Read: Mark 6:14-29.

This story of the beheading of John the Baptist at a banquet hosted by King Herod presents an image of contrasts. This story comes between last week's Gospel reading about Jesus' disciples traveling without riches or power of their own and staying with others as guests. The Gospel reading two weeks from now is about Jesus' own banquet of feeding hungry souls on a hillside. Jesus treated the people with compassion like a shepherd caring for the sheep. Jesus' rule brings people together in peace, feeds the multitudes out of love, and brings healing and an end to demonic powers. We are reminded that earthly powers and governments are not the rule that wins the day in God's universe. How does Jesus' power in your life influence your thoughts and actions?

Pray: Shepherding God, in a world that seeks to dominate and humiliate others, we thank you for your reign of love and faithfulness that will never let us go through Christ our Lord. Amen.



CHILDREN'S MOMENT

The cookies that I brought to share with you today are very special. These cookies were made from a recipe that was used for many years by a special lady named Lottie Moon. Lottie Moon lived many years ago. She grew up in a Christian home and went to church and learned about Jesus and his love.

Lottie had six brothers and sisters. One of her sisters moved another country to be a missionary. Reading the letters her sister wrote helped Lottie to come to be more interested in other cultures and decide that she

also wanted to move and be a missionary. Lottie went to college and studied to become a teacher, then went to help her sister teach the children.

When she arrived, Lottie started a school and began to hold classes to teach boys and girls to read the Bible. At first, the children were afraid of Lottie. She tried to think of a way to get the children to trust her. She decided to bake some cookies, but that didn't work. You see, the children were afraid to eat the cookies because they were afraid that they might have poison in them. One day, one of the boys was so hungry that he decided to try one of the cookies. When he didn't get sick, the other children decided to try them too. Soon, Lottie became known as "the cookie lady." After the children ate the cookies, they would talk with Lottie, hear Bible stories and learn to read.

Why do you think Lottie loved the children so much? I think it was because she believed and put into practice what Jesus taught his disciples. Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you." How much did Jesus love us? He loved us so much that he gave his life for us. Lottie loved the children of China so much that she dedicated her life to teaching them how to read and write. And, even more important, she taught them about Jesus and his love.

PASTORAL PRAYER, SILENT PRAYER, AND THE LORD'S PRAYER Our Father in heaven, we love you.

How can we *but* love you, for you are so worthy of our love. We look at the gods that men have invented and we can only conclude that none of them are worthy of love. They are small, they are capricious, they are arbitrary, they are unfair, they are unjust, they are unlovable. We could not love those gods. But we look at what you have revealed of yourself and our hearts swell, our hearts rejoice, our hearts are drawn to you. We love you because you are kind, because you are good, because you are merciful. We love you because you are slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. We love you because you are the same yesterday, today, and forever. We love you because you have first loved us. Thank you for being a God who is eminently worthy of our deepest loyalty, our highest affection.

Yet we confess, God, that we have not always loved you as we ought. Too often we have loved ourselves far more. We have chosen to do what pleases us rather than what pleases you. We have chosen to pursue our heart's desires instead of yours. Each of us was born in a state of rebellion against you and each of us deepened that rebellion as soon as we had the ability to do so. So we confess our sin and our sinfulness, the sins we have committed and our very tendency toward sin. Forgive us, Lord, for being sinners, and do forgive us for each and every transgression of your law and each and every failure to perfectly conform to it.

Thank you, Lord, that you do forgive. Thank you that you have forgiven. Thank you that you always will forgive. Thank you that your

heart is forever inclined toward forgiveness, that your love is deep and strong and true. Thank you that your love does not waver and does not whither. Thank you that you have restored the relationship that we ruined, that you have bound up all that we had broken. Thank you that you have enabled us to come to you, and thank you that you tell us to come just as we are, thank you that you receive us with arms open wide, thank you that you make us new.

