
Drop Everything and Read in every lesson sharing a 10 minute story extract.

Please keep encouraging reading for pleasure at home. It goes a long way to supporting not only academic achievement, but also wellbeing and social benefits such as increased empathy.







#### **Newsletter Spring 2022**



This year Selly Park has invested in an exciting reading strategy for your daughters. We all know how important reading is with helping pupils to achieve their potential. Put simply, pupils that read well tend to do much better in their studies.

So far, your daughters have had 2 reading tests and the results of these tests show that the average reading age for pupils has gone up in every year group. There will be one more reading test in the summer term.





In addition, many of the pupils are really enjoying the challenge and activities from our on-line reading and intervention platform called Bedrock Learning.

Many of the girls are spending several hours a week using this to help their reading and we are rewarding their efforts on a regular basis. We have displays around the school celebrating their achievements and some of the girls have been rewarded by winning amazon vouchers in the National Bedrock competitions.

This term, we have also been concentrating on reinvigorating the library and making it a welcoming space for the pupils to visit at break and lunch.

This has meant investment in a television so pupils are able to watch current affairs and news. We have new furnishings so the girls can sit and read comfortably. We have decorated the space to make it feel welcoming and to advertise reading and reading competitions and activities to the pupils. New books are arriving on a regular basis and it is fantastic to see the pupils becoming so enthusiastic about reading for pleasure. The library has become quite a hub of activity. We also now have some very hardworking student librarians.





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Next term, the reading garden will be back open so the pupils can sit and relax with their favourite books in the sun (hopefully!) We will also have some exciting rewards for the pupils in our brand-new book vending machines!





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# World Maths Day

World Maths Day was celebrated on Wednesday 23<sup>rd</sup> of March. During their maths lessons, pupils in KS3 participated in World Maths Day, hosted on the Mathletics platform. This was a global mathematics challenge focused on using Live Mathletics. Students took part in 60-second races that test the speed and accuracy of their mathematics fluency skills. They competed against students across the globe in a worldwide celebration of mathematics. They earned 1 point for each correct answer and this went towards their World Maths Day score. Prizes will be awarded for top performing students and schools. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the World Maths Day celebrations.






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# **NSPCC Number Day**

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


The first Pi Day was held in 1988 in San Francisco to draw greater attention to science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields.

Since then, Pi Day has been celebrated by millions of students and math-lovers each year.

#### What is Pi?

Take any circle. Measure the circumference. Measure the diameter. Divide the circumference by the diameter. The answer is always  $\pi$ .





# How is Pi day celebrated?


Pi day is celebrated in some of the following ways:

- Baking/Eating pies.
- Eating round inspired food such as pizza.
- Get physical with pi Walk, run, jog or cycle 3.14 miles (5.05 km), which is just a tiny bit longer than 5Km.
- Reciting the digits of pi from memory.
- Playing pi games- There are plenty of traditional games that are appropriate on Pi Day, like a piñata, a pie-eating contest, or a pie-in-the-face fundraiser.
- Words beginning with Pi- Writing down as many words as you can think of beginning with Pi e.g. piercing, pictorial and so on.
- Watching a math inspired movie.

At Selly Park Girls' School, pupils celebrated Pi Day by participating in a competition to see how many digits of Pi they could recite from memory. They recited these to their Maths teacher.

# **History Department News**

We have been really pleased with the hard work, resilience and efforts displayed by our student this term.

Year 11 are just finishing their studies of Elizabethan England. They have been looking at topics like Elizabethan Exploration and the Spanish Armada. They have also been studying the lives of the rich and poor in Elizabethan England including the role of the Elizabethan theatre. They are about to start their final topic which is a site study of Burghley Alms Houses. In addition, they have completed their final mock examination and it was pleasing to see so many students gain good results. Intervention classes are still available for students every two weeks and they also have still have free access to all their History textbooks through using an online platform called Kerboodle.

