DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 6:1-13.

Jesus goes to his hometown and is astonished at the people's lack of trust and belief in him. Because of that, he was only able to use his power to heal a few sick people. The townspeople rejected his authority. Ironically, that same authority is given to his disciples and they are able to go out and do many great deeds of casting out demons and curing the sick. This passage makes at least three important points about discipleship: 1) followers of Jesus will experience the same rejection Jesus did, 2) Jesus' authority is enough to do great things in the reign of God, and 3) disciples go out defenseless, without needing extra provisions and depend on the hospitality and kindness of strangers. The third point is a difficult one for us today. We would rather be the host. However, Jesus calls us to receive the help and kindness of others, especially the stranger who welcomes us in and takes care of us. In our weakness, God's power is revealed. When have you been blessed by being the recipient of the hospitality of others, especially someone you don't know well?

Pray: Dear God, in human frailty and need your power is made known. Bless us in our relationships with others that your love may be made known through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



It is a valuable gift to host others in your home. However, it is also an important gift to the outreach of the church to accept the hospitality of others. When have you been a guest of another person's hospitality? Did you feel you were the recipient of God's love as you received the hospitality of others? Explain.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Psalm 123 is a psalm for people making a pilgrimage to the temple in Jerusalem. Identify sacred places in your own pilgrimage or faith journey on earth as a follower of Jesus. Maybe it is a place in your own home, congregation, or the home of a loved one. Talk or think about what you like to do in that sacred space, and give thanks for God's presence in your life. Conclude by praying: God of glory and might, thank you for revealing yourself to us and for special places that make us feel especially close to you through Jesus Christ, your Son, our

Lord. Amen.


MOMENT FOR MISSION: Community Backpack+ and Washington UCC Back to School Ministry

It appears very likely that schools in Ohio will have a "normal" school year after one that was disrupted by the pandemic and included many months of remote learning for some students. That was a special hardship on the disadvantaged children served by Washington UCC. That is why we are continuing to help fund their *Back to School* ministry program. With the funds, they are able to send many of their low-income children back to school, each in a uniform, if required, or new school clothes, underwear and socks, along with a backpack of school supplies and a personal hygiene kit. Our donations last year helped them to provide school uniforms for nearly 25 students in the Camp Washington community.

Continually, in the month of July we will also be helping The Community Backpack+ Program. The Community Backpack+ Programs have come together each year to ensure that all students in our community have the supplies needed to start each school year. In addition, they donate toward school fees for those who cannot afford them, and fund the local "No-Shame Lunch Fund." The, "No-shame Lunch fund," guarantees that every student in the New Bremen, New Knoxville, and Minster school districts, receives a complete daily lunch, regardless of the balance in their lunch account. In 2020, we supplied backpacks/school supplies to 40 needy students. We were also able to pay off all New Bremen Local School's unpaid school fees, totaling \$1114.50

On average for both organizations it is estimated that each student's average annual needs are \$75.00 per student. So, throughout the month we will be equally sharing the gifts that are donated to provide uniforms and hygiene kits to the children at Camp Washington and school supplies for the students in our community. Gifts at any level are welcomed, and will make a great impact on the children in these communities. Thank you, the Mission Team.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Ezekial 2:1-5 (NRSV)

2 He said to me: O mortal, stand up on your feet, and I will speak with you. ² And when he spoke to me, a spirit entered into me and set me on my feet; and I heard him speaking to me. ³ He said to me, Mortal, I am sending you to the people of Israel, to a nation of rebels who have rebelled against me; they and their ancestors have transgressed against

me to this very day. ⁴ The descendants are impudent and stubborn. I am sending you to them, and you shall say to them, "Thus says the Lord God." ⁵ Whether they hear or refuse to hear (for they are a rebellious house), they shall know that there has been a prophet among them.

GOSPEL LESSON: Mark 6:1-13

(NRSV)

6 He left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. ² On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! ³ Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. ⁴ Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." ⁵ And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. ⁶ And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. ⁷ He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸ He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; ⁹ but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. ¹⁰ He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. ¹¹ If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." ¹² So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. ¹³ They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God!

People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

The philosopher Soren Kierkegaard once told a story about a circus that caught fire. The flames from the fire spread to the fields surrounding the circus grounds and began to burn toward the village below.

The circus master, convinced that the village would be destroyed and the people killed unless they were warned, asked if there was anybody who could go to the village and warn the people. The clown, dressed in full costume, jumped on a bicycle and sped down the hill to the village. "Run for your lives! Run for your Lives! A fire is coming and the village is going to burn"! he shouted as he rode up and down the streets of the village. "The village is going to burn! Run for your lives!"

Curious villagers came out from their houses and shops and stood along the sidewalks. They shouted back to the clown, laughing and applauding his performance. The more desperately the clown shouted, the more the villagers cheered.

The village burned and the loss of life was great because nobody took the clown seriously. After all, he was just a clown.

Jesus began teaching in the synagogue of his hometown and the people were amazed. They responded to him in disbelief. They could not wrap their minds around it. After all he was just a carpenter from a local family. And Jesus, who had been doing miraculous deeds everywhere he went, was nearly powerless to help anyone in the town because of their disbelief. And the loss was surely great. The statement that comes from this text is still used today, a prophet is not honored in his hometown.

You know that's true. You know that a messenger has to have authority and validity and if it is someone you grew up with, played ball with, got into mischief with, then it is hard to see the grown-up bearer of news as anything but the person with whom you are most familiar. What does he know—he always got in trouble, what does she know, she was the snippy little girl with the big ego who always had better Barbies and a shinier bike. It's hard to take them seriously. That is exactly why most preachers do not go back to their home church and become their pastor. Shortly after I settled into Buckland UCC, my home church in Toledo called. They were searching for a pastor and asked if I would come back and serve there. I said no—it is hard to be prophetic with someone who wiped your nose when you were three years old!

