¹⁸ As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea—for they were fishermen. 19 And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people."

Matthew 4:18-19, NRSV

Disciples are going to have to make sacrifices and face hardships, like migrants who travel the world in search of work. But a willingness to leave the natural, leave the comfortable. leave the familiar and leave the domestic can have a powerful and positive impact. My prayer is that we will have a closer walk with Jesus this Lenten season, as we follow Him to Calvary and ultimately to the empty tomb.





Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

The term Metabolic syndrome is a dangerous condition and it's becoming more common in the United States. So what the heck is it and how can one prevent it? It means that one has three or more of these five health factors: 1.) High blood pressure, which is greater than 130/80 mmHg or higher, an elevated blood pressure makes ones heart work harder and damages ones blood vessels over time. 2.) Excess body fat with a large waist, 40 inches or more for men, and 35 inches or more in women 3.) High triglyceride level, which is 150 mg/ dL or more, if ones level is high, one may have increased fatty deposits on the walls of ones blood vessels. 4.) Low HDL cholesterol level, less than 40 mg/dL for men or 50 mg/dL or less for women. HDL is known as "good" cholesterol. If ones level is low, ones blood vessels are not as protected, and 5.) High blood sugar levels, fasting blood glucose levels grater than 100 mg/dL or more. The extra glucose in the blood can damage the blood vessels. Having three of these risk factors puts one at a elevated risk for heart disease, stroke, and diabetes, with the more risk factors, the greater ones quality of life is decreased.

Some of these health factors are relatively symptom free and hard to know if one has these without medical blood testing, so that is why it is important not to put off ones annual medical appointment. Some symptoms to look for in high blood pressure are fatigue, dizziness, vision changes, headaches, and one may even become more anxious. With elevated blood sugars or diabetes one may be extra hungry, extra thirsty, and one may be urinating more often. Undiagnosed or untreated sleep apnea increases ones risk for all of these factors also. Sleep apnea can be easily dismissed, so please let your healthcare provided know if you have or have been told you have poor sleep habits.

Treatment for metabolic syndrome are to lower ones risk for heart disease, stroke, and to prevent or manage

type 2 diabetes. Can metabolic syndrome be prevented? In many cases it can be prevented and altered by having a healthy lifestyle. Making lifestyle changes isn't easy. One can try to decrease and finally eliminate junk food, get help to stop smoking if need be, decrease alcohol intake, eat less processed foods, and cook fresh food more often. Eating healthy doesn't have to be a chore anymore. There are many websites and recipes geared to healthy changes that truly taste good. Ask your healthcare provider for a dietary consult for help if needed. Starting a regular exercise routine will also help, Start making small goals and you may want to find a person who you know will help keep you motivated. Keep in mind that we all have times when it's hard to stick to the plan. Don't get discouraged, when we slip, we just have to start up again the next day. We need to work at it every day, and not beat ourselves up when we slip. Remember to modify the things we can modify. We need to be proud of our accomplishments, whatever they are, because making healthy choices are a big deal.

For lent many people give up something, but this year I have decided to think of lent as a gift we give ourselves as Jesus gave us the gift of His life and salvation. If you would like to make a plan and set healthy goals for lent, give me a call at (815) 298-8138, and we can help each other to stay motivated and encourage each other, which we will need. WE are family, and I know we can make positive changes together.



Musical Notes

Music has always played a very important part in our church services at Court Street, especially during Lent. This article will feature some of the better-known hymns that we have sung throughout the years, and will give a little background about the composers, the lyrics, or the hymn tunes. Though we can't be together yet, reading these articles may take you back to a time when you did sing these with our congregation, and felt their impact on your life.

This information comes from *Companion to the United Methodist Hymnal* by Carlton R. Young, published in 1993 and *101 Hymn Stories* by Kenneth W. Osbeck, published in 1982.

