FaithFULL Waters Are Flowing

LOOK, I AM DOING A NEW THING! NOW IT SPRINGS UP: **DO YOU NOT PERCEIVE IT?** I AM MAKING A WAY IN THE **WILDERNESS AND STREAMS** IN THE WASTELAND.

DON'T WE LIVE IN A LAND OF PLENTY? AT THE TURN OF A KNOB, WATER FLOWS.

The 18.1 million people who live in Malawi are rich in many things, but water is not one of them. And of the six needs identified as critical for human development, the most critical is water. To give access to good, clean water is to reduce the number of people, especially children, who die from disease or dehydration. To give access to good, clean water is to free women and girls to get an education, thereby lifting whole households out of the dust. To give access to good, clean water is to improve medical care, expand economic development opportunities, not to mention quench thirst. Loren Eiseley, science writer and anthropologist, says "If there is any magic on this planet, it is contained in water." The magic of flowing water is boundless.

No wonder the scriptures describe God's divine life as streams of water, gushing springs, quiet pools; no wonder Christ described himself as Living Water. Like Jesus, water is life-giving, life-changing, life-saving. The people of Malawi know this. When our mission partner Villages in Partnership asks a village to name its top priority of need, they answer "a well, we need a well." And when the villagers learn that they are to receive a borehole and get a well, "the anticipation is electric."

Just the anticipation of water stirs magic. Villagers get to work doing their part of the contract: they walk the miles to get water to create a mud pit so they can start making the 3,000 bricks that will line the well; they quarry and crush stone needed for filtration; they walk more miles to collect river sand for filtration. "Everyone in the village is expected to help," and they do, with singing. There is magic in the air. See the videos in this link to see the people in action.

The Mission team has already begun the work, and the magic is bubbling up in them. Leslie Longyhore says, "When we began to think and learn about doing a new thing involving people's need for water, it became so much bigger than just raising money.



We realized we need to raise awareness about how great the need is, not only in Malawi, but also right here in Allentown."

According to Abigail Goldfarb, Executive Director of the Lehigh Council of Churches, "right now there are hundreds of families living out of their cars near the Jordan Creek and Lehigh River. There is no access to public water in the city of Allentown."

HOW FAR WE GO

As the Mission team researches how to bring water to neighbors not only in Malawi but also in Allentown, the vision has gotten bigger, even a bit daunting. But bringing living water to God's thirsty children is holy work, so the Holy Spirit is involved, and evident. "Our congregation is coming together in ways we haven't seen in a really long time. It's strange, but it doesn't feel overwhelming," says Leslie. Now it is not just the Mission Action Team working on this, it is also the Deacons, and Faith Formation, and the Sunday School, and youth groups - the whole congregation is mobilizing for FaithFULL Waters, our new church-wide action project. And like our partners in Malawi,

we are singing as we go, with the help of new words to "Down By the Riverside" written by Kathy Matthews for the project.

FaithFULL Waters will continue into 2024, and in the coming weeks of December you can follow the stream of waterdrops to the table in the atrium where you will find Alternate Gifts for Christmas, Cards will be available to give to someone you honor as an explanation of your donation.-

Or, perhaps you can generate your own set of numbers. Count the number of times your household members turn on the faucet, fill your water bottles or glasses, flush your toilet, do your laundry and wash your dishes for one day. 

Our mission with Sheridan Elementary School in Allentown is focused on children who need extra community support. Each week 40-60 children receive food bags for the weekend and boxes of food for the longer school breaks. The school also has food bags available for the summer for these children as needed, FPCA members and friends donate food, money and their time to collect, sort and pack the goods in bags and boxes throughout the year. FPCA also donates school uniforms, pajamas and school supplies during focused times each year.

Since founded in 2010, Ripple Church has had a heart for those who are lost, living on the margins, and have lost hope. The founders were Mennonites, as are many of the supporting churches today. Ripple Church meets every Sunday in the former St. Stephens Lutheran Church (1421 W. Franklin St.). Their 4 p.m. worship service is followed by a meal provided by supporting churches. FPCA provides meals 3-4 times a year. Our mission team has supported fundraising events, including a planned basket sale this fall at FPCA. The FPCA congregation has generously provided donations to the 40 Days of Giving Lenten collection. Ripple was especially grateful for women's personal hygiene items, an ongoing need. Family Promise helps local families who are temporarily homeless due to a loss of employment or issues with their current housing. Their mission is carried out by a network of churches and community resources working together to help families build patterns that will bring long-term stability. FPCA partners with Family Promise by hosting families for weekly stays providing housing and meals four times a year.

Volunteers are needed (youth and adults) to prepare and serve meals nightly while socializing with families. Two volunteers are needed to stay overnight in case needs arise during the week. Each morning families are picked up and transported to their place of employment, schools or back to Family Promise headquarters. 
