Dear St. Paul Church Family and Friends,

Lent, taken from the Old English word for "lengthen" happens each year as daylight grows and the darkness dissipates. Originally the season of Lent was set aside for new Christians to learn about Jesus before being baptized at dawn on Easter morn. Traditionally, Christians often abstain from something they love during Lent. In more recent years, Christians have been encouraged to add a spiritual discipline during this season.

To assist you in your Lenten disciplines, we are providing households with a packet: Lent in a Bag. We are still compiling the bags and we still need folk to help us deliver them, but we hope to get Lent in a Bag to our local St. Paul folk in the coming weeks.

Despite winter snowstorms, we have returned to in-person worship on Sunday mornings. Our Sunday School continues to meet at 9:00 a.m. Splash (youth grades 4 and 5) meets Sunday afternoons at 5:00 p.m. Senior and Junior High Youth Groups meet at 6:30 on Wednesday evenings. Confirmation also meets on Wednesdays at 6:30.

Between Covid19-related delays and snow delays, you may not receive your worship packet on time occasionally. Worship bulletins can be accessed via our website: www.stpaulnb.org.

Our congregation's Annual Meeting will take place at the end of worship on Sunday, February 28. Unlike our December meeting, this meeting will take place in-person only. Annual Report packets can be picked up in the sanctuary or the church office. If you are unable to get here, let us know and we'll make certain a packet arrives at your home.

Our Blessing Pantry is staffed by volunteers on Tuesday evenings from 5:30-7:30. The Pantry is also open Wednesday and Thursday afternoons from 1:00-3:00 p.m. We thank you for your generosity toward the Pantry—we have been able to keep it well stocked for our guests.

#### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Mark 1:9-15.

This text is a fitting beginning for the season of Lent. At Jesus' baptism God intervenes by opening up the heavens and speaking of Jesus as God's Beloved Son. Jesus is thrown into the wilderness by the Holy Spirit to confront Satan, the personification of all that opposes God's reign. Jesus endures, and he is cared for by the angels of God. Jesus then begins his own public ministry following the arrest of John the Baptist. John's experience is a precursor to Jesus' own betrayal and arrest to fulfill all that God intends to do through the Beloved Son. And, then, Jesus goes out to do the work of the kingdom, the reign of God that has not been stopped by Satan and will not be stopped, ever. The preaching is simple: repent and believe in the good news of God's reign. Repentance is not about remorse but about turning around and going in another direction, toward God and what God can and will do. This Lent, we are reminded to trust the work of God that will defeat everything opposed to God's rule of steadfast love and mercy. How will you repent and focus on the reign of God in your life and in the world? Pray: Almighty and merciful God, help us to trust your reign present now and forevermore through Jesus, your Beloved Son and our Savior and Lord. Amen.



The story of Noah and the flood is a difficult story to grasp. The point of the story is that God's demand for justice (the flood) is finally outdone by God's mercy (a new beginning for creation for those on the ark). Justice does not stand alone. It needs mercy, especially in our world where no human has the wisdom of God to judge. Do you know someone who needs a word of mercy? Write a note to that person and pray for them this week.


#### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**

# THRESHOLD MOMENT

Leader: Each of us is created as a precious and holy vessel of embodied love. We have been through a harrowing time since last Lent that has shattered our sense of wholeness—body, mind and spirit—like a glass vessel fractured into pieces. Let us enter a Lenten "season of recovery" as we focus on Jesus, the Healer of our every ill.

Leader: Beach glass begins as something whole and yet discarded. As it is tumbled by the sea, it is broken and polished until it becomes a treasured "mineral gem." We do not embrace that suffering is necessary or God-given, but that suffering is a part of life. When pain comes and brokenness enters our lives, Jesus reaches out to touch and remind us of the Treasure that we all are: worthy of new life in the midst of hopelessness. In a year when pandemic has wreaked havoc on our world, we begin by affirming our journey to physical health.