Lift High the Cross p. 159 United Methodist Hymnal Words: George W. Kitchin & Michael R. Newbolt Music: Sydney Nicholson

This hymn in eleven stanzas first appeared with the title, *And Him Crucified* in 1916. It probably came from the Emperor Constantine's vision when he said, *In hoc signo vinces*, "In this sign (of the cross) thou shalt conquer." The hymn has no room for weakness. It calls upon the mightiest and leaves them looking upon a Love that gave its life to achieve life.

The hymn provides an opportunity to express the spirit of *Onward Christian Soldiers* without singing military-like metaphors.

If Thou But Suffer God to Guide Thee p. 142 United Methodist Hymnal Words: Georg Neumark Music: Georg Neumark



The German text to this hymn was written in 1640 or 1641 by Georg Neumark after he had been robbed by highwaymen of all but a prayerbook and a few coins. He had been without work for a long time and was almost destitute when unexpectedly he was employed as a tutor in the home of a wealthy judge in Kiel, Germany. He then wrote this hymn based on Psalm 55:22 and entitled it *A Song of Comfort: God Will Care For and Help Everyone in His Own Time*. In the first line, the word "suffer" means to allow or let God govern or control one's life.

O Sacred Head, Now Wounded Words: Anon p. 286 United Methodist Hymnal Music: Hans L. Hassler

This hymn on the passion of Jesus comes from the medieval personal devotional practice of viewing and addressing the form of the crucified Christ. This tradition was popular in German Protestant hymns, painting, and statues, and found its way into British use in the hymns of Charles Wesley and Isaac Watts. This text, originally in Latin, was probably written in the early 1200s and was divided into seven parts, one for each day of Holy Week: feet, knees, hands, sides, breast, heart, and head. This hymn refers to "Christ's head with sharp thorns crowned".

The tune is an example of setting a sacred text to a popular secular melody in order to reach a wider audience. Its source is the tune for the love song, *Confused are all my feelings, A tender maid's the cause*, and is adapted from that rhythmic medieval melody by Hassler.

All Glory, Laud and Honor Words: Theodulph of Orleans

p. 280 United Methodist Hymnal Music: Melchior Teschner


According to legend, the hymn was composed and first sung on a certain Sunday when Theodulph, a bishop, was in prison in Angers. The Emperor Louis was present that day as the procession moved through the city and halted beneath the tower where the saint was imprisoned. He heard from above the *Gloria*, *laus*, chanted loudly and melodiously. He was told that the singer was his own prisoner, Theodulph. Moved with compassion for him, the Emperor pardoned the saint, returned him to his church, and ordered the hymn which Theodulph composed be sung on Palm Sunday. Use of this hymn has been used in the French, Roman and English rites.

A typographical error is in verse 3 of our UMH where it says "with psalms" instead of "with palms".

JEREMIAH DEVELOPMENT MARCH 2021

Happy March! Jeremiah Development had a busy February. We continue to patiently wait as our new offices are being rehabbed in the old Parthenio's restaurant building. We partnered with Emmanuel Episcopal Church on February 13th to provide a drive-through food distribution. Emmanuel sponsored the food boxes which contained shelf-stable food, a farm-to-table box (dairy and proteins), chicken, lunch meats, and other loose items. Blue Cross Blue Shield of Illinois provided 250 boxes of fresh produce. Hats, gloves, and scarves of all sizes were generously donated by the community. Jeremiah distributed the winter wear, community resource packets, and a bag with items that will help keep people busy during the indoor months. It included a journal, colored pencils, a kit to grow tomatoes, conflict resolution activities for children, and positive, self-affirmation activities for adults. These were sponsored through a grant from the Community Foundation of Northern Illinois - Armer F. Ashland Fund. Food and resources were delivered to those living in the Coronado Haskell Neighborhood who were unable to drive to the event, those living in the high rises, and those who walked up. Planning for the event began in November. We planned on the possibility of snow, but the sub-zero temps added a bit more fun! With around 40 volunteers, we were able to rotate teams in and out of the cold. This would not have been possible without the many people who were able to bundle up and help including the 8 Boylan High School student volunteers who were out there with us. That night 274 households including 577 people had healthy food to eat. Thank you to all who made this a reality.


