MOMENT FOR MISSION: UCC Disaster Ministries

The UCC disaster Team is currently supporting long term recovery efforts from winter storms that impacted states from Texas to the Carolinas. In Kentucky, there were 264 destroyed and 741 damaged homes. Many homes were also damaged in Georgia and Mississippi. All this damage has happened in the last several months due to late winter storms. Replacement of burst pipes, restoration of church food pantries and making homes safe again is being met by UCC Disaster Ministries response. Filling clean-up buckets and personal care kits are still a very important way of helping in disaster clean-up efforts. The clean-up bucket/supply list has under gone changes. Now, a five-gallon bucket with a resealable lid is used. More supplies are placed in the bucket making the price to fill, a bit more expensive. St Paul can fill the buckets with the funds that we collect or Church World Service will be happy to receive donations to purchase the contents. If sending your donation through St. Paul, please make check out to St. Paul (this way your giving account is credited) and designate bucket supplies. Please consider donating to this cause. NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 15:1-8 (NRSV)

15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. ² He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. ³ You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. ⁴ Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. ⁵ I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. ⁶ Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷ If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. ⁸ My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

⁷ Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. ⁸ Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. ⁹ God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. ¹⁰ In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. ¹¹ Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. ¹² No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

SERMON Abiding in Love Rev. Jeanette Tangeman The past several years there has been a very interesting happening at the residence at the end of our road. Now I live in the country outside of Wapakoneta—when anyone asks me I always say in the middle of a cornfield, sometimes soybeans. I was raised and spent my first 50 years of life in the city of Toledo so you can imagine that this is quite a different

scene for me, but I have come to love it. Even having learned a whole lot about country living and farming since being here for 24 years now, I never cease to be amazed at what surrounds me. At that time, I was amazed to see the beginnings of a vineyard at the end of our road. I do know this is not grape or wine country usually. I am used to vineyards along Lake Erie in particular and an occasional grape vine or two in backyards for grapes to eat or make into jelly. But I am talking about rows and rows of grapevines. During that time, as my husband and I watched the first growth and harvest we became more and more curious. This went on for a couple of years until one day our neighbor, whom we knew only by name, was out mowing and our curiosity got the best of us, so we stopped and asked him about his vineyard.

Well, you have never seen a man's face light up with so much excitement and love as he told us about his 3 acres of grapes, gave us a tour and had us taste the 4 types of grapes he tends and grows and harvests. What a lesson we learned that day about the hard, persistent work, weather, birds and animals who love the grapes too, and so many details about tending a vineyard to grow great tasting grapes. His grapes did go to a local winery and now he also makes his own wine. In the past couple of years, he has added a wonderful outdoor and indoor area for tasting and enjoying the wine and wine slushies. It has become quite the popular spot in our corner of the countryside and people gather as we have been able. Every year through the seasons I watch with fascination and now also have a better understanding as the vines grow and bring forth the beautiful fruit.

Noting the number of times, often daily, that I see our neighbor carefully tending and pruning and guarding his vineyard and watching each year as what looks like dead leftover vines blossom with lush leaves and grapes, makes me able to understand why Jesus chose the vine and the branches to teach his disciples and ultimately all of us about love. You know how often Jesus used something so familiar to people to get his point across and the Bible is full of references to vineyards. It always helps most of us if we have some knowledge of the images.

Whether you have seen a vineyard in person or maybe just a vining house or yard plant it is obvious that the vines all come from one main stem and then intertwine until there is no one branch that occupies a higher or lower status, none that have any really different appearance from another. It is easy to see that all the branches must be nourished by the main stem. And if the vines are not carefully pruned and protected from weeds and animals and birds, then there will be no fruit. Sounds like a sermon to me.

In the scripture from the Gospel of John today are verses which follow the ones in Chapter 14 where Jesus tells the disciples to rise and get on their way and then gives a long farewell speech full of instructions for them. It is a call to get moving, to put them and us in motion through works that will bear witness to God's love and to our love for one another. And then today's scripture elaborates on that.

Sometimes we use a word so much and in so many different ways that the impact of it is lost. The word love gets tossed around pretty freely these days from loving a new possession or even a favorite food (think chocolate!!). We love beautiful, warm spring days, great movies, good books, etc. You get the picture. Of course a deeper love is the kind we have for parents, spouses, children, grandchildren. But today we are going to think about God's love for us and the way we then respond to that love by loving one another, a love known as agape love.

Apparently the writer of 1 John thought it was quite important for his readers to understand this meaning of love, devoting 15 verses to it. Scholars feel this scripture is one of the most eloquent statements about love in all Johanine texts, maybe the entire New Testament. The Lectionary, the three-year Scripture Assignments for Sundays, pairs these two readings today for a good reason. One is to remind us of the true meaning of God's love, over and over and in many different ways, and the other to tell us in images we can understand just how to abide in that love and bear fruit by loving one another. Abiding in love literally means to abide in God because God is love.

