Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Risen Savior and Friend.

Sunday in-person worship services are going well. Masking in worship is now a personal choice. We affirm both the masked and unmasked folk as we gather to worship God through Jesus.

Even with Covid19 restrictions lifted, we will continue to livestream worship and send the weekly worship mailing.

Many of you are asking about Saturday evening worship. Our plan, at this point, is to begin the Saturday evening worship on Saturday, September 11. We'll continue to keep you in the loop as we get closer to that date.

We plan to purchase and spread mulch in our landscaping beds. While we have not taken any bids for this, we are estimating the cost will be between \$700 and \$1000. It is with joy we can share with you that the steeple roofing project is now fully funded! We are now able to sign the contract with Nitro Roofing to start the process. Thank you!

While we did not hold Art Camp last summer and we will not host it this summer, we are hosting a Summer Safari Carnival: Let's Reconnect on Wednesday, July 21 from 5:00-8:00 p.m. This event will be held in our St. Paul Community Playground and will include a meal, crafts, games and music. The Carnival is free to all participants and we expect 500+ people to attend. We will need lots of volunteers. If you'd like to assist, please contact Pastor Becky.

As a reminder, Pastor Becky's final three weeks of her 2019 sabbatical will begin on Monday June 28. She will return to the office on Monday July 19. Guest preachers will lead worship in her absence.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 4:35-41.

The disciples are beside themselves with fear. The wind is howling; the waves are crashing over their little boat in a large and churning sea. It seemed like the end for them all. They wake up Jesus with a chorus of screaming cries, "Don't you care that we are going to die?" Jesus describes this as an example of having no faith. After noting their serious limitations as disciples, he calms the wind and the sea. At this point in the story, Jesus exits the discussion and the disciples simply marvel at the power of their teacher. This is the scene of the life of faith. It, too, is a kind of parable, the kind that Jesus had just told his followers. A living and real faith is like being on the waters and vacillating between sheer fear and trembling and simple awe. Although the full breadth of faith experiences from disbelief to true adoration is hard to fathom, it is the life we live. Jesus knows this; Jesus accepts this; Jesus leads us from valley lows to mountain highs with the same understanding, love, and saving grace. When have you experienced serious doubts in your faith? When have you experienced the pure joy of being a follower of Jesus?

Pray: Almighty God, we thank you for your mercy that cares for us day and night with power and grace through Christ Jesus our Savior and Lord. Amen.

Pray for those who work on the seas including those who fish as well as those who provide security as part of the Coast Guard and Navy.


RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



CHILDREN'S MOMENT

Do you remember the story of the Three Little Pigs? When I was young, I loved that story. Today, I'm going to retell it, and when I do, every

time I say, "pig" I need you to "oink." Whenever I say "wolf" I need you to "howl." Whenever I say "sheep" you need to "baaa."

The story begins with the mama pig (Oink) sending her three little ones out into the world to make their fortunes. The first little pig (Oink) built himself a house of straw. The second little pig (Oink) built a house of sticks, and a third little pig (Oink) built a house of bricks.

The big, bad wolf (Howl) went to the first little pig's (Oink) house and knocked on the door, saying, "Little pig (Oink), little pig (Oink), let me in."

The first little pig (Oink) answered, "Not by the hair on my chinny chin."

"Then I'll huff and I'll puff and I'll blow your house in," replied the wolf (Howl).

The first little pig's (Oink) house of straw was not very strong, so the wolf (Howl) easily blew it down and the little pig (Oink) ran to the safety of the second little pig's (Oink) house.

Next, the wolf (Howl) went to the second little pig's (Oink) house and knocked on the door saying, "Little pig (Oink), little pig (Oink), let me in."

No matter how hard he tried, the wolf (Howl) could not blow the brick house down. Disgusted and defeated, the wolf (Howl) went home. The pigs (Oink) were so happy, they sang, "Who's afraid of the big, bad wolf?" (Howl)

There have been many stories about the big, bad wolf (Howl). You have probably heard of Little Red Riding Hood, Peter and the Wolf (Howl)

and The Boy Who Cried Wolf (Howl). But did you know that Jesus once told a story about a big, bad wolf (Howl)? In the story that Jesus told, the Good Shepherd is him, the sheep (Baaa) are us. The wolf (Howl) in Jesus' story is anything that takes us away from Jesus and his love.

Here is what Jesus said in the Bible, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep (Baaa). The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep (Baaa), sees the wolf (Howl) coming and leaves the sheep (Baaa) and runs away."

This is good news for each of us. Jesus is the Good Shepherd. We are his sheep (Baaa). Jesus knows us and loves us. He will protect us when there is danger and look for us when we wander and get lost. Because of Jesus, we can sing, "Who's afraid of the big, bad wolf?" (Howl). Because of Jesus, we do not need to be afraid. Amen.

And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Psalm 23

(NRSV)

The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want. He makes me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside still waters; he restores my soul. He leads me in right paths for his name's sake.

Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff—the comfort me.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 10:1-18

(NRSV)

Jesus said, "Very truly I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters the gate is the sheepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he had brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because the hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as he Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Each Sunday, we sit in this gorgeous sanctuary surrounded by the symbols of our faith. Over the years, we have worked as a congregation to have each of these beautiful windows restored. Today, as you have probably guessed from the scripture lessons, we turn our gaze to the window of Jesus as the Good Shepherd.

