ABOUT OUR TEAM

Taos Search and Rescue (Search and Rescue – Taos, Inc.) is an all-volunteer, 501(c)(3) nonprofit community organization with high standards of professionalism and service. We operate year-round, primarily in the off-road areas surrounding Taos, New Mexico, but also throughout the state and occasionally into southern Colorado. Our team searches in all seasons for lost hikers, climbers, hunters, campers, skiers, snowmobilers, etc. Our subjects may include adults with Alzheimer's disease or dementia or occasionally children. We often are called out to recover the bodies of people who have died from injuries or exposure. Our searches occur mostly in backcountry settings, i.e., the mountains, the high desert, and the Rio Grande Gorge, though sometimes we are called out for urban off-road searches. Our primary deployment is through the New Mexico State Police.

READY TO SERVE 24/7/365

TSAR is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year. We provide training for all areas of expertise that might be required on a mission. This includes training for wilderness medicine, litter packaging/evacuation, low-angle rescue, survival skills, avalanche awareness, swiftwater skills, K9 support, downed aircraft search, communications, navigation with a map and compass and a GPS, the Incident Command System, lost person behavior, and computer mapping/search technologies. New volunteers are always welcome to apply. TSAR includes the following specialized units, which train for unit-specific techniques and resources to support the full team: base (incident command), bike, drone, equine (still nascent), ground, K9, medical, off-highway vehicle (OHV), swiftwater, technical (medium- and high-angle rescue), tracking (also nascent), and winter skills. We operate our own mobile command unit.

One need not be proficient in any particular skills when joining TSAR. We will teach you all aspects of field and base operations. All you need to do is show up with a desire to learn and a spirit of teamwork.

Full members must remain on call 24 hours/day, 365 days/year, and may be called out any time of the day or night and must keep their contact information (phone, email and mailing address) current with the duty officer.

TSAR provides training for all areas of expertise required on a mission: base operations and the Incident Command System, navigation, communications, emergency first aid, litter packaging and evacuation techniques, search techniques, scene evaluation and assessment, crime scene preservation, man-tracking, swiftwater rescue, avalanche awareness, helicopter safety, K9 team support, and more.

TSAR holds a general meeting and classroom trainings on the third Wednesday of each month (this may change surrounding holidays) and a field training on alternate Saturdays or Sundays following the general meeting and classroom. Please refer to the posted training schedule for dates. Full members are required to attend 50 percent of trainings, which comprise the cornerstone of our professionalism and excellence in the field.



There are additional specialty trainings offered throughout the year, sometimes through TSAR, other times through external organizations. We regularly notify our team members of these upcoming training opportunities and encourage participation when possible because they not only enrich our individual knowledge and experience, but also that of the entire team. There may be a charge for some of these specialty trainings; full members may apply for full or partial reimbursement, including course fees, travel expenses, lodging, etc., or a per diem amount. The board will determine whether and how much to reimburse depending on the quality of the training as well as the member's service to the team, **including participation in TSAR's annual fundraiser**.

We are a volunteer organization. There is no fee for our services nor payment to our members. Your commitment to the team will involve some out-of-pocket expenses for equipment, special trainings, transportation, etc.

We are community servants. We maintain high standards of professionalism and service. Members are strictly prohibited from using alcohol or any other mind-altering substances just prior to or during official missions, trainings, or meetings. We operate in the public eye and must maintain high standards and an excellent reputation.

We operate within the scope of our limitations. No one is required to go on a mission that s/he does not feel comfortable attending (such as a body recovery) or that requires skills for which s/he is not proficient, such as a high-angle rescue. Members must realistically assess their level of fitness and adjust their participation accordingly.

Each applicant is expected to become a full TSAR member and pass any required certifications within one (1) calendar year of becoming a trainee. Please read and refer to the Taos Search and Rescue Policies and Procedures Manual for all specifics regarding membership.

Taos Search and Rescue Procedures for Membership

If you decide that TSAR is for you, please follow the steps below.

