A Message from the President: Creative Solutions with the Help of Donations

Across West Mont, we're working towards transitioning away from the traditional, large-group day programs to smaller settings where people spend much of their time in the community, engaged in various activities. You have seen this with the changes that have been made at West Mont Flower Shop. We want to celebrate experiences with our clients and to engage our community in what being a part of the life of someone with a disability looks like.



We also know it is important for our clients to spend part of their day in a small group setting where they work on life skills as designated by their individualized care plan. That includes things like writing, cooking, and safety skills, such as what to do in a fire or when there's a tornado warning. One of our tagline words is #independence and so this is important for our work here at West Mont. To make these settings happen, we need donations.

Charitable gifts help with a variety of needs at West Mont, including things such as specialized therapies and adaptive equipment that Medicaid doesn't pay for and specific items that people may not be able to afford on their own. Gifts also help with the extras, such as tickets for entertainment outside of their day-to-day activities like a sporting event, concert, or movie. The impact of these gifts for those that West Mont supports is often life changing. Gifts also impact the success of the organization. West Mont is 90% funded by Medicaid and other government sources, but that funding will never be enough for people to have everything they need. Gifts, grants, and estates allow West Mont to invest in the future, such as through new technology, quality improvements that increase personalized services and expanding the mission to serve more people. The added financial stability also allows West Mont to remain an independent, nonprofit organization.

Gift dollars have purchased many of the following items for people: adaptive equipment, outdoor patio furniture to enjoy Montana summers, modified eating utensils, clothing, coats, footwear, furniture, communication devices to connect with family, and personal hygiene items.



As we near the end of the year we are looking for ways to create more community experiences for our clients. We are asking for donations to support the costs of getting our clients out in the community. These donations can look like suggestions of events we could attend, tickets for these events, volunteering to help us create an experience, or cash funds to help along the way.

himself around his West Mont group home, Lewis and Clark, and his West Mont day program site, VASTT. Steve's caregivers took note of his intelligence and his love for interacting through games like sorting blocks and playing "tapping." He enjoyed soda, popcorn, and going on rides or

relaxing on his couch and is missed by his friends and family.

Debra "Debbie" Mudd Spranget, 1959-2023

Debbie was born, along with her twin sister, Dianne, in Tacoma, Washington, and grew up in Clancy near Helena. Through her career in broadcasting and her involvement



in Farm in the Dell International as a board member, she advocated for individuals with disabilities in the Helena community. Debbie passed away after a courageous battle with cancer, and she is missed by all who worked alongside her and loved her.



Joseph "Joe" Evans, Died 2023

Joe expressed his appreciation for life with beautiful smiles and contagious laughter. Although he had many emotional and physical challenges, his resilience helped

him find joy in life. Joe spent his childhood in state institutions and his teenage years with his foster parent Hollyann Frisch. He received services from West Mont later in life, and eventually moved to Missoula where he received care from Arc of Western Montana.

Karla Rawson 1965-2023

Karla was a part of the West Mont team for 5 years. She leaves behind two daughters and six



grandchildren, as well as loving friends who cherished their time with her. Karla will be remembered for the magic she made in the kitchen (her colleagues waited for Karla's turn to cook) and the way she could use a meme or a gif to describe herself, another person, and every possible human emotion or life experience.


