Grace and Peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Friend.

Yesterday marked the halfway point in our Lenten journey. With Holy Week around the corner, these are the services offered:

March 28. Palm Sunday/Rite of Confirmation at 10:15 in the sanctuary and via Facebook Live. Sunday School children will process with palms at the start of the service.

April 1. Maundy Thursday Healing Service at 6:30 in the sanctuary and via Facebook Live. Service will include prayers, scripture, sermon, Prayers of Healing, Sacrament of Holy Communion and lighting of candles for healing.

April 2. Good Friday Tenebrae Service at 6:30 in the sanctuary and via Facebook Live. Service will include music, scriptures and candlelight slowly diminishing until only the Christ Candle is lit.

April 4. Easter Sunday! Worship will be held in the sanctuary and via Facebook Live at 7:30, 9:00 and 10:30 a.m. Service will include music, prayers, scriptures, preaching and the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

Pastor Dee's health continues to be compromised. She is taking an unpaid medical leave of absence until July 1. Council voted last week to continue to pay Dee's medical insurance and pension. We will hire a part time Ministry Associate to assist Pastor Becky and Barb Holdren in day-to-day operations and programs.

We have welcomed three new members into our St. Paul Family: Emily Shelby & Beth and Greg Bretz. Emily is married to Steven; they have two sons: Holden and Hunter. Greg and Beth have two daughters: Adele and Mara.

Daily Devotions have been scaled back slightly. Pastor Becky now leads them Monday-Thursday only at 11:30 via Facebook Live. Pastor Becky takes Fridays as her Sabbath day. When Becky takes sabbatical time in mid-April to early May, Daily Devotions will be offered twice a week.

St. Paul Church will host a Rummage Sale on April 15, 16 and 17. Donations of your household items can begin to arrive and be placed in front of the stage in the auditorium beginning Tuesday April 6. All proceeds will go to the Project of the Year: The Blessing Pantry.

Our Golden Harvest Community Garden is in need of soil for the garden boxes. Purchasing the soil will be approximately \$200. You are invited to consider donating to the purchase of soil. We will also need volunteers to transport and spread the soil. Please see Pastor Becky if you are able to assist.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Think or tell about a time you failed at something.
- Failure is a part of life, but when we learn from our mistakes, it is not a total failure, but a learning moment. When have you learned from your mistakes?
- The Bible is filled with mistakes by God's people, yet God refuses to give up on us. What does that say about the God who reaches out to us through Jesus?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Jeremiah 31:31-34.

Jeremiah is speaking to a people who are either in exile in Babylon or about to be conquered and sent to Babylon. The northern kingdom of Israel had already fallen to the Assyrians well over a hundred years before. Now the southern kingdom of Judah is doomed. The people have been unfaithful and God's promises to Abraham, Moses, and David seem to have come to naught. But Jeremiah prophesies, "Not so." God promises to find a new way, a new covenant. This passage is about God's people only because it is about the God who continues to claim them. God will not give up on the people God loves. It is the very nature and character of God not to give up on us. God finds a way by having a new covenant, a new start. What God ordains will happen: we shall be God's people and God will be our God. We are not there yet. We are people of the new covenant, but the prophesy has not happened completely. We still need to be taught, but the day is coming that God's promise will be fulfilled. How do you learn about faith in Christ?

Pray: God of the new covenant, give us faith to trust in your promises and courage to walk in your ways through Jesus Christ, the one who came to set us free. Amen.

Psalm 51 is a prayer for cleansing and pardon. Christian prison ministries reach out to inmates with the love and hope of Jesus Christ. There are many who care for the children and families of prisoners and lead Bible studies and prayer with the prisoners. Pray for those who work with inmates and their families this week.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



This is our fifth week suggesting the discipline of using the Daily Bible Readings. At the core of new beginnings for Christians is the work of God revealed from the cross and in the Bible. Begin each day's reading by reciting Psalm 51:10: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me." Say the Prayer for the Week after each reading, add your own prayers, and end by saying: Remember that you are God's, and to God you shall return.

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OPENING PRAYER OF CONFESSION


Leader: Let us acknowledge our need to restore, repair, renew our Holy Vessels, especially this holy container of life on which we live—planet Earth. Let us pray.

People: Life-giving God, in the beginning you created this universe with the phrase, "Let it be..." and the waters and dry land, the sky and the creatures were formed. You set humanity among these wonders and invited us to care and honor all things. We have not successfully answered that call. Seeing the abundance as a feast that would never end, we gorged ourselves, taking more than we could replenish at a rate that could not be sustained. We are

beginning to comprehend the magnitude, beginning to see that things cannot just keep going "as usual" and not have dire consequences. We are frightened, which is partly why we are slow to accept it. But we now are witnesses to the forces of a world more broken than when we inherited it: water, wind, and wave, fire, drought, and earthquake that signal it is time to pay attention and to make real change. Too often we think there is nothing we can do—that the change required is too great. It all feels overwhelming and so we look away, sometimes even from the small things that could make a difference for our own community. Help us, Healer-God. Show us our ability to chart a different course. Forgive our inaction. Move us to move one step at a time toward greater care for one another. In this silence, we sense and acknowledge our yearning for wholeness. Amen.

CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Beach glass begins as something whole and yet discarded. As it is tumbled by the ocean, it is broken and polished until it becomes a smooth thing of beauty. Throughout Lent this year, we will look to beach glass as a metaphor for the healing that is needed in our lives: physical, emotional, spiritual healing. What began as a broken and discarded piece of glass is transformed by the waves of the ocean. What begins as brokenness in our own lives is polished and made smooth by God's love.

Poet Bernadette Noll writes this:

I want to age like sea glass. Smoothed by tides, but not broken. I want my hard edges to soften. I want to ride the waves and go with the flow. I want to catch a wave and let it carry me to where I belong. I want to be picked up and held gently by those who delight in my well earned patina and appreciate the changes I went through to achieve that beauty. I want to enjoy the journey and always remember that if you give the ocean something breakable it will turn it into something beautiful. I want to age like sea glass.

Throughout Lent, we will look to sea glass, to beach glass, as we seek healing in our lives. Each week we will add a bead of beach glass to a bracelet—a bracelet that grows each week with an added bead, an added reminder that God takes our lives, heals us, and transforms us into something beautiful. Today we begin by putting a pink glass bead onto our bracelets.

In spiritual terms, the color pink represents compassion, nurture and love. It is the color of unconditional love and understanding along with the giving and receiving of God's nurturing love. Pink represents kindness and lightheartedness that can move us to joy. Wear your pink bead this week to remind yourself to offer kindness, compassion and love—especially in situations in which these are lacking.

This week I encourage you to wear your bracelet with its green, blue, grey, yellow and pink beads of healing. Every time you look at your wrist, every time you touch the beads, know this: you are treasured by God. God keeps and holds your life. You belong. Amen.


