## OPEN CLASS ENTRY RULES

- Entrants are responsible for meeting the Open Class rules and departmental rules for each exhibit.
- Department Superintendents have final discretion on enforcement of departmental requirements.
- Any item that cannot be safely displayed or has subject matter of a questionable nature may be removed from display, judging, or both at the Superintendent's discretion.
- Exhibits must be clean and ready for display.
- Exhibits may not have been entered in Open Class in prior years.
- Exhibits entered in the wrong Class, Division, or Department may be transferred at the discretion of the Superintendents of the Department, prior to judging.
- Exhibits will be accepted and displayed at the discretion of the Superintendents dependent upon the size of item, subject, content, and space availability.
- Each Exhibit may only be entered in one class, regardless of it meeting the criteria for multiple classes.
- See Department Rules for entry number limits and entry requirements.
- Noxious weeds, controlled substances, or any illegal substance may not be included in any exhibit.
- No exhibit shall be removed from the fairgrounds until the designated entry pick-up date and time outlined in the schedule of event.


## JUDGING \& PREMIUM INFORMATION

All Exhibits will be judged on the modified Danish System of Judging. The Danish System of Judging is based upon established standards of quality for each type of product. In this system each exhibit is judged according to how well it meets that standard rather than how it compares with other exhibits. Blue, red, and white ribbons may be awarded. If the exhibit does not qualify for a ribbon, none will be awarded. Premiums will be paid according to the ribbon awarded. Ribbon premiums are as follows: Blue $\$ 3.00$, Red $\$ 2.00$, White $\$ 1.00$. Special Awards will be awarded for both Adult and Youth competitive categories unless otherwise noted. Special Awards are listed within each department's section. Premiums must be collected during exhibit entry pickup on Sunday. Any unclaimed premiums will be forfeited.

2. Exhibits entered must be the work of the Exhibitor.
3. Exhibits previously entered are not eligible.
4. Exhibits of clothing need to be on a hanger for display.
5. Pictures must be properly framed and ready to hang.
6. Items must be clean and pressed.

## JUDGING CRITERIA FOR FIBER ARTS \& SEWING:

- Cleanliness, neatness, and finishing - 10\%
- Amount of work required to complete - $40 \%$
- Degree of perfection of completed exhibit - 50\%

## GENERAL RULES FOR QUILTS:

1. All entries must arrive in a disposable bag.
2. LIMIT five entries per class per Exhibitor.
3. Items must be quilted or tied.
4. Exhibit entered must be the work of the exhibitor except where specified.
5. Exhibits previously entered in Last Chance Stampede \& Fair are not eligible.

JUDGING CRITERIA FOR QUILTS: (Modern style/intent is artfully considered)

1. Color and Design (10\%): Do the values/colors enhance the blocks/quilt pattern?
2. Construction of Top (20\%): Do all the points and corners meet precisely in the patchwork/appliqué? Do the pieces of the patchwork/appliqué fit together smoothly and lie flat?
3. Quilting Techniques (30\%): Are the stitches/ties evenly spaced and uniform length? Is there an appropriate amount of quilting for the project? Is
backing free from unsightly stitches, folds, or puckers? Does the quilt appear to lie flat?
4. Bindings/Edges (20\%): Are stitches in binding/edge finish non-distracting or unnoticeable? Is binding uniformly full of fillers? Are corners attractive and square?
5. Finishing Touches (20\%): Is the quilt neat with no unsightly threads or knots showing? Is it clean, pressed, no hair, pencil/chalk marks, stains, or odors?

## GENERAL RULES FOR ADULT FINE ARTS:

1. LIMIT five entries per class per Exhibitor.
2. Concept and execution of entries must be original (one of a kind, conceived by hand of the artist).
3. No commercially prepared kits may be used to create entries.
4. Exhibitor must pick the appropriate class for level of skill.
a. Amateur - beginner/intermediate skill level, hobby artist.
b. Professional - Advanced skill level, paid artist.
5. Art accepted at the Superintendent's discretion.
6. Do not enter exceptionally fragile exhibits.
7. Framing requirements:
a. Watercolors, pastels, and drawings must be framed.
b. Frames may include plexiglass over the piece, but not required.
c. Frames or canvas must be equipped for hanging.
8. Maximum Size and Weight:
a. $30^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ including frame.
b. Display weight not to exceed 10 lbs .
9. Pairs (related pairs only) will be accepted as a single entry.
10. Prints may not be photo-mechanically reproduced.

