Dear St. Paul Church Family and Friends,

Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ: our Savior and Friend.

This past Sunday in worship, we celebrated Trinity Sunday. As Christians, we affirm that God comes to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Masking in worship is now a personal choice. We affirm both the masked and unmasked folk as we gather to worship God through the Risen Christ.

Even with Covid19 restrictions lifted, we will continue to livestream worship and send the weekly worship mailing.

This coming Sunday, we partake in the Sacrament of Holy Communion. We will also dedicate our St. Paul Community Playground to God. Following worship, the Discipleship Team will host a reception in the Playground.

As a reminder, our sanctuary is fully air conditioned as the weather warms up.

On Wednesday, June 9, children and parents of all ages are invited at 10:00 a.m. for activities in our Playground. We invite participants to bring a sack lunch/snacks, water bottles, tennis shoes or sandals. All are welcome.

At May's Church Council meeting, we voted to work with a local construction company to replace the steeple roof. Council agreed on a metal roof for the steeple and the cost is estimated to be between \$52,000-\$60,000. While this is NOT our Project of the Year, we will begin raising funds.

We are also hoping to purchase and spread mulch in our landscaping beds. While we have not taken any bids for this, we are estimating the cost will be between \$700 and \$1000. If you would like to donate toward the purchase of mulch, please mark your financial donation "mulch."

Included in this mailer is a giving envelope. Your ongoing financial support of St. Paul Church keeps the many ministries and missions going strong.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 3:20-35.

In the opening chapters of Mark, Jesus has already cast out demons and healed lepers and others with physical ailments, but scribes said he did this work on behalf of demons. To this accusation, Jesus states in the strongest terms possible that such a position is wrong. It is one thing not to see God's liberating work at play in the world. It is another to dare to call it the work of evil. The good news is that Jesus' work of healing (same word for salvation in the Greek language) is real and is meant to bless and save lives. In our age of divided loyalties and accusations, Jesus' words are a good warning to us not to judge others too harshly. Even though you may not see it, they may be doing the work of God to free lives and reconcile relationships. It is a sobering thought for sobering times. When have you felt that someone was acting in a way opposed to God's work in the world? Explain.

Pray: God of power and might, in Christ's name help us to recognize your healing work in the world and be part of reconciling relationships. Amen.

SERVICE



A life of service begins with an attitude of humility and repentance. Psalm 130:1-2 states, "Out of the depths I cry to you, O LORD. Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to the voice of my supplication." We are asking God to hear our cry for help and our cry for forgiveness. God hears our prayers. Pray either alone or with others as you ask for God to hear your prayer of repentance so that you can be a loving servant.



CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Today our New Testament lesson from the Gospel of Luke tells the story of an unnamed woman (at least unnamed in Luke's gospel) anointing Jesus' feet with nard—an oil/perfume used in ancient times to show honor and reverence.

Today's scripture tells us that nard (from the spikenard plant) was very expensive. Why? Because it was imported to the Holy Land from the Himalayan Mountains of China, Nepal and India. The oil of nard was expressed from the roots of the plant.

After Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension to heaven, the early church used anointing oil as part of the Sacrament of Baptism. Typically, new Christians were baptized at dawn on Easter Sunday. Baptism took place by immersion—all the way into the water—symbolic of dying to the old life/rising in Christ. Upon coming out of the water, these brand new Christians were given honey on their lips (having now entered the Promised Land/Land of Milk and Honey). They were also anointed with oil—a reminder that their baptism signified their entry into the priesthood of believers: anointed/ordained for service to others.

While we no longer keep these traditions of honey on the lips, baptism by immersion, and anointing for Christian service, today, following worship, I will offer to you anointing. I have a bottle of nard with me. If you would like to be anointed with anointing oil either on your head or back of your hand, find me near the narthex and I will anoint you for service to Jesus Christ, our Savior and Friend. Amen.

"I anoint you with oil in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

Open us to the wonder of your word that we might share your good news with others. Nourish us with your grace that we might feed those who are hungry in this community and beyond.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 7:36-8:3

(NRSV)

One of the Pharisees asked Jesus to eat with him, and he went to into the Pharisee's house and took his place at the table. And a woman in the city, who was a sinner, having learned that he was eating in the Pharisee's house, brought an alabaster jar of ointment. She stood behind him at his feet, weeping, and began to bathe his feet with her tears and to dry them with her hair. Then she continued kissing his feet and anointing them with the ointment. Now when the Pharisee who had invited him saw it, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and what kind of woman this is who is touching him—that she is a sinner." Jesus spoke up and said to him, "Simon, I have something to say to you." "Teacher," he replied, "speak." "A certain creditor had two debtors; one owed five hundred denarii and the other fifty. When they could not pay, he cancelled the debts for both of them. Now which of them

will love him more?" Simon answered, "I suppose the one for whom he canceled the greater debt." And Jesus said to him, "You have judged rightly." Then turning toward the woman, he said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave me no water for my feet, but she has bathed my feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. You gave me no kiss, but from the time I came in she has not stopped kissing my feet. You did not anoint my head with oil, but she has anointed my feet with ointment. Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little." Then he said to her, "Your sins are forgiven." But those who were at the table with him began to say among themselves, "Who is this, who even forgives sins?" And he said to the woman, "Your faith has saved you; go in peace."

Soon afterwards he went on through cities and villages, proclaiming and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God. The twelve were with him, as well as some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, and Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, and Susanna, and many others, who provided for them out of their resources.

RESPONSE

SERMON

Because women's stories in the Bible have been overlooked for centuries, I'm particularly fond of the ones that made it into our canon. And today's reading from the Gospel of Luke is a favorite.

Clearly, the story of a woman who anointed Jesus with expensive, extravagant ointment was cherished by the early church. In all four gospels there is a story of a woman who, at a dinner party, comes and anoints Jesus' feet with a jar of expensive ointment. You might want to look at all four stories to compare them. When you do, you'll see that the woman is portrayed differently: by name and by whether she is shamed or honored. In each case somebody protests the use of such a valuable substance for anointing Jesus. In each story, Jesus' credentials as a

prophet or as a socially-minded person are called into question. And in each telling of this story, Jesus defends the action of the woman.

As we've come to expect from the four gospel portraits of Jesus, each is a little different, and one is very different. Usually when we say that, we expect the "very different one" to be John, but with this story John hangs with the majority. In this case, it is Luke who takes this story in a different direction.

Luke is the only one who doesn't put this well-remembered story immediately before Jesus' passion. He doesn't put it so close to Jesus' death that we make the connection between the anointing and the preparation for burial. In his portrait of Jesus, Luke paints with a color of his own creation. He creates a new color by taking this story of anointing, placing it in the house of a Pharisee, mixing it with a parable and other teachings, to give us a startling image of forgiveness projected directly from the heart of God.

All accounts of this story agree that the ointment the woman used to anoint Jesus wasn't just expensive: it was extravagant. It was so pricey that those who witnessed the act of anointing were shocked, so shocked they remembered it well and kept it in the memory of the church. It is the extravagance of the story that draws us in and makes us pay attention.

Luke makes the connection between this extravagantly unexpected action in Simon's house to something that's extravagantly unexpected about God. For Jews at the time like Simon, God had been taught as one who cannot endure sinners but saves only those like Simon who uphold the laws of God in all their purity. But, Jesus teaches a different lesson. He says that the depth of gratitude is proportional to a person's need for forgiveness. The math is so simple, even Simon cannot disagree.

Luke connects grace and gratitude together as Jesus reveals himself to be the one who has God's authority to forgive sins and as the one who shares God's generous intention to heal life and restore broken relationships. For a creditor to forgive a debt simply out of grace is indeed extravagant.

So I wonder: is this forgiveness too extravagant to be doable for we wobbly Christians? Let's face it, as Christians, we lean more toward Simon's interpretation of scripture, toward his understanding of what God

is like. Judgement rather than forgiveness simply seems more practical in the real world.

I guess that's the tough challenge for us whenever we smell that extravagant ointment in the air. Are the core values of the Christian life-grace, love, mercy, forgiveness--really possible in our world? Or are they simply things that we hope God will bring about one day? Or is this just wishful thinking?

I ask you today: Have you witnessed extravagant love given by ordinary people like the woman who anointed Jesus' feet? Maybe. Maybe not.

Just because things are unbelievable or seem impossible, doesn't mean they aren't both real and possible. This is Jesus' message--with God all things are possible. Jesus shows us what grace and forgiveness look like, what it can be like. The tough sell is that extravagance never seems practical and it seldom seems like good stewardship. It's hard not to side with the protestors in the story--this ointment could have been sold and the money given to the poor.

Truly, there's a thin line between extravagance and wastefulness. As Christian disciples, we are still shocked to realize that we have been claimed and called by a God who is unapologetically extravagant. This is God's way and we glimpse it in other Biblical passages like the story of the Prodigal Son and Christ's giving of his whole self on the cross.

God's dream is that this extravagance will be the anchor of your life too. As Christians we are called to give ALL—rather than what we might deem as "enough." As Christians, we are called to set aside our prejudices and judgmental ways in order to extravagantly love, extravagantly give. We are called to transform the world, one alabaster jar at a time.

Let us pray. O God who makes all things possible: we confess that we love to sing about your amazing grace but often doubt that it can be real for us. We often treat stories of forgiveness as if they are fairy tales. Make us as extravagant and generous toward our neighbors as you are toward us. Help us to celebrate with joy rather than nervously counting the cost. Thank you for all the ways you anoint us with the oil of gladness this day and forevermore. Amen.

INVITATION: Beloved in Jesus Christ, the Holy Communion we are about to celebrate is a feast of remembrance and of hope. We come in remembrance that our Lord Jesus Christ was sent of the Father into the world to assume our humanity and to fulfill for us all obedience to divine law, even to the bitter and shameful death of the cross. By Christ's death, resurrection, and ascension, he established a new and eternal covenant of grace and reconciliation, that we might be accepted by God and never forsaken by him. We come to this table to have communion with this same Christ, who has promised to be with us always, even to the end of the world. In the breaking of the bread he makes himself known to us as the true heavenly bread that strengthens us unto life eternal. In the cup of blessings, he comes to us as the vine, in whom we must abide to bear good fruit. We come to this table in hope, believing that this bread and this cup are a foretaste of the feast of love of which we shall partake when his kingdom has fully come. Let us pray.

COMMUNION PRAYER (unison)

Leader: God of life and all creatures, from the first day to this day you have showered us with gifts of mercy and grace. From the first

day to this day you have sent us signs and wonders, prophets and dreamers to call us to yourself and offer us your grace:

People: healing for our brokenness, release from our pain, calm for mental stress, peace for soul-grief and regret, pardon to remedy our sin, and justice to make life whole and glad.

Leader: Thanks and praise to you for all your gifts, and most of all for Jesus, our wounded risen brother and friend who abides with us here in mystery, as he abided that last night among his friends.

People: All praise and thanks to you, God of all life, now and forever. Amen.

may be the servant church of the servant Christ, in whose name we rejoice to pray. Amen.