To become a TSAR trainee:

*

1. Fill out the TSAR Application for Membership Form (available from the recruitment director or online at www.sar-taos.org/Join-Us) and submit it to the recruitment director. Be sure to include a paragraph or two about why you want to be a member of TSAR (see bottom of the application).

- 2. The TSAR board of directors will review your application and vote on your team membership. If the board accepts your application, you will immediately become a TSAR trainee and are on your way to becoming "mission ready".
- 3. You will be invited to join the online TSAR "Basecamp" communications forum, where you will have access to team communications and documents.

- To become mission ready:
 1. Bring your TSAR Full-Member Certification Form (below) to all classroom and field trainings.
 - 2. When you have completed requirements #1 through 6 of the Full-Member Certification Form, with each section signed and dated by a full member, you are officially a mission-ready trainee.
 - 3. Make sure the recruitment director has your most current contact information so you can be added to the Mission Call-Out Roster and automated communications systems.

To become a full member:

- 1. Complete all requirements (modules 1 through 11) of the TSAR Full-Member Certification Form, with each section signed and dated by a full member.
- 2. Agree to pass the New Mexico Field Certification Test within one (1) year of becoming a full member of TSAR.
- 3. Submit the completed Full-Member Certification Form to the recruitment director for final approval by the full TSAR board.
- 4. Once the president has signed and returned to you a copy of your application, you are officially a full member of Taos Search and Rescue. Congratulations!

BRING THIS SHEET TO ALL CLASSROOM MEETINGS AND FIELD TRAININGS

On completion of certification modules 1 through 6, a trainee becomes "mission ready" and is eligible to participate in active missions. On completion of the remaining certification modules, Nos. 7 through 11, a trainee is eligible to become a full member. All certification modules must be signed and dated by a full member and approved by the board. It is the responsibility of the trainee to acquire these signatures and, upon completion of all modules, turn in this form to the TSAR president. **NOTE:** Trainees whose field activities are limited to the Base Unit are not required to complete the endurance module.

DESCRIPTIONS OF CERTIFICATION MODULES FOR FULL MEMBERSHIP:

1. Pack Check – Print a copy of the TSAR pack checklist and bring it with you when a full member performs the check.

2. Endurance - Hike, cross-country ski, snowshoe, or horseback ride for at least four hours on moderate-to-steep terrain.

3. Topo Map/Compass – For the map portion, identify the following: mountaintops, ridges, ravines (including which way the water is flowing),

meadows, contour intervals, elevations, and UTM and lat/long coordinates. For the compass portion: take a bearing, calculate magnetic and true north, know the declination for New Mexico, and walk a bearing with a compass to at least two points.

4. Radio Communications – Know how to operate both field and FRS radios, including how to: power on/off, switch frequencies, and follow proper communication protocols. Learn how to pack and charge radios before and after a mission.

5. GPS Basics – Know how to turn on a GPS, read a position, mark a waypoint, and navigate to a waypoint at least 200 meters away. Know how to upload a CalTopo map into your phone and use the app to mark a waypoint, turn a track on and off, and navigate to a point at least 200 meters away.

6. TSAR Policies and Procedures Manual – Read the Taos Search and Rescue Policies and Procedures Manual (available online at www.sar-

taos.org/members) and sign the form in the New-Member Packet affirming that you have read the manual in full and agree to abide by all its provisions. **7. Team Equipment** – Learn the location of supplies and equipment in the TSAR vehicles and shed and understand how the van's electrical systems operate, how to deploy the communications antenna, how to turn the generator on and off, and how to set up and use the computer/printer.

8. Knots – Demonstrate the tying and dressing of the following knots: figure 8, figure 8 follow-through, prusik, water knot, double overhand, and double fisherman's.

9. K9 Unit – Attend: a K9 Unit training as support to understand how a K9 team operates and to learn the navigation and communication skills needed to support a K9 team. Attend a K9 Unit classroom.

10. General Meetings/Classroom Trainings – Attend four Wednesday evening general meetings/classroom trainings (see posted training schedule).

11. Field Trainings – Attend four weekend field trainings (see posted training schedule).