Year 10 have continued to embrace their GCSE History course and have produced some excellent work so far. They are just about to complete their study of Germany 1890-1945. Their final topics have included Nazi propaganda and Terror, the Holocaust and resistance to the Nazis. We are hoping to get a relative of a Holocaust survivor to visit them in the summer term to Year, to give the pupils an even deeper understanding of this subject. Year 10 have also completed their first Mock exams. There were some very good grades but for those that did not perform as they should have, there is now the opportunity to put that right. When year 11 leave, year 10 will have access to intervention classes and they should use the summer term and the holidays to ensure they really know their year 9 and 10 work ready for year 11. Next term, we are having a real change in topics and will be studying Britain, Health and the people. We are looking forward to teaching this again as it has not been taught since 2020 because of the pandemic!





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# **History Department News (continued...)**

Year 9 have displayed commendable effort this year and have completed work on the failure of the League of Nations. Currently, they are just finishing the Causes of the Second World War and will have their final assessment in this topic soon. We will be moving on to a completely new topic after this-Germany 1890-1945. We are delighted to see so many students have chosen to take History next year- currently the numbers are well over 100 students!



Year 8 are just completing their work on the role of Women. They have had an assessment on improvements in women's rights in the Victorian period and are now just finishing with how and why women won the vote in 1918. Finally, year 7 have been studying the Norman Conquest and its significance. This was followed up with more Medieval topics such as the origins of Parliament and the Black Death. Some of the year 7 classes are now looking at the reign of the Tudors.

# **An Inspector Calls Performance**

K.2.2 Productions came into school on 3<sup>rd</sup> March to deliver a fabulous performance of the play 'An Inspector Calls' by J.B Priestley for our Year 10 pupils. This is one of the set texts they have studied so far, as part of their English Literature GCSE curriculum.

After the play pupils also participated in Q&A session with the actors whereby they could ask questions about the performance and the play itself to help with their revision.










# **Geography Department News**

They have also worked in groups to study the reasons why China introduced different Child Policies and the effects that these have had on the country – some of the best display work from 8CO and 8DE are shown below.










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# Computing and Business Studies News (continued...)




In year 9, pupils have just finished their Python projects, solving computational problems and develop modular programs. The Knowledge and Skills\_they have developed are using c code, creation of simple programs with output of multiple lines of code, use of loops and strings to perform more advanced tasks.





This term yr8 have explored computational thinking, Alan Turing and his work at Bletchley Park. Pupils have also completed a range of activities linking with Maths using Binary addition and conversion binary and decimal.

Finally, year 7 have been studying about how Environmental issues are harmful effects of human activity on the biophysical environment. Pupils have been working on their GO Green project using a range of software applications to create a number of different documents to bring awareness to the next generation.





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# Year 11 Visit to St. Edward's Church

During recent RE lessons, year 11 GCSE students had an opportunity to visit St. Edward's Church. Here, year 11s had an interesting time learning about Christianity and the Church which is a part of the RE GCSE course. At the Church, the RE students learned about the main features inside a Catholic Church such as the Altar, the Lectern, the Font, the Paschal Candle, the Cross and the Crucifix, the Pews, the Tabernacle, the significance of the Stained Glass Windows, the Chalice, the Sanctuary, and the Fourteen Stations of the Cross.

Also, as St. Edward's Church is a Catholic Church, the students learned about the incredible Statues which were placed around the Church and got a chance to see the inside of the Confession box. Learning about all of these was extremely rewarding and very appreciative as it helped the students to enhance their knowledge about Christianity and the Church and helped to answer any questions they had and experiencing the Church helped with this. This visit also helped with understanding the diverse ways the Church is used by the community and this knowledge is needed for the RE course. The RE students agree that this was an incredibly fun visit and we learned a lot about Christianity and the importance of the Trinity and helped to understand the role of Jesus and what Christians believe happened to Jesus and what he went through. The aim of this event is for pupils to also share their different ranges of hearing loss which creates challenges and uncertainties in school and day to day life but also how they overcome them in order to take part in the fullest school life that is available to them.

There will also be two Birmingham University students present throughout the event to talk to the pupils about how they have experienced their educational journey with its challenges but more importantly how they have persevered and not let the hidden disability be a barrier to their future. If anything it's made them more determined to succeed in the next stage of their academic life.