If you do not take anything else away from my sermon today, I want you to remember this: God loved us first before we could even respond and God loves us even if we don't respond. God's love does not depend upon our love for God, because God is love. Love is not known in the first place by the way we love God, but by God's having loved us first. God's love for us is the source of our power to love God and love one another, so it has to come first. No one has seen God but this love is not

abstract, it has a face, a face we know...it looks like Jesus. God's love for the world is revealed in the life of Jesus, the heart of the Gospel. And we who proclaim we belong to Jesus need to be a sacrament of God's love for others by being for one another what Jesus is for us, one who loves, heals, and nourishes. As a leader at Back Bay Mission once said, when we are doing that we are bringing the Gospel right off the pages into our corners of the world.

So what if we take the image of the vine and branches and think about what the church would look like if we were the branches—not just this church, although I mean to include it, but all of the churches in our neighborhood, in our country, in all the countries where churches proclaim that God is love. For if we proclaim that we are abiding in love then what happens in our churches should be the same no matter the location, because love becomes authentic when it is acted out in the world in concrete ways with others. And we are reminded in Scripture that if we cannot love those whom we can see, how can we love God whom we cannot see?

Jesus said, "I am the vine and you are the branches." So again, thinking of the way the branches intertwine, we in the churches are all connected to the main stem and also to each other. I am reminded of a room at the Tiffin office of the Northwest Ohio Association of the UCC. All around the top border is a grapevine and each of the churches (including St. Paul) which make up the Northwest Ohio Association is one of the branches. And all together, beautiful grapes are painted representing the fruits of all the churches. What a visual to show that none of us is acting alone, we are all connected to each other and together bearing fruit.

Just like the branches of a vine, none of us, whether ordained or lay, large or small, young or old, have a higher or lower presence in the church. We often say we are a congregation of ministers, or that the congregation are all missionaries. When I was at Buckland UCC our Confirmands made signs that were placed on the inside over the doors so that as people went out from worship they read, "you are now entering the mission field." And the signs were also in the parking lot. A reminder that the work of spreading the Gospel is not limited to any one person or

place and that none of us are more or less important than another in doing so. It is the responsibility of every one of us.

There is no major difference in the appearance of the branches. For the church that means that no gift or talent that one brings is better than another. It is the way the church loves that is the mark of community. Just as all the branches are needed to produce the fruit on a grapevine, all the gifts and talents of the people in the churches are needed to produce the fruit that is love. Some time ago at St. Paul's St. Marys, where I now belong, we had been talking about the stewardship of generosity and we had been asked to fill out a paper indicating some of the different ways individual talents could be used in the church. There were no numbers indicating which things were more important. Every one of them was an act of love for others. And if you did not find something that matched what you could do you could write it in. It takes all of us giving our time and talents in love to continue the love in action that is an integral part of any church.

Bearing fruit for the church means acting out in love. Having love according to Jesus doesn't mean knowing what love is intellectually. Having love means allowing love to make its way from our minds to our hearts and finally to our bodies so that we act on it for the sake of others. It is hard to "love thy neighbor" if you are equating it with love of family, for instance. Love is not just an emotion or an attitude. The kind of love Jesus talks about is opening our eyes and hearts to really see and feel the joys and pain of others, to do the best we can with the resources we have. If we love others because of God's love we do not claim credit for it nor only love those that are lovable.

We know love is a risky business sometimes. Just think of Martin Luther King Jr, Nelson Mandela, Desmond Tutu, Oscar Romero, for instance. Maybe it feels like a risk to our possessions, or involves betrayal, or need for a change in our ambitions or expectations. It is not always easy whether thy neighbor is close or around the world. We are inclined to fear and pain in relationship to others rather than compassion and connectedness, especially those we do not know well, or who live differently from us. If love is genuine we will often encounter barriers, conflict and resistance. So what do we do about this? How can we follow that commandment to love thy neighbor?

First of all, when we experience anger or fear or unhappiness as we try to love more as God loves us, we can use it as an opportunity to grow in grace. And you will not have to do this alone. On your own you can become cut off from your life source. Call upon the Holy Spirit to help you grow in love and grace. It is a growing process, not a race. It will be a rollercoaster at times. Meditate on what it is that is making you feel anger or fear. What is the deeper hurt within you that perhaps is coming out in these emotions? Maybe you have some unhealed memories or you have been hurt by love. Remember that love comes from God, that the nourishment of the branches comes from the main stem and so the more you abide in God, the more you will be able to act in love toward one another. God continues to create and sustain in us a capacity to love. God's persistent presence, not fear of judgment to come, is experienced in the lives of those who entrust themselves to Christ and who activate that trust in love for one another. Perfect love casts out all fear.

When the church acts in love as a community, we are acting corporately, an act rooted in Jesus' love for community. Fruitfulness does not occur automatically just because a congregation calls themselves a church. It takes participation of the disciples that make up the church, it takes prayer, grace, forgiveness of others and of ourselves as well. When abiding is two sided—disciples in Christ and Christ in them, then love will grow. According to writer Lindsay Armstrong "We branches will be cared for by the vine. The vine grower knows just how to develop us, exactly when to prune, when to wait, when to harvest."

We have a source for all the grace and strength we need by abiding in love and acting in love. The result is fruit that blesses the world. Mother Teresa once said that when the time comes for God to judge us, God will not ask how many great things have you done in your life rather God will ask how much love did you put into what you did? How will you answer on that day?





(no spray bottles)

Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
Five dust masks
Two pairs heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-
surgical)
One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and
removed from carton
One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent
