DEVOTIONS

Pentecost Sunday is a day to celebrate the work of the Holy Spirit that enlivens the church to continue what the disciples learned and received through Jesus. The Holy Spirit makes Jesus Christ alive and real today as Savior, not just as a historical figure to recall from the past. Jesus' forgiving and renewing work is extended to the church of all times through the Spirit. What is worth remembering is that the Spirit is celebrated in Psalm 104 as the source of life for all of creation. Without God's Spirit there is no breath and creatures "die and return to their dust" (v. 29). We live in an age when the earth is being harmed by pollution of many kinds that endangers future generations, human and nonhuman alike. It is important to see the link between God's work of creating life through the Spirit and redeeming all life through Christ Jesus. Thanks be to God for life created, life redeemed, and life sustained through this one God in three persons. How does Pentecost lead you to care for and celebrate all that God has made?

Pray: Dear God, you who love all that you create, give us that love through your Holy Spirit to care for the earth and tell others of the good news of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Pentecost reminds us that the world is full of many languages and different cultures. Jesus' promise to the disciples was fulfilled on this day. It enabled them to speak in other languages and spread the good news of Jesus Christ. How can you spread the good news to those who speak other languages and are from different cultures?





CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Did you know in both the Greek and Hebrew languages the word for Spirit is the same word as wind and as breath? It is true. Today we celebrate the Holy Spirit blowing into our lives, changing us, sending us out to share Jesus' love with others.

Sometimes it is hard to imagine the Holy Spirit. She is the part of the Trinity that is hardest to get our minds around. And yet, the Holy Spirit is how we experience God's power, grace and forgiveness each day.

In the first creation story in Genesis, we read that the wind/Spirit/breath of God blew over the face of the waters. From the very beginning of time, the Holy Spirit has been with us. Every time you take a breath, you are breathing in the Holy Spirit. Every time you hear the wind rustling the leaves in the trees, you can celebrate that the Holy Spirit is near.

This week I challenge you to keep a lookout for the Holy Spirit. Listen for her when you take a walk. Breathe her in. Celebrate that you are never alone: the Holy Spirit is among us. Today. Yesterday. Always. Amen.

PASTORAL PRAYER, SILENT PRAYER, AND THE LORD'S PRAYER

Gracious God, your Holy Spirit hovered over the waters at creation. You made a world that was breath-taking and life-giving. And yet, we confess that brokenness and sin invaded our world and shattered the peace. Pollution, disease, and natural disasters plague our fragile earth.

Whispering God, we humbly ask that you quiet our busy hearts and minds that we might hear your word for us this day. SILENCE

All of this we pray in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray...

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Acts 2:1-21

(NRSV)

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. ² And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴ All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

⁵ Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. ⁷ Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸ And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹ Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹ Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." ¹² All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one

another, "What does this mean?" ¹³ But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. ¹⁵ Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶ No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

¹⁷ 'In the last days it will be, God declares,

that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh,

and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,

and your young men shall see visions,

and your old men shall dream dreams.

¹⁸ Even upon my slaves, both men and women,

in those days I will pour out my Spirit;

and they shall prophesy.

¹⁹ And I will show portents in the heaven above

and signs on the earth below,

blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

²⁰ The sun shall be turned to darkness

and the moon to blood.

before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.

²¹ Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Today is an incredibly important day in the church calendar. It is Pentecost: The day in which we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit pouring into our lives. It is the day when the dry dust of our own bones is raised to new life and new hope. It is the day when we are **sent out** to spread the good news of the risen Christ.

For centuries, Christians have considered Pentecost to be the birthday of the church. Up until the day of Pentecost, those earliest followers of Jesus had banded together after Jesus' death, resurrection

and ascension to heaven. But they did not know what to do next. Then along came the Holy Spirit whooshing in their hearts and lives, setting them on fire for the good news. Once the Holy Spirit came upon them, they were filled with passion to share the gospel/the good news of Jesus: good news for you, for me, for all of humanity.

Pentecost is considered the birthday of the church because at the moment the Holy Spirit touched those believers, they did set out to share the good news, creating communities of believers the world over.

To celebrate Pentecost, many churches, like ours, encourage their people to wear red at Pentecost. Red for the Holy Spirit. Red for the flames of fire that touched not only those earliest believers, but each of us also. Some congregations have balloons in the pews and eat birthday cake. So, today, to celebrate Pentecost, I am going to read you a story by Ann Weems called "Happy Birthday, Church!"