My guess is that for many of us, the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is perhaps one of our earliest childhood memories from Sunday School. Today's scripture lessons dovetail one another: we hear in the 23rd Psalm: The Lord is my Shepherd. In our reading from John, we hear Jesus proclaiming that he is the Good Shepherd.

From the Greek translation of the word "good" for Good Shepherd, we hear that good also means "model" or "true." Indeed, Jesus is our

model shepherd—modeling for us what it means to be servant people in our world. Also, Jesus is our true shepherd; he isn't fake or watereddown. With Jesus, we have the real deal—the anointed one and suffering servant.

Scholars are quick to point out that much of our lesson from the Gospel of John is based on an Old Testament text: Ezekiel 34. In that text, the shepherds of the land have utterly failed, so God steps in as the Good Shepherd. In this single chapter from Ezekiel, we hear that God, as the Good Shepherd, has at least four specific functions:

- 1. Caring for the sheep
- 2. Rescuing sheep from scattered places
- 3. Feeding the sheep
- 4. Tending the weak, injured and lost sheep

Now how is that for Good News??? We are reminded that God cares for us, rescues us when we are lost, feeds us, and takes care of us when we are weak or injured. Now, I don't know about you, but there are many, many days when I need rescuing and tending by God. There are many days when I am weak and injured and in need of Christ's grace.

Think for a moment in your life when you felt adrift and lost. What was going on? How did you respond? What was your prayer during this time? How did you move through that lonely space?

My guess is that you might NOT necessarily say that Christ carried you through, but that you might say that a friend was there for you. Or perhaps you read the perfect book at a dark time. Or perhaps a prayer or a hymn anchored your days, giving you strength and assurance.

The good news for us today is that we can be Christ to one another. What we say, how we respond to people, what we do, might be the only gospel a person reads in a day. St. Frances of Assisi is often given credit for this quotation: Preach the gospel always and, if necessary, use words.

Preach the gospel always and, if necessary, use words. As Christians the very best evangelism we can offer to others is to live fully the gospel of Jesus Christ: to care for the weak, rescue the scattered, feed the hungry, and care for those who feel unloved.

We know that this isn't easy to do. Several years ago, the United Church of Christ did a television commercial blitz of the St. Louis area.

The commercial began with a little girl saying, "Here is the church. Here is the steeple. Open the doors and see all the people."

The rest of the commercial included shots of a variety of people: young old, black, white, brown, gay, straight, disabled, differently abled, each saying one after the other, "All the people..."

The commercial ended with: "God accepts all the people. So do we: The United Church of Christ. No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here."

And that is where it gets difficult. If we are to be the gospel—the good news of Christ Jesus for others—we need to welcome people as they are, not as we want to fix them or make them into our image. We need to love and care for and tend and feed all God's people—not merely the ones of whom we approve.

Jesus as the Good Shepherd reminds us that not only is Christ OUR Shepherd, he is the Good Shepherd for all of God's people.

In today's reading from the Gospel of John, Jesus takes upon himself the role of the good, true, and model shepherd and then takes it a step further. Echoing the prophet Zechariah (13:7-9), Jesus, as the Good Shepherd, not only cares, rescues, feeds and tends us. He also is willing to lay his life down for his sheep.

We are Jesus' sheep. Jesus, our Good Shepherd, lays down his life for the sake of the flock. Today we are challenged to journey with Jesus who calls us his own and offers his life that we might know life.

Author and theologian, Flora Slossen Wuellner, in her short book, <u>Prayer Stress and our Inner Wounds</u>, tells a childhood memory of Jesus as the Good Shepherd:

A picture that was hung in my room when I was a child changed my life. It was a picture of a shepherd climbing down a rugged cliffside; with one hand he gripped a rock and with the other he reached down for a sheep that had fallen to a ledge below. Its face looked up in terror and trust. A bird of prey circled overhead. I could not see the shepherd's face as he strained down to the sheep, but I could see the knotted muscles, the bleeding hands, and arms gashed by thorns, the twisted garment torn in the steep descent.

"That's the Good Shepherd. That's Jesus," my parents told me.

I stared in amazement. This picture was very different from the one of the Good Shepherd on the wall of my Sunday school room. In that one a placid shepherd in a spotless white robe strolled along a grassy level path, carrying an equally spotless and placid lamb.

The shepherd in my picture was paying a real and painful price. I could see from the concentrated body and the compassionate authority of the outstretched hand that to reach the hurt and crying animal mattered more to him than anything else in the world. And I knew as I gazed at that picture that the sheep would be reached, held, healed, and lifted to life.

Now how cool is that? Like our window, the Good Shepherd, whom we follow, leads us when our lives are going well, when we are healthy and clean and the sun is shining. AND, the Good Shepherd also seeks us and rescues us when we have fallen off a cliff, when we walk through the Valley of the Shadow of Death and in the presence of our enemies. The Good Shepherd lays down his life that we might have life and live abundantly.

For many of us, this past year has been a somber time. Many of us have lost loved ones. Many of us are recovering from illness. Many of us have known incredible loss over this past year. And yet. And yet, the good news for us today is that Jesus is our Good Shepherd who cares for us, feeds us, heals us, and sacrifices himself for the life of the flock.

This is the Savior we follow. Because of Jesus, we are called to make the way of the cross our way of life, to be Christ to others, and to be people of radical welcome and hospitality.

The Shepherd is calling us. Now is the time to follow him. Amen.