- Amount of work required to complete - $40 \%$
- Originality - $20 \%$

## DEPARTMENT D: PHOTOGRAPHY

SPECIAL PREMIUM AWARDS:<br>Best of Show - Professional • Best of Show - Adult Amateur • Best of Show - Youth Amateur Champion Color Photography •Champion Black and White Photography

## GENERAL RULES FOR PHOTOGRAPHY:

1. LIMIT two entries per class per exhibitor with a maximum of six photos entered and must be the work of the exhibitor not entered in any prior years.
2. Image Size Rule: images can be any size between $8 \mathrm{X10}$ and $12 \mathrm{X18}$ and must be flush mounted (edge to edge) on foam core or mat board the same size as the photo.
3. Exhibitor must pick the appropriate class for level of skill.
a. Amateur - beginner/intermediate skill level, hobby photographer.
b. Professional - Advanced skill level, paid photographer.
4. Presentation of photograph will be part of the judging. Photos should be clean with no scratches, rips, dirt, or smudges on surface of photo, and SECURELY SEALED to the foam core or mat board on all sides of the print to be accepted.
5. Photo entries shall NOT be matted, framed, or glassed.
6. Photos must be in good taste and appropriate for family viewing. If not, they will be disqualified by the Superintendent.
7. Exhibitor's name and phone number must be shown on the top left on the backside of the photo mount.

## JUDGING CRITERIA FOR PHOTOGRAPHY:

- Composition (20\%): Using the composition to strengthen the subject. Includes rule of thirds, leading lines, or negative space.
- Subject (40\%): A strong subject is most often biggest, brightest, or in focus. A strong subject should immediately grab your attention.
- Lighting (20\%): Control or use of lighting on the subject as well as the fore-mid-background to strengthen the subject.
- Impact (20\%): Emotion or overall impact of the photo.


## CHARACTERISTICS OF GOOD PHOTOS:

- Composition - use the rule of thirds; include only what's necessary; subject should be obvious and dominate the photo; avoid background and foreground distractions; use best shooting angle; be in focus; balance all the elements included in the photo.
- Good Lighting - not over or under exposed photos; soft light better than harsh light; avoid lens glare; early morning and early evening light produces best light for outdoor photos.
- High Impact - photo immediately pulls the viewer in and holds their attention.
- Color Saturation - no washed-out colors - keep colors rich and vibrant.
- Attention to Detail - get rid of all distraction in your photo. Pay attention to everything that you are including in your photo before you take it. If it is not necessary, leave it out. The same is true when cropping your photo- crop out anything that distracts from the main subject.


## CLASS DEFINITIONS:

- Macro - photo taken with a macro or close-up lens with a 1:1 or 1:2 ratio.
- Babies \& children - photos of babies \& children that capture their personality.
- Creative - utilize a variety of methods that alter the original photo in some way i.e., adding textures and
patterns, multiple exposures, paint color on black and white, or any other creative technique.
- Flowers - photos can be either wildflowers or cultivated flowers.
- Scenic - a scene such as landscape, seascape, cityscape, etc. without people.
- Insects, Bees, \& Butterflies - insects, bees or butterflies should be the main subject in your photo.
- Planes, trains, \& automobiles - photos depicting mechanical modes of transportation.
- Nostalgia - represents the quality of a time past, often containing antiques and old objects.
- Pets - photos that capture the personality of your pet.
- Portraits - can be individuals, couples, or families.
- Before and after - photo entry must show both the original Before photo as a $4 \times 6$ and the After photo
as an $8 \times 10$ and both on an $11 \times 14$ digital format to produce one final print done with video editing software such as Lightroom or Photoshop.
- Architecture - photos of buildings, bridges, towers, and man-made structures.
- Wildlife - photos of wild animals \& birds in their natural habitat. No zoo photos.
- Weather - rain, hail, storm clouds, rainbows, lightening, floods, hurricanes, Borealis, Milky Way, etc.
- Hodge podge - a quality photo that does not fit any of the above categories.