It is a classic story and we can identify with it because most of us have experienced rejection of our ideas, actions, wisdom, thoughts or words of encouragement from those who know us best, our families, our friends, our neighbors, maybe even our spouses. Well, we are in good company knowing that even Jesus was rejected by those who knew him as a child, as growing up in the village, as the son of their neighbors, the brother of their friends.

In fact, don't we get sort of a perverse pleasure out of the failures of great people? Well, maybe not really that, but we do seem to find it ironic and even encouraging at times that some who are accomplished in so many things can also fail miserably. We even marvel at the inner strength that propels them forward in spite of their failure. It might just spur us lowly folks on to greater things. When we compare ourselves to great people they seem even more like us in their failures than in their successes.

However, the fact that Jesus was rendered nearly powerless by the people's disbelief is somewhat disturbing if you think about it. Barbara Brown Taylor, author and Episcopal Priest uses a powerful metaphor to illustrate this for us. Jesus was still Jesus she says, but the people—then and now—have to be open to him and his transformative power. She compares it to the frustrating experience of trying to light a match to a pile of wet sticks. She also compares the crowds in the synagogue to us. After all, we are the church and claim Jesus as our own, but how faithful and open are we to Jesus transformative power in our lives? Does this knowledge of Jesus' rejection seem contradictive to what we know otherwise of this man, or does it encourage and transform us?

This is the first story of the gospel text this morning. Perhaps you may have noticed that in Mark there is often more than one story woven together to make a point or teach a lesson that helps to answer the question, "Who is this man Jesus?" Today's text does that too. The second story is the call and sending of the disciples, but both stories have to do with the acceptance or rejection of Jesus or his representatives. And each in its own way lets us know more about Jesus, fully human, fully divine.

Fully human, a carpenter, a craftsman, known and respected in that capacity. Fully divine, able to perform miracles that only God can do,

assuming authority in sending out disciples and granting them authority to heal, cast out demons, to transform lives. But that was the sticky part for the folks who knew him—there was a substantial gulf in their minds between a craftsman who works with his hands and a rabbi who devoted his life to intellectual and spiritual pursuits. Just who is this man anyway?

Notice that when Jesus is granting the disciples authority and sending them out for ministry he is also preparing them for the possibility of rejection. If they are not accepted they should shake the dust from their sandals and move on. In that time that was a symbolic gesture used by pious Jews as they returned from a Gentile land; it symbolized separation from any clinging form of defilement. It stands as a testimony before God that the townspeople have refused to hear God's word. But it also helps the disciple bring closure to a failure and move on from it. It helps to remind us that the people of God are not to waste resources fretting over those who will not hear the word of God, nor waste time in self-absorption when things don't go as planned.

When Jesus sends us out he does not expect us to experience anything that he has not experienced. Our statement of faith in the words we profess says, "In Jesus Christ you have come to us and shared our common lot." Fully human. Jesus also gives the disciples the authority to cast out demons, to heal, to transform lives. Fully divine. Just who is this man?

Jesus also knows and understands that the very human disciples whom he sends, feeling insecure, will tend to depend upon things instead of God, and so he sends them out with very little in the way of material things. Provisions for the journey can substitute for faith if we are not careful. Eugene Peterson in "The Message" translates Jesus' words in this way. "Don't think you need a lot of extra equipment for this. You are the equipment." Challenging words for that time and for us in the church as well. Is God's grace sufficient for us?

What about it? Who is this man Jesus to you? What are <u>you</u> being called to do? Where are you being asked to go? Will you answer because Jesus is Lord of your life, or will you ignore the call because you think you know better what is good for you? Or have you refused to take the message seriously because it came to you via a messenger that you just couldn't imagine as someone sent into your life by God? One of the

things that often makes it hard for us to hear God still speaking to us is that God seems to make such appalling choices when selecting the messengers to bring the message to us!

Or maybe you refused to answer the call for fear of rejection? Maybe no one will truly appreciate what you try to do or believe what you are trying to teach? Well, you may have noticed throughout the gospel that believing is not forced on anyone. Did you notice that the disciples were not always successful—but they were always faithful. We are not called to be successful. We are called to be faithful. If we respond faithfully, if we proclaim prophetically in words AND in actions, if our words match our deeds, then we are answering God's call. We too will be given the power, we too will be equipped for the task, but the results are not up to us. God's grace is sufficient. Disappointments at being misunderstood might discourage us, feelings of failure could surely make us question God's purpose for us. But God is in charge. God has a plan and our part in it is to be faithful, knowing that God will be with us through it all, knowing that God calls up many to do the work and we are just a part of it, knowing that God's grace is sufficient.

When we can answer the question who is this Jesus by responding he is Lord of my Life then we will understand that we are a part of the mission of the church, called, equipped, and sent. We are called to support one another, to serve others, to turn the tables on all that the secular world stands for. We are called to fight against prejudice, ignorance and apathy. We are called to stand with others when they are oppressed, when they are weighed down with grief or the burdens of life. We are called to live out the Word of God, and to proclaim what God has done in our lives. If others refuse to hear it, we don't give up, we just move on believing that God will guide us to the places where we are needed. We will be open to being transformed and we will by words and actions transform other lives. That is being faithful. That is believing and acting upon the belief that Jesus is truly Lord of our lives. That is believing and knowing for certain that God's grace is sufficient for our lives no matter where we are sent, whether near or far. Know it, believe it, live it.