And Father, you have now invited us to bring our prayers before you, to speak so you can listen and respond. And so, because you have told us to do this, we now bring our petitions. We ask first and foremost that you would receive the glory through us. We ask that we would be faithful, faithful to be who you tell us to be, faithful to value what you tell us to value, and faithful to do what you would have us do. We ask that we would live out our love for you by loving one another. We ask that we would live with kindness and patience and generosity toward one another, that we would exemplify amongst ourselves the virtues that are so perfectly seen in you. We ask that we would comfort one another in sorrow, that we would forgive one another when sinned against, that we would be slow to speak ill of one another and quick to point out any and every evidence of your grace.

We pray that we would live well in this world, as faithful neighbors, faithful employees, faithful students, faithful friends. Help us to have a good reputation in the eyes of those around us. Help us to live in a way that displays the gospel and that makes it look attractive. Help us to be quick to tell others about Jesus. Help us to carry out your work in this world, to serve as your representatives.

We ask, Lord, that you would keep us faithful, that you would preserve us to the day we see you face to face. We ask that someday we would stand together before the Throne, as brothers and sisters, now perfectly holy, rejoicing in all you are and in all you've done. Please Lord, continue to show us your love. Please Lord, continue to help us to love you as we've been so perfectly and wonderfully loved by you. SILENCE

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Ephesians 2:11-22

(NSRV)

- ¹¹ Therefore, remember that formerly you who are Gentiles by birth and called "uncircumcised" by those who call themselves "the circumcision" (which is done in the body by human hands)—
- ¹² remember that at that time you were separate from Christ, excluded from citizenship in Israel and foreigners to the covenants of the promise, without hope and without God in the world.
- ¹³ But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ.
- ¹⁴ For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility,
- ¹⁵ by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace,
- ¹⁶ and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.
- ¹⁷ He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near.
 - ¹⁸ For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.
- ¹⁹ Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household,
- ²⁰ built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone.
- ²¹ In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord.
- ²² And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God!

People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

Located in modern-day Turkey, the city of Ephesus was a large seaport city that flourished during the Roman Empire because it was a major trading center. By the time of early Christianity, Ephesus had been in existence for nearly 1000 years. Because it was a trading hub, the city already had a wide diversity of religions when Christianity began to make inroads into the area.

Scholars argue to this day whether the Letter to the Ephesians was written by Paul or not. While it follows much of Paul's line of thinking, the letter is missing personal greetings and the names of associates—so often found in Paul's authentic letters. What's more, the language in this letter differs from ones that are more closely ascribed to the Apostle Paul. For example, in Paul's letters to the Corinthians, he speaks of the Body of Christ as a metaphor on how Christians are to order their everyday lives. On the other hand, in Ephesians, the language around the Body of Christ speaks not to a specific community, but instead a larger framework to include ALL Christians everywhere.

Also, the letter is closely aligned with Colossians—seen as the possible source for the letter to the Ephesians. Scholars do agree that Paul probably never made it to Ephesus, but his letters had circulated and they came to know Christ Jesus through Paul's legacy.

In today's reading, we hear the author talking at length about the unity Jews and Gentiles have in Christ. In these twelve verses, we hear the word "peace" four times—a reminder that very often Christians are not particularly peaceful even amongst themselves. We tend to harshly judge other congregations, other Christians, other ways of following Jesus that are not like our own. The author of Ephesians was having none of this. He argues that it doesn't matter whether one is a Jew (physically circumcised) or a Gentile (uncircumcised) because we are now one in Jesus.

The author of this letter could have easily been talking to 21st Century Christians. Rarely do we value diversity of thinking and believing. So many Christian congregations are certain they have the market cornered on "truth"—and are unafraid to point fingers at the congregations that are outside of their truth. And, if you are outside the "truth," you are condemned to eternal damnation.

Pastor Becky recently read a compelling essay about the evangelical Christian response to Rob Bell's theology. Once firmly in the evangelical camp, Rob was kicked out several years ago when he wrote a book saying he didn't believe that hell exists. Over time, his theology has become more inclusive, more open and welcoming. This shift in theology has some Christians bothered to the point of being antagonistic toward Rev. Bell. As the author of the essay said, For a people whose go-to ideas are love for God and love for others, we Christians can be pretty horrible toward one another, especially to those of us who attain any sort of position in the larger culture.

What sets Christians against other Christians? Can't we simply celebrate the gift that Jesus is in our lives and then work to bring his good news of love and forgiveness to a hurting world?