There was once a church that had only party rooms: the Council's Party Room, the Music Party Room, the Feasting Party Room, the Do Justice Party Room, the Love Mercy Party Room, the Touch Lepers Party Room. In the center of the building was a large round room with an altar and a cross: God's Party Room.

There was in the church an air of festivity and brightness that could not be denied. The people outside the church pointed their finger and shook their heads: "Something should be done about that church!" They were especially upset when they saw that the members wore party hats and smiles both inside and outside the church.

Other congregations came to take a look and were shocked when they saw this church having so much fun during a worship service, snapping their fingers and dancing.

"Sacrilegious," screamed the crowd. But the people in the church just smiled at them and went right on doing things like taking people in wheelchairs to the park and playing ball with them.

When everybody else was collecting canned goods for the poor, this church bought pizza and marched right into dingy, dirty, paint-peeling apartments and sat down to eat with the tenants.

They held picnics for the old folks home, and old men ran races while the congregation stamped their feet in applause. It was at one of these picnics that some of the members climbed up on a roof and shouted, "Good News!"

"Now we can get them for disturbing the peace," said one of the outsiders. The police arrived with sirens, ready for the arrest, and came out two hours later wearing party hats and smiles.

One Sunday afternoon, the entire congregation met at the jail and passed out flowers to the prisoners. The following week after bread and wine and much laughter at the Lord's Table, the people went to the hospital and asked to see the dying patients. They held their hands and mopped their brows and spoke to them of life.

"Disgraceful," shouted the crowd. "They must be stopped." So, the crowd appealed to the governing body of the denomination, and this committee of respectful people went to see for themselves.

"Do you deny the charges of heresy?" asked the committee. "Do you deny that you've mocked the church and the Lord?" The people of the church looked in to the stern red faces and smiled at them. They held out their hands to the committee and led them to the Birthday Cake Room. There on the table sat a large cake decorated beautifully in doves descending and red flames and works that read, "Happy Birthday, Church!" The people began cutting cake and blowing up balloons and handing out party hats to the committee members.

"Wait! Wait!" cried the chairperson. "Can't you take anything seriously?"

"Yes," said the people. "We take our commitment to the Lord very seriously indeed."

"You don't take it seriously at all," interrupted the chairperson in a loud voice and red face. "You have parties and wear silly hats and blow up balloons and sing and dance and have fun. Do you call that commitment?"

The people smiled at the chairperson and asked him if he'd like a glass of wine. The chairperson hit his fist on the table. "I don't want wine, and I don't want birthday cake. We're here to reprimand you. We're here to show you that you are wrong. Can't you be serious?"

"We are," said the people. "We're asking you to take communion with us."

"With birthday cake?" screamed the chairperson. "Outrageous!"

"Outrageous? We ask you to sit at our table and sup with us. God gave the Holy Spirit to the believers, and that is something to celebrate! It is an occasion for a party. We are celebrants of the gift of Life. We are community. We are God's church. Why are your faces red when we are trying to do justice and love mercy? Why do you shake your fists at us when we are trying to discover the hurting and begin the healing? We are overjoyed that we can be the church, a community of people, who are many, yet one—who are different, but who walk together and welcome any who would walk with us. When we weep there is someone to weep with us and to affirm us and to take us to a party. When we see injustices, we must be about God's business of freeing the oppressed. When we are faithless, we have God's promise of forgiveness. Isn't it remarkable that we can be God's good news? Is it any wonder we have a church full of party rooms? There is so much love to celebrate!"

The committee stared at the people, and the people moved closer to them and put their arms around them. The committee chairperson stepped up to the table and sliced a piece of birthday cake, took a bite, and laughed out loud. He began slicing and passing it out.

When the wine was poured and the hands were held, the chairperson raised his glass and said, "There is so much Love to celebrate! Happy Birthday Church."

My dear friends, this is how church can and should be. May our celebrations be so joyful that others cannot help but join us. Amen.

- ☐ One finger nail or toe nail clipper removed from the package
- ☐ One bath size bar of soap in the wrapper
- ☐ One toothbrush in the package
- ☐ Ten standard size Band-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each Hygiene Kit just prior to its journey.



Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Handi Wipes or Easy Wipes)
One 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
One 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
One 12-16 oz. bottle of household cleaner that can be mixed with water
(no spray bottles)
One package of 48-50 clothespins
Clothesline, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
Five dust masks
Two pairs heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free, non-
surgical)
One pair work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll and
removed from carton
One 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent

All cleaning items must be new— all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.
