

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Talk or think about something you need to see in order to believe it is real.
- What does the expression "seeing is believing" mean to you?
- Jesus wants us to see with the eyes of faith. How is this possible?

DEVOTIONS



Read: John 20:19-31.

Thomas wants what the other disciples experienced: seeing the risen Lord. Seeing is a major theme in the Gospel of John. Jesus says to two disciples, "Come and see" (John 1:39). The woman at the well tells the townspeople to "Come and see a man who told me everything I have ever done" (John 4:29); the man born blind sees Jesus and says, "Lord, I believe" (John 9:38). Mary Magdalene sees the resurrected Jesus in the garden and tells the disciples, "I have seen the Lord" (John 20:18). Our reading for this week ends with sensitivity to those who will not see the resurrected Lord Jesus yet will come to believe. The Gospel of John wrote down enough signs from Jesus that people "may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God" and "have life in his name" (v. 31). Today's disciples, like the ones in the Gospel of John, believe because they see through the eyes of faith. We have the Holy Spirit that we may have a living relationship with Jesus through today's disciples, those who continue to tell the stories of the Scriptures that we may come "to see," to believe and have life in the name of Jesus. Who or what has helped you see with the eyes of faith?

Pray: Risen Lord, we thank you for blessing us with a community of faith and the Scriptures that we may see that you are the Messiah, the Son of God. Amen.

In Acts 4:32-35 the first Christians gave witness to their faith by how they lived and cared for one another so that there was no needy person in their midst. It is still important for Christians to care for the needs of others. How can you reach out to someone in need this week?

John 20:19-31 tells us that Thomas found it hard to believe that Jesus had risen from the dead. Jesus appeared to him and invited Thomas to touch him. CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Today is Holy Humor Sunday—the day we laugh at the absurdity of the resurrection. I love to laugh, but those closest to me will tell you I'm a lousy joke teller because I either forget the punchline or I don't GET the punchline. True story. But let me try some of these out on you:

George Burns: The secret of a good sermon is to have a good beginning and a good ending; and to have the two as close together as possible.

An inexperienced preacher was to hold a graveside burial service at a pauper's cemetery for an indigent man with no family or friends. Not knowing where the cemetery was, she made several wrong turns and got lost. When she eventually arrived an hour late, the hearse was nowhere in sight, the backhoe was next to the open hold, and the workmen were sitting under a tree eating lunch.

The diligent young pastor went to the open grave and found the vault lid already in place. Feeling guilty because of her tardiness, she preached an impassioned and lengthy service, sending the deceased to heaven in style.

As she returned to her car, she overheard one of the workmen say to the other, "I've been putting in septic tanks for twenty years and I ain't never seen anything like that."

Several children found a dead robin. Feeling that a proper burial should be performed, they secured a small box and some cotton batting, dug a hole in the back yard, and prepared to bury the bird. The minister's 5 year old son was chosen to say the prayer. And so with great dignity, he intoned, "Glory be to the Father and to the Son and into the hole he goes..."

After explaining the commandment to honor your mother and father, a Sunday School teacher asked her class if there was a commandment that teaches us how to treat our brothers and sisters. One girl, the oldest in her family, immediately answered, "Thou shalt not kill."

A pastor's wife was preparing pancakes for her young sons. The boys began to argue over who would get the first pancake. Their mother saw the opportunity for a Bible lesson. She said to her sons, "If Jesus was sitting here, he would say, *let my brother have the first pancake. I can wait.*" The oldest turned to his younger brother and said, "You be Jesus."

Poet Wendell Berry once wrote: Laugh. Laughter is immeasurable. Be joyful though you have considered all the facts. This week I encourage you to laugh—not a malicious laughter, but laughter that welcomes others into the joke. Be joyful—even in the midst of these turbulent times. Celebrate and celebrate some more.

Still our busy hearts and minds, O God, that we might hear your laughter in this gift of silence. SILENCE

Blessed are you, Lord our God, who invites us to be holy fools. All of this we pray joyfully in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray...

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 24:13-35 (<u>The Message</u>)

That same day two of them were walking to the village Emmaus, about seven miles out of Jerusalem. They were deep in conversation, going over all these things that had happened. In the middle of their talk and questions, Jesus came up and walked along with them. But they were not able to recognize who he was.

¹⁷⁻¹⁸ He asked, "What's this you're discussing so intently as you walk along?" They just stood there, long-faced, like they had lost their best friend. Then one of them, his name was Cleopas, said, "Are you the only one in Jerusalem who hasn't heard what's happened during the last few days?"

19-24 He said, "What has happened?" They said, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene. He was a man of God, a prophet, dynamic in work and word, blessed by both God and all the people. Then our high priests and leaders betrayed him, got him sentenced to death, and crucified him. And we had our hopes up that he was the One, the One about to deliver Israel. And it is now the third day since it happened. But now some of our women have completely confused us. Early this morning they were at the tomb and couldn't find his body. They came back with the story that they had seen a vision of angels who said he was alive. Some of our friends went off to the tomb to check and found it empty just as the women said, but they didn't see Jesus."

²⁵⁻²⁷ Then he said to them, "So thick-headed! So slow-hearted! Why can't you simply believe all that the prophets said? Don't you see that these things had to happen, that the Messiah had to suffer and only then enter into his glory?" Then he started at the beginning, with the Books of Moses, and went on through all the Prophets, pointing out everything in the Scriptures that referred to him.

²⁸⁻³¹ They came to the edge of the village where they were headed. He acted as if he were going on but they pressed him: "Stay and have supper with us. It's nearly evening; the day is done." So he went in with

them. And here is what happened: He sat down at the table with them. Taking the bread, he blessed and broke and gave it to them. At that moment, open-eyed, wide-eyed, they recognized him. And then he disappeared.

³² Back and forth they talked. "Didn't we feel on fire as he conversed

with us on the road, as he opened up the Scriptures for us?"

³³⁻³⁴ They didn't waste a minute. They were up and on their way back to Jerusalem. They found the Eleven and their friends gathered together, talking away: "It's really happened! The Master has been raised up—Simon saw him!"

³⁵ Then the two went over everything that happened on the road and how they recognized him when he broke the bread.

RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God!

People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

SERMON Easter Laughter Rev. Becky Erb Strang Catholic and Protestant congregations are celebrating this first Sunday after Easter as Holy Humor Sunday. In some of these congregations, the pastor dresses as a clown or jester and tells jokes and invites the congregation to share jokes. The custom is rooted in the musings of early church theologians such as Augustine, Gregory of

Nyssa and John Chrysostom that God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. It was called The Easter Laugh.

Truly, there is much to laugh about at Eastertime—yet we hardly take time to laugh at the absurdity of the resurrection: of life from death. On this weekend, we celebrate that God has had the last laugh over death.

So, in honor of Holy Humor Sunday, let me share with you some knock knock jokes.

Knock Knock (Who's there?)
Rita (Rita Who)
Read a Bible if you want to hear the good news!

Knock Knock (Who's there?)
Luke (Luke Who?)
Look all around you at the smiles on your neighbor's faces

Knock Knock (Who's there?) Gladys (Gladys Who?) Glad it's Sunday, aren't you?

Knock Knock (Who's There?)
Oliver (Oliver Who?)
All of our joys come from the Lord.

Or how about this one: A woman invited some people to dinner. At the table, she turned to her six-year-old daughter and said, "Would you like to say the blessing?"

"I wouldn't know what to say," the little girl replied.

"Just say what you hear Mommy say," the mother said.

The little girl bowed her head and said: "Dear Lord, why on earth did I invite all these people to dinner?"

Paul Lintern, a Lutheran pastor, has re-written a whole host of Christmas carols for Holy Humor Weekend. One goes like this:

Hark the Herald Angel Said

Why seek Jesus with the dead?

He's not here, as you can see,

Gravecloths lie where he would be.

On your way now, tell the others,

Jesus will be with his brothers.

Sisters, too, he wants to see,

On the hills of Galilee.

Hark the Herald Angel said,

He is risen from the dead.

When we think about practical jokes, we tend to think about rubber chickens, whoopee cushions, and the like. In other words, we usually laugh at the expense of someone else. But that is not God's way. God,

on Holy Humor Sunday, reminds us that the last laugh is on us: that God surprises us beyond our wildest imaginations and lifts us up, rather than putting us down.

So here is another one:

A man was being tailgated by a stressed out woman on a busy street. Suddenly, the light turned yellow just in front of him. He did the right thing, stopping at the crosswalk. The tailgating woman hit the roof, and the horn, screaming as she missed her chance to get through the intersection.

As she was still in mid-rant, she heard a tap on her window and looked up into the face of a police officer. He took her to the police station where she was placed in a holding cell.

After a couple of hours, the policeman opened the cell door and said, "I'm very sorry for this mistake. You see, I pulled up behind your car while you were blowing your horn, flipping off the guy in front of you, and swearing a blue streak at him. I noticed the 'What Would Jesus Do?' bumper sticker, the 'Follow Me to Sunday School' bumper sticker, and the chrome-plated Christian fish emblem on the trunk. Naturally, I assumed you had stolen the car!"

So what does Holy Humor Sunday mean for us?

It means we need to live like Easter People. We need to celebrate Christ's resurrection not only last Sunday, but every day of our lives. And we celebrate Easter by sharing Christ's love with others.

Ann Weems is a poet and theologian who has written a wonderful piece called, "Come to the Easter Party":

I think on Easter morning we should throw confetti in church!

No?

What about a little fanfare?

A deafening drum roll?

A three minute standing ovation?

What? Have we had the drums beaten out of us?

That we in the celebrative community can't really

Get excited about God's aliveness?

About God's love given to us unconditionally?

Have we given Easter to the lily bearers, the bunny rabbits and the patent leather shoes?

Let's face it: We live as though we don't believe in Easter.

We're the crowd—

Easily swayed, Easily scared, Easily calling for blood.

We're the good church people

Who can't believe Jesus meant love one another—

Not all the one anothers:

Not drug addicts and criminals.

We hate injustice when it's injustice toward us;

We love mercy when it's mercy for us;

We walk humbly with our God when it's convenient.

We're Baby Believers who resist the resurrection;

We're Christmas Christians who are very good at

Celebrating Christ's birth.

We can cling to the Baby.

We're even Crucifixion Christians,

Agonizing, sympathizing,

Relating to the Hero of the Cross.

We can rock a Baby;

We can weep for a Dead Man;

But what can we do with a 33 year old who won't let the story end?

Easter scares us

Because we're the people who can't believe

That God gives us abundant Life;

We think we have to earn it.

In our pull-yourselves-up-by-your-own-bootstraps society

It's hard to remember that God doesn't buy the self-made man.

So we in the church spend our lives showing God

What good people we are,

What achievers we are,

How much we deserve God's love.

We want to pay our own way,

But Easter says it's already been paid!

Easter says, no matter how prodigal,

We can go home again!

So come to the Easter party!

Let's celebrate that Amazing Grace
That in Christ's resurrection
We are still loved even at our most outrageous.
The Lord has given us the music;
All we need to do is dance it!
Come to the Easter party!

That, my dear friends, is the prank, the joke, the gift God has given to us as Easter: we are invited to the party when we don't deserve it. Christ has been raised to new life through no effort of our own. We are filled with the Holy Spirit for service NOT to prove we are good Christians, but that we might scatter joy in this community and beyond.

Let the laughter begin. Amen.