The author of Ephesians certainly would agree. He (or at least the author was probably a man) argues that not only does Jesus bring peace, he has torn down the walls that once divided us. That, through Christ, we are no longer strangers to one another, but we are members of God's family.

Before Mary Traverse's death, the folk group Peter, Paul and Mary recorded a song about walls that need torn down. The words go like this:

Some walls are made of stone Sometimes we build our own. Some walls stand for years And some wash away with tears.

Some walls are lined with gold Where some hearts stay safe and cold Some walls are made of doubt Holding in and keeping out

If there's any hope for love at all some walls must fall.

Some walls are built on pride Some keep the child inside. Some walls are made in fear That love let go will disappear.

If there's any hope for love at all some walls must fall.

How will you ever know what might be found Until you let the walls come tumbling down?

If there's any hope for love at all some walls must fall.

What walls have you built in your life? Who or what are you trying to keep out? Why did you build the wall in the first place? In other words: where do your own prejudices lie? What are your places and spaces of fear and distrust?

Pastor Becky shares with us a story of a castle on the English coast owned by a landlord, but no one currently was living there. Vandals were coming in and destroying the place. So the landlord hired a contractor to build a tall rock wall around the castle. The fee was agreed upon and the contractor began his work.

But after a short time, the contractor began having trouble finding rocks for the wall. He called the owner to explain the situation. The owner sharply replied, "I don't care where you get the rocks, I want you to build that wall!"

Sometime later, the owner came to see the progress of the work, and found a beautiful and incredibly high wall. He was so impressed with the fine work the contractor had done. It was a perfect wall for his castle. But then he went on the other side of the wall he was stunned to find that there was no castle! The contractor explained, "There were all these wonderful rocks in that run-down old castle, so I used them."

When we build walls against others, that is exactly what happens. We find ourselves diminished and torn apart. As Christians, we are called to open our hearts and our lives to God's grace: which is bigger and greater than any sin, any brokenness, any prejudice, any wall. We might think we are protecting ourselves when we build our walls, that we are protecting something of value. But when the wall is built, we find that we have torn down everything of value within ourselves.

Many of us here today were alive to hear President Ronald Reagan at the Brandenburg Gate in Berlin on June 12, 1987 say to Russian Prime Minister Gorbachev, "Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall!"

You know the history. That wall between East and West Germany was torn down and the face of Europe changed overnight.

The writer of Ephesians tells us that following Jesus does the same thing in our lives—walls fall down, old prejudices fade away and we become something completely new. Through our baptisms, we find unity, peace and reconciliation in Christ. No amount of bickering between Christians can take that away. No amount of prejudice between Jews and Gentiles eliminates this. We. Are. One. In. Christ. Jesus.

Then, according to today's text, once the walls come down, we need to build something new. In the Roman Empire, new buildings were seen as signs of prosperity. The author of Ephesians says we have a different kind of building to erect. Because of Jesus, WE are God's holy temple with Jesus as the cornerstone. We are God's dwelling place. Our very bodies are sacred.

This is critically important to hear in our western society that regularly shames us about our bodies. The message we hear in commercials and see in magazine ads is that our bodies are bad. That we are too fat, too skinny, too old, too young, too tall, too short, too lazy, not good enough. The message we hear over and over is that our bodies are shameful. Friends, that kind of talk needs to be stopped right here. Right now. YOU are God's dwelling place. Your body is sacred space for the Holy.

Starting this day, this hour, I challenge you to love yourself, love your body completely and wholly, because you are God's house, God's holy Temple.

Perhaps this should be the starting point to Christian unity. That when we begin to see each other as God's dwelling place, differences melt away. When we invite Christ to take up residence in our hearts, the desire to judge others melts away. When we live each day, knowing that we are guided by the Holy Spirit, walls come tumbling down.

How does this happen? Because of Jesus. Because he loves each of us (and all of humanity/all of creation) so much that he took up OUR crosses that we might be redeemed, reconciled and made new. **We** can't tear the walls down, but Jesus can.

So here is your good news for the coming week: Jesus has already torn down your walls. It is now your task to step onto the other side and start your new life in him. Amen.


