DEVOTIONS



Read: John 6:35, 41-51.

Twice in this text Jesus says "I am the bread of life" (vv. 35 and 48). He also says "I am the living bread" (v. 51). These words create tension with those who object to Jesus making such claims about himself. This text acknowledges that the uniqueness of Jesus causes a divide between those who accept Jesus' identity and those who do not. This passage does not try to explain why some believe while others do not, except to note that those who believe in Jesus do so by God's power. Jesus also states that believing in him as the one who is the bread of life gives not just life but eternal life. The eternal life that Jesus gives begins now, not just at some future time. It is not for us to understand how one comes to believe in Jesus as the bread of life, except to know that it is a gift from God. Jesus is the source of life that begins now and knows no end. It is a life entered through faith in Jesus, the one whose life feeds the world in hope. How is it helpful for you to know that eternal life with God has already begun?

Pray: Living God, give us Jesus, the bread of life, that we may live each day in faith, hope, and love. Amen.

Take time this week to reflect on those with whom you may have experienced conflict. Pray for a clean heart that forgives this person and that you can receive forgiveness from this person.







MOMENT OF REFLECTION

Today we begin a worship series from the Book of Proverbs. We have a pretty good idea of what a proverb is: a wise saying. So, to get us primed for today's sermon and the coming weeks as we focus on Proverbs, I brought some proverbs—some wise sayings—with me to worship today.

I may need to rephrase that. Some of these sayings are wise and some most definitely are not. I will need your help today determining which sayings are wise and which are foolish. Let us begin:

It is okay to run with scissors. (Wise or Foolish?)

You should always chew your food. (Wise or Foolish?)

Never tie your shoes. (Wise or Foolish?)

Never listen to your parents. (Wise or Foolish?)

You should be kind to others. (Wise or Foolish?)

Only eat candy. (Wise or Foolish?)

Read your Bible every day. (Wise or Foolish?)

Put cheese in your ears. (Wise or Foolish?)

You should not steal. (Wise or Foolish?)

Eat mustard on your ice cream. (Wise or Foolish?)

Here is the truth about life: Each and every day we are faced with all kinds of decisions—and most decisions are much more difficult than knowing whether or not to put cheese in your ears. Sometimes we know what is the right thing to do, but we don't do it. Other times, we know what is wrong, but we do it anyway.

In James 1:5 we hear, "If any of you is lacking in wisdom, ask God, who gives to all generously and ungrudgingly, and it will be given to you."

In the coming weeks, as we dive deeper into Proverbs, I encourage you to seek God's wisdom for your life.

How long will scoffers delight in their scoffing and fools hate knowledge? ²³ Give heed to my reproof; I will pour out my thoughts to you; I will make my words known to you. ²⁴ Because I have called and you refused, have stretched out my hand and no one heeded, ²⁵ and because you have ignored all my counsel and would have none of my reproof, ²⁶ I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when panic strikes you, ²⁷ when panic strikes you like a storm, and your calamity comes like a whirlwind, when distress and anguish come upon you. ²⁸ Then they will call upon me, but I will not answer; they will seek me diligently, but will not find me. ²⁹ Because they hated knowledge and did not choose the fear of the LORD, ³⁰ would have none of my counsel, and despised all my reproof, ³¹ therefore they shall eat the fruit of their way and be sated with their own devices.

³² For waywardness kills the simple, and the complacency of fools destroys them; ³³ but those who listen to me will be secure and will live at ease, without dread of disaster."

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Today begins a sermon series on the book of Proverbs. I've never preached a series on Proverbs, so I'm looking forward to learning and growing with you as we explore and learn together.

On Trinity Sunday in late May, I spoke a little about Proverbs, but couched the sermon in terms of Wisdom/Spirit being seen as female. And today's reading certainly reinforces Wisdom as female.

Yet, today we are going to dig deeper into Proverbs, giving a brief history and theology of this book that has been, for centuries, ascribed to King Solomon.

Let's begin. In the Bible, there are a handful of books considered to be Wisdom Literature: Proverbs, Job, and Ecclesiastes along with the Apocryphal books of Sirach and the Wisdom of Solomon. Some scholars also include Song of Songs/Song of Solomon to the list.