## OPENING PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Leader: Lent developed into a season of intense inward reflection and confessions centuries after the life of Jesus. Yet, as we will see, Jesus encouraged people to open up about their lives—to speak the truth—no matter how broken the truth or our lives. This is the beginning of compassion for ourselves and others. It is the beginning of healing. The Latin origins of the word "confess" is to "study and acknowledge." Lent will be a season of studying how we can be a healing presence in our community. To do this, we acknowledge our need to restore our own Holy Vessels. Let us pray:

People: Creator God, we are bodies fashioned by your hand in your own image: shapes and colors of diverse and immense beauty. And yet too often we have ignored the sacred nature of our physical lives. The Holy Vessels you have fashioned are tired and suffering, ravaged by months of disrupted rhythms and ailments. Our fragility has come into full view and we are frightened. We cannot fathom the proportions of loss and so we look away, sometimes even from our own needs. Help us, O Healer God. Show us our strength. Forgive our inertia. Move us to move one step at a time toward greater care.

#### CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Beach glass begins as something whole and yet discarded. As it is tumbled by the ocean, it is broken and polished until it becomes a smooth thing of beauty. Throughout Lent this year, we will look to beach glass as a metaphor for the healing that is needed in our lives: physical, emotional, spiritual healing. What began as a broken and discarded piece of glass is transformed by the waves of the ocean. What begins as brokenness in our own lives is polished and made smooth by God's love. Poet Bernadette Noll writes this:

I want to age like sea glass. Smoothed by tides, but not broken. I want my hard edges to soften. I want to ride the waves and go with the flow. I want to catch a wave and let it carry me to where I belong. I want to be picked up and held gently by those who delight in my well earned patina and appreciate the changes I went through to achieve that beauty. I want to enjoy the journey and always remember that if you give the ocean something breakable it will turn it into something beautiful. I want to age like sea glass.

Throughout Lent, we will look to sea glass, to beach glass, as we seek healing in our lives. Each week we will add a bead of beach glass to a bracelet—a bracelet that grows each week with an added bead, an added reminder that God takes our lives, heals us, and transforms us into something beautiful. Today we begin by putting a green glass bead onto our bracelets. Green symbolizes growth, tranquility and health.

This week I encourage you to wear your bracelet with its green bead of healing. Every time you look at your wrist, every time you touch the bead, know this: you are treasured by God. You are beautiful. You belong. Amen.

That evening they brought to him many who were possessed with demons; and he cast out the spirits with a word, and cured all who were sick. <sup>17</sup> This was to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah, "He took our infirmities and bore our diseases."

# SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Without a doubt, Jesus was a hands-on kind of guy. Back in Jesus' day, you were guaranteed to find him amongst the outcasts, the lepers, the tax collectors, the woman and the children. Even today, we celebrate Christ's presence among those who need him most. In today's lesson, Jesus heals a leper: with the touch of his hand.

In Jesus' time, there was no group more outcast than the lepers. Leprosy has been known and feared by people for thousands of years. Its power to disfigure, deform, and kill made it notorious in ancient communities. Even today, about 208,000 new cases of bacillus mycobacterium leprae are diagnosed each year: most of these cases found among the poorest of the poor.

Jesus, whose entire ministry was reaching out to those on the margins of life, did not seem in the least bit fazed by the request of the man with leprosy. Jesus did not step back in disgust and fear, but instead stepped forward, reached out his hands to touch the ailing man.

I cannot even begin to imagine what that touch meant to the man with leprosy. Until that moment, he was, quite literally, an untouchable. He was an outcast. He was isolated from his family, friends and his community. Yet, with that simple gesture of reaching out his hands, Jesus transformed the man's life: healing his disease AND healing his heart: a heart that had been told again and again that he was not worthy, that he was not welcome, that his very presence was dangerous to others.

