MOMENT FOR MISSION

St. Paul Church's monthly mission for August focuses on providing food for refugees—especially refugees who have fled the years' long conflict in Syria. The food typically provided by aid agencies for refugees is woefully lacking in both nutrition and calories.

This month, St. Paul Church will join Church World Service in a Ration Challenge. The Mission Team challenges you to commit to eating for one week in August only the food provided to Syrian refugees.

There are many ways you can participate in the Ration Challenge. First, you can pick up a ration food pack in the front of the sanctuary or in the church office, eating what is provided for one week. The money you save can go toward our monthly mission. Another option is to commit to eating the rations while soliciting sponsors to help raise funds. In this instance, the more money you raise, the more food you can add to your diet/challenges.


A third option is to choose your own diet—especially if you have dietary restrictions. And finally, you could opt not to do the physical eating challenge, but instead give financially toward this monthly mission.

\$225 per refugee per year through Church World Service supplements a Syrian refugee's rations. Our hope is that we can raise enough money this month to feed at least one family, if not two or three families.



NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Ephesians 6:10-20 (NSRV)

Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. ¹¹ Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. ¹² For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. ¹³ Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. ¹⁴ Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. ¹⁵ As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the

gospel of peace. 16 With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. 17 Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

¹⁸ Pray in the Spirit at all times in every prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert and always persevere in supplication for all the saints. 19 Pray also for me, so that when I speak, a message may be given to me to make known with boldness the mystery of the gospel, 20 for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it boldly, as I must speak.

RESPONSE

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang I'll be honest—I have always struggled with today's scripture passage—particularly with its militaristic language that seems to run counter to the entire letter which values the importance of unity and peace. And oddly enough, this particularly passage has been used by Christians and scholars for centuries to justify violence and war. You can even go to Christian stores and buy children's suits of armor called the Armor of God. (Even though Jesus told his followers to turn the other cheek and love their enemies).

But when you layer this passage with the entirety of Ephesians, there seems to be a very different understanding of today's passage.

Early Jesus believers—whether Jew or Gentile--lived primarily under Roman rule. Early Christians were soon kicked out of the synagogue for bringing in too many Gentiles. These Jesus people were persecuted by the Romans for refusing to bow down to the emperor, for refusing to serve in the military, for not worshipping the Roman gods.

Christians throughout the Roman Empire would know exactly how a Roman infantry soldier would be dressed: with sword, shield, breastplate and shoes. The writer of Ephesians (who was probably not the Apostle Paul—probably written after Paul's death), took that imagery of the Roman soldier and turned it upside down for Christians.

Early Jesus people were people of peace and justice for the widow and orphan. They clothed themselves with love rather than armor. So, the writer of Ephesians challenges these young believers to gird themselves in a completely opposite way of the ubiquitous Roman soldiers. What's more, the writer tied each of the pieces of armor to Old Testament passages:

Belt of Truth (see Isaiah 11:5)

Breastplate of Righteousness (see Isaiah 19:17)

Sandals to go out and proclaim peace (see Isaiah 52:7)

Shield of Faith (see Wisdom of Solomon 5:19)

Helmet of Salvation (see Isaiah 59:17)

A Sword (which is actually the word of God)

(see Wisdom of Solomon 5:20)

The writer of Ephesians reminds those early believers (and each of us) that we need to put on our faith and wear it well when out and about in the community. As Christians, we are called by God to be people of peace—not jamming the gospel down the throats of nonbelievers or even going to war over differences. Instead, we are challenged and called to live in such a way, to be metaphorically clothed in such a way, that people experience the peace of Christ through us.

This we know. Violence begets violence. Peace begets peace. The Jesus whom we follow calls us to take a radically different road in life—one that helps, not harms. And that includes what we say, what we do, and how we live.

Let me tell you about peacemaking on a global scale. In the summer of 1993 a newly formed organization called Seeds for Peace gathered Israeli and Palestinian teens in the state of Maine to begin dialogues and friendships between two groups of people at war over the same plots of land. The teens were then invited to the White House to witness the signing of the Oslo Accords that September between Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Palestinian Leader Yasser Arafat.

And what is incredible is that the camp continues to thrive—despite the violence in the Middle East. Each summer, young people come together at camp to eat, sleep, play and learn to live together as well as talk over the conflict in their homeland. This summer, because of the pandemic, the camp will be offered in both Boston and Maine—inviting students and educators to take part.

Since that first camp nearly a quarter of a century ago, more than 5000 teenagers have participated in Seeds of Peace camp. And this is what the organizers have discovered: more than half of those camp graduates grow up to take leadership roles in their careers, while still working toward peace.

In the west African nation of Burkina Faso, a new kind of peace is unrolling at one of the toughest, roughest prisons in this tiny nation. Professional dancer Aguibou Bougobali Sanou or Bouba as he is commonly known, began to teach prisoners how to dance as a way to work through their rage, their trauma, their emotions. Bouba's vision is making a difference. The men who participate in the dance program are less likely to reoffend once they leave prison. Some are now teaching dance. All credit Bouba's program for transforming their lives.

Programs like these are working. Once people stop seeing their enemies as "other" and instead engage them as friends, walls and barriers come tumbling down. What these programs have shown is once we stop demonizing others and taking sides, a new path of peace can be forged.

And what about us? What corner or pocket of your life needs peace? Is there someone or some situation you have hardened your heart against? Is there a family member from whom you are estranged? What makes you angry? What makes you rage? What makes you want to cause harm to another?

It is these corners and pockets of our lives where we need to invite Jesus in. We need to welcome him into our hardened hearts and violent tendencies. We need to welcome him into our family reunions and our Sunday dinners. For undoubtedly, we all need Jesus and we are all in desperate need of his peace.

When we begin to intentionally follow Jesus, we are changed. We can no longer live the way we have been living. We find ourselves more generous and forgiving. We find ourselves seeking joy rather than revenge. The Jesus Movement that grew out of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus the Messiah, brings unity and peace: not war and violence and death.

Indeed, those early Christians are really each of us here today. We can be people committed to peace. We can clothe ourselves with the gifts of the Spirit rather than the armaments of war. We can reach out to our enemies, seek out the lost, forgive and love. We do this because Jesus first showed us the way. We do this because of Jesus.

Some scholars believe that the writer of Ephesians took Paul's letter to the Colossians as his guide to writing Ephesians. Assuming this to be so, Paul in Colossians spoke of Christians being clothed NOT as Roman soldiers, but like this:

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other. Just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts. (Colossians 3:12-15)

Friends: I cannot think of better instructions for us on how we are to live, speak, and be in this community and beyond. Clothe yourselves with love and let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts.

Let Jesus in. He is waiting to take you on a journey of a lifetime. Amen.


