoke a sense of awe at the majesty of God, and calls upon all creation – humans, saints, angels, and all living things to: "Praise the triune God, three-in-one!"

Opening Hymn: Lord of the Dance Tune: *Simple Gifts*

The Tune is a Shaker song composed around 1848 and was composed around the idea of dancing. There are two conflicting narratives of Shaker origin as to the composer of the song. One account attributes the song to a "Negro spirit" heard at Canterbury, New Hampshire, which would make the song a "gift song" received by a Shaker from the spirit world. Alternatively, and more widely accepted, the song's composer is said to be Joseph Brackett (1797–1882) of Alfred, Maine. A lifelong resident of the state, he first joined the Shakers at Gorham when his father's farm helped to form the nucleus of a new Shaker settlement.

The Lord of the Dance lyrics were written by Sydney Carter, an English songwriter, in 1963. The song follows the idea of the traditional English festive song "Tomorrow Shall Be My Dancing Day", which tells the gospel story in the first-person voice of Jesus of Nazareth with the device of portraying Jesus' life and mission as a dance. In writing the lyrics to "Lord of the Dance", Carter was inspired partly by Jesus, but also by a statue of the Hindu deity Shiva which sat on his desk.

He later stated, "I did not think the churches would like it at all. I thought many people would find it pretty far flown, probably heretical and anyway dubiously Christian. But in fact, people did sing it and, unknown to me, it touched a chord."

June 13, 2021

Opening Hymn: Children of the Heavenly Father Tune: *Tryggare Kan Ingen Vara*

The text, written by Lina Sandell and translated by Ernst William Olson, is used commonly for baptisms and funerals among Scandinavian Lutherans. The hymn presents singers with an earnest and soothing portrait of the paternal relationship betwixt God and the children of earth. The hymnist begins by proclaiming the affinity that results from the action God takes through baptism, where he gathers his children safely into His bosom. Sandell also emphasizes that the incarnation of Christ results in human beings holding a special position in God's creation: neither "nestling bird, nor star in heaven" experiences this level of intimacy with their creator. Indeed, God's actions are driven by his "loving purpose" and his relentless compassionate desire to preserve the faithful and keep them "pure and holy" so that they may live in the Kingdom and serve God in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness.

Opening Hymn: **This is My Father's World** Tune: *Terra Beata*

Point of fact, this was the first hymn tune I learned to play on the organ. Nevertheless, in ancient times, people believed that as the planets revolved in the universe, they made music or harmony. This is the belief Maltbie Babcock refers to in the line, "and round me rings the music of the spheres." Though this belief has since been disproven, we know that objects in space do in fact emit sounds. Even more amazing, the ocean is also making noises at its very lowest and darkest depths sounds which scientists are still unable to identify. The whole universe is singing a song of its creation, revealing something to us about the God who created it. But, the text also indicates that all is not entirely right with the world. Creation is fallen and broken. Yet, it also still belongs to God. We are thus charged to listen attentively to the voice of God in His world – from the heights of space to the depths of the ocean - and witness how He restores it, listening for our own calling to be stewards of Creation.

Terra Beata, Latin for "beautiful world" was originally a traditional English folk tune; and was arranged by Franklin L. Sheppard for Babcock's text.

June 27, 2021

Closing Hymn: **O God, Our Help in Ages Past** Tune: *St. Anne*

This hymn text is one of the finest examples of the genius of Isaac Watts, one of the most renowned hymn text writers of all time. Considered one of the finest paraphrases, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" expresses a strong note of assurance, promise, and hope in the LORD as recorded in the first part of Psalm 90. It should be noted that the rest of the psalm has a recurring theme of lament and sorrow. Nonetheless, Watts wrote the paraphrase in nine stanzas around 1714 and first published the text in his *Psalms of David* (1719). The first line, originally "Our God, our help ...," was changed to "O God, our help... "by John Wesley.

The tune, alternatively, though no firm documentation exists, was probably composed by William Croft. Croft was born in 1677. After gaining education in music, in 1700 he was admitted a Gentleman Extraordinary of the Chapel Boyd. It was during this time that he served as organist at <u>St. Anne's Church</u> in Soho, London, England.¹ In 1709 he was elected organist of Westminster Abbey. A very large number of Croft's compositions remain.

The tune became a setting for "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" in *Hymns Ancient and Modern* (published in 1861), and the two have been inseparable ever since.

¹ It is worth noting that hymn tunes are often named after the places where they are composed or a place that is important to the composer. Modern hymn writers, myself included, continue this tradition.