Birmingham City Council Hearing Support Team's Teacher of the Deaf, Davina Vincent will also be updating all pupils on the most up to date technology and services available during the event.

The event is an exciting opportunity for the attending youngsters to see they're not alone and hopefully find inspiration to take their own hearing journey head on, but moreover to succeed and be happy in all educational walks of life and much more beyond.



# We're using Arbor's free Parent Portal and Arbor App

#### We've chosen Arbor to help us manage our school.

Arbor is a simple, smart and cloud-based MIS (Management Information System), which helps us work faster, smarter and more collaboratively as a school. The Arbor App and Parent Portal mean we can keep you informed about your child's life at school in a much more accessible way. Log into Arbor to see and update your child's information, get live updates and make payments or bookings on the go!

The Parent Portal works on Google Chrome (computer or laptop) and you can download the Arbor App from the App Store or Google Play Store on your phone (Android 5.0; iOS 10.0 and upwards).

#### How to get started

- 1. Wait for your welcome email from us telling you Arbor is ready you won't be able to log in before
- 2. Click the link in your welcome email to set up your password
- 3. Go to the App or Google Play Store on your phone and search 'Arbor'
- 4. Click 'Install' on Android or 'Get' on iPhone then open the App
- 5. Enter your email, select the school, then enter your password
- 6. Accept the Terms & Conditions and enter your child's birthday


# Need help using Arbor?

Contact the school office if you have questions about Arbor, the App or Parent Portal. Tell us the type and model of your phone, e.g. an iPhone SE, and include screenshots or screen recordings.

To safeguard student data in line with General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR), Arbor only works directly with schools.

#### Some tips to try:

- Ensure your username is the email address you use for Arbor.
   Ask us to check the email address linked to your account.
- 2. Reset your password from the login page, or ask us to do this.
- If the login email was sent to you more than 96 hours ago, the password link will have expired. Ask us to send it again.
- Ask the school office to check that your email address has not been used twice - e.g. on another guardian or child's profile.
- 5. Enter the birthday of one of your children to log in.
- Only relatives who are **Primary Guardians** of a child can access the Arbor App. Ask us to check you can access Arbor.











#### **French Careers Focus**

Year 9 pupils in French have been finding out why languages are so important in today's job market. In an online seminar organised by Business Language Champions, Selly Park Girls joined together with more than a dozen schools from across the country to meet language graduates who have made successful careers using languages. They met someone from Italy who came to England at the age of 18 to study politics at an English University. They also met someone from England who learnt German at school and University, but now lives and works in Japan because she learnt Japanese after University.

According to Mr Starkie, Head of Modern Foreign Languages, "It was fascinating to hear these people's stories. It has further highlighted why gaining language qualifications is so important and how well it prepares you for life and work in the 21st century. We are so fortunate that at Selly Park, all our learners get the opportunity to do a language GCSE."

#### French Food Focus

Pupils in Year 8 got a real taste of French culture in February when they made crêpes in the food room during their French lesson. This traditional French dish comes from Brittany in the North-West of France and can be eaten with sweet or savoury ingredients.

Whilst making their crêpes, pupils got to learn some of the French words for the ingredients and used teamwork skills to help each other produce some really tasty French specialities. Many pupils even gave up part of their lunch break to help get the batter mixed. Special thanks go to Nadwah and Reemass who helped Mr Starkie deliver the first food practical lesson of his long career!

According to Mr Starkie, "When we learn a language, it's so important that we also learn about the things in that culture which are different from our own. For example, French pancake day, when everyone in France eats crêpes, is called "La Chandeleur" and happens on 2nd February every year, whereas Pancake Tuesday this year is happening on 1st March in the UK. In France, Tuesday 1st March is called "Mardi Gras" and involves a big carnival and parades - but no pancakes!"

Mr Pritchard, Head of DT and Assistant Head Teacher said, "It's so good to create these links across the different subject areas. It helps pupils to realise that what they are learning in French is relevant to the skills they are developing in Design Technology. The girls clearly loved making the crêpes and they will go into their next food lesson more confident and more skilled as a result of what they did today in French".