Jerome, an early biblical scholar (died 420), argued that these books all are tied in some way, shape and form to King Solomon. Though scholars today would say the association to the king is fairly loose. Perhaps what better holds these books together is the prevalence of the word "wisdom." Found 42 times in Proverbs, 18 times in Job, 28 times in Ecclesiastes, 60 times in Sirach and 30 times in Wisdom of Solomon/Book of Wisdom.

What's more, no matter if we are looking at Jewish, Christian, Mesopotamian, or Egyptian texts, Wisdom Literature is among the oldest genres. This is what I believe about this: no matter who we are, no matter our cultural background, no matter our place in history, we as humans are constantly seeking wisdom greater than ourselves.

Wisdom Literature typically has certain characteristics:

- 1. Instruction. Lessons given. Often these lessons are written as if to a child.
- 2. Collection of Proverbs. Wisdom Literature is full of wise sayings—in all cultures of Wisdom Literature.
- 3. Dialogues on Divine Justice and Human Suffering. Much of ancient Wisdom sources tried to hammer out the roles of God and humanity in the world—especially in terms of human suffering.
- 4. Philosophical Exhortation. Fancy scholarly name for a variety of argumentative styles to persuade audience/readers.
- 5. Brief Forms. Again a fancy name for sayings, commands and prohibitions—usually only a sentence each.

And what topics does biblical Wisdom Literature cover?

- 1. God: depending on the book, God's presence is either discussed overtly or in more hidden tones.
- 2. Cosmic Order: God has given a particular order to the universe which includes our own world.
- 3. Creation: God's creation of the universe is key to Wisdom Literature. In the Book of Proverbs, we hear of two separate creation cosmologies: Proverbs 3:19-20 and Proverbs 8:22-31.
- 4. Wisdom: as a human task and a divine gift.

I'm going to shift now from Wisdom Literature as a whole to the Book of Proverbs specifically. Generally biblical scholars today do not ascribe Proverbs to King Solomon, though some say that perhaps the beginnings of the book came out of Solomon's court. Royal courts aside, because many of these "wise sayings" are universal in understanding, this book is difficult to date. In fact, it is also difficult to locate geographically.

If you look back at your bulletin and the written scripture reading, you will notice that verse 7 sets the tone: The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge, but fools despise wisdom and instruction. This single verse tells us why we showed up today/why the Book of Proverbs is important. Placing God at the absolute center of our lives should be our lifelong task. Because here is the truth: what may have worked for us to keep God at

the center a year ago, may no longer work. Trust in God is our primary calling. Always.

Verses 8-19 speak wise teaching/wise instructions for children. And what is the primary instruction? Don't be greedy. Life is more than our possessions.

Verses 20-33 shift to the language of Wisdom/Spirit being female—something we talked about on Trinity Sunday. In these verses, Wisdom warns against being foolish. She warns against not placing one's full trust in God. She warns that if we do not listen to her words, our lives will be unnecessarily difficult.

In many ways, today's reading is a perfect beginning to our sermon series on Proverbs. We are told to place our trust in God. We are told to loosen our grip on the stuff we accumulate. We are told to listen to Wisdom when she speaks.


Friends this is your homework for the coming week:

- 1. Place your trust in God. Not a little bitty bit of trust. All your trust.
- 2. Begin to let go of that which keeps you captive—especially the stuff you surround yourself with. Give away extra clothes. Donate unused pots and pans. Share your books and tools. Make your home less focused on stuff and more focused on love.
- 3. Be unafraid to listen to Wisdom/Spirit. She has words for you and for you alone—if only you will listen and heed her message.

As we dip our toes into Proverbs, let us throw ourselves headlong into the pool of God's grace. Amen.



The food typically provided by aid agencies for refugees is woefully lacking in both nutrition and calories. This month, we will join Church World Service in a Ration Challenge. The Mission Team challenges you to commit to eating for one week in August only the food provided to Syrian refugees. There are many ways you can participate in the Ration Challenge. First, you can pick up a ration food pack, located on the round tables in the sanctuary or in the church office, eating what is provided for one week. The money you save can go toward our monthly mission. Another option is to commit to eating the rations while soliciting sponsors to help raise funds. In this instance, the more money you raise, the more food you can add to your diet/challenges. A third option is to choose your own diet-especially if you have dietary restrictions. And finally, you could opt not to do the physical eating challenge, but instead give financially toward this monthly mission. \$225 per refugee per year through Church World Service supplements a Syrian refugee's rations. Our hope is that we can raise enough money this month to feed at least one family, if not two or three families.