## GENERAL RULES FOR ADULT HOBBIES \& CRAFTS ARTS:

2. Entries must be original works of the Exhibitor and not entered in any prior years.
3. Entries with moveable parts should be securely attached.
4. Fragile items shall be brought in a display case.
5. Related pairs and groups are accepted as a single item for entry and judging.
6. No sharp objects. (knives, swords, etc...)
7. Legos, K'nex \& Erector sets must be an original creation. No kits are permitted.
8. Legos, K'nex \& Erector set must be securely mounted to a wooden or Lego base proportional to the entry.

- Amount of work required to complete - $40 \%$

# DEPARTMENT F: HORTICULTURE 

SPECIAL PREMIUM AWARDS:<br>Best of Show - Champion Artistic Flower Arrangement<br>Champion Floriculture \& Plant - Champion Produce - Champion Grain and Forage

## GENERAL RULES FOR HORTICULTURE:

1. LIMIT five Entries per class per Exhibitor.
2. Check each class for presentation rules.
3. Exhibits shall contain the Exhibitor's name on a piece of tape on the bottom of the container.
4. All exhibits must be clean.
5. No controlled substances allowed.

## JUDGING CRITERIA FOR HORTICULTURE:

- Size-15\%
- Stem and foliage - 10\%
- Color-20\%
- Presentation-15\%
- Quality of material - 40\%


## HORTICULTURE TIPS:

- If plant material is to hold up through the exhibition period, it must be cut no later than the day before it is to be judged. Cutting should be done near 4 pm , as that is the time there is the greatest amount of sugar in the leaves to overcome wilting. Cut stems cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife and plunge stems into warm water. Set in a cool room, out of any draft. Flowers should be kept in deep water for 8-12 hours or overnight. All foliage that is below the waterline should be removed.
- Foliage to be used in arrangements, such as hosta, vegetable leaves, canna, peony, etc., should be clean with any broken, diseased, or disfigured foliage or petals removed. Flowers or branches with wood stems, such as Phlox, Stocks, Chrysanthemums, should be split, crushed, or pounded before being placed in deep water. Dahlias should be picked at daybreak with long stem, placed first in cold water and then into hot water and placed in a dark, cool place during the day. If using oasis in your bouquets, be sure it is below the surface of the water. Oasis acts like a wick and dries out the stems.
- Crops should be clean and free from blemishes and disease. Pick crops for quality in prime eating condition. Look for crops uniform in size, color, shape, and ripeness. An exhibitor should pay close attention to grooming all exhibits by removing all dirt, spray residue, dead leaves, and blooms. Replacement cut flowers are encouraged on Thursday.

## 18: FLORICULTURE \& PLANTS

Exhibits must conform exactly to rules relative to number of stems, stalks, etc. Flowers must be in a suitable container. Use containers that do not tip or break easily. Must be cut flowers. All flowers entered must be grown by the Exhibitor.

BLOOM Individual flower, solitary flower, terminating on stem.
SPRAY A group of florets on a branched stem, each on its own pedicel.
SPIKE Lengthened flower clusters in which flowers are practically stem less: (example: gladiolus, snapdragons).
STEM The major supporting structure in plants, to which buds, leaves and flowers are attached at regular intervals at points called nodes.

1. Follow proper and safe canning preparation.
2. Current USDA guidelines must be followed for all food preservation exhibits.
3. All preserved exhibits must be the current year's processing.
4. All low-acid foods must be processed, in a pressure canner.
5. All canned exhibits must be contained in clean standard canning jars with clean rings and sealed.
6. Any size jar is accepted.