Until the coronavirus arrived in Auglaize County about a year ago, we were people who valued touch. We shook hands. We hugged. We were unafraid to touch others. This past year has given us a tiny glance into the life of the leper—who, until Jesus touched him, had probably not known human touch for years. By touching the man with leprosy, Jesus not only healed him, but Jesus restored the man's very humanity.

When I think about the importance of touch, of its healing power, I immediately think about the plight of infants who are literally dying from lack of affection. Several years ago, Bruce Perry and Maia Szalavitz published a volume of studies that point to the dire consequences of newborns, infants, and toddlers not receiving on-going affection. Their book, entitled, Born for Love: Why Empathy is Essential—and Endangered, talks specifically with the problems surrounding children in some Chinese and Eastern European orphanages.

In their book, they talked about how about 1/3 of babies placed in the barest orphanages die. Half of the rest -- at least double the rate seen in the general population -- will suffer from mental illness. Each month spent in an orphanage in early life reduces IQ and increases risk of behavioral and psychological problems.

How could simply being in an orphanage cause such harm and/or death? Basically, these young children die from lack of love. When an infant falls below the threshold of physical affection needed to stimulate the production of growth hormone and the immune system, his body starts shutting down. In medical terms, it's called Failure to Thrive.

For many of us, it is almost impossible to imagine a situation in which children are not given affection. Surely, this must be happening in faraway countries and cultures! Not so fast! There are many, many children in our own country (and I dare say our own community) who are not cuddled, loved, and held by their parents. Children are literally dying from lack of love and it is our call to reach out to these children and offer them affection, kindness, and support. It is also our call to reach out to their

parents—because far too often the parents of these children have been badly damaged by life themselves.

And what about other adults? Teens? Are there people to whom we deny touch? Are there people we consider too filthy, too diseased, too broken, to offer our affection? Is there someone in your life who you keep at a distance, someone you have hardened your heart against?

My guess is that there is a person you could name who is in need of affection, gentle words, forgiveness, and grace. This week I encourage you to prayerfully consider reaching out to this person. Make amends. Let go of your bitterness. Set aside your prejudices. And, since hugs are generally frowned upon at the moment, reach out to this person. Send a card. Make that phone call.

I ask you this: when have you known healing in your life? Has it been physical? Or mental? Or spiritual? When have you been restored to your right mind, your whole heart, your healed body? And, once you experienced healing, how did your respond? Did you keep your joy to yourself OR did you go out and tell others how wonderful it was to be whole again?

John Wesley, one of the founding fathers of Methodism, had this to say to those who joined his Methodist Society as helpers: "Go not to those who need you, but to those who need you most."

Let me repeat Wesley's instruction: Go not to those who need you, but to those who need you **most**.

So what is the take-away from today's sermon? This I believe: that no gift given in love is too little. That no gift given in love is too extravagant. That through the love that Jesus shows to us each and every day, we are called to share that love with others that all might know healing of body, mind and spirit.

When the man with leprosy asked Jesus if he would heal his disease, Jesus answered, "I do choose! Be made clean!"

Let us choose this day to serve the Lord by serving those who need us most so that the love we share will be a healing balm, a gift of restoration, a song of love. Amen.



Praise God from whom all blessings flow; praise him, all creatures here below; praise him above, ye heavenly host: praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Amen.





Joshua Mumbi used to spend much of his time collecting water. When it rained, he would collect water running in the streets. Often he would spend much of the day walking to a local water source and carrying back buckets. Sometimes he would even travel to the water source with his family the night before, spending the night there so that they could bring back water in the morning. His mother, Josephine, did not like to make the journey alone – it was not safe.

There was not much time to go to school. And when he did go to school, Joshua Mumbi was very tired during the day. It was hard to focus; it was hard to learn

But thanks to your gifts through One Great Hour of Sharing, Joshua Mumbi and his family – and all of the other families in his village – have a safe, clean water source close to home. With a new solar-powered
