Jeri Huffman Gunderson — Much living has happened since my time as Stampede Queen in 1962. While attending Montana State University in Bozeman, I met and married Dennis Gunderson. We graduated from MSU, taught school in Monroe, WA returning to Montana to farm north of Chester in 1969. Together we raised six children as well as responding to the call to Christian world mission in the mid-'70s. That call has taken us around the world, first to India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan and, for the past 23 years, the Philippines. Sadly, Dennis passed away in Manila in 2007.

My work in the Philippines is among the poor. I founded and still direct Shiphrah Birthing Home, a midwife-driven ministry that reaches out to impoverished women and their families, giving excellence in dignified, safe maternal health care. I also serve as president of our mission, HELP International Ministries that includes not only the birthing home but also <u>the little children's home</u>, a home for parentless infants, caring for them until we can place them with forever families either in the Philippines or internationally.

Needing to better understand the dynamics of poverty and effective response to it, I entered a Masters Degree program in the Philippines studying Community Development. For the past eight years I've served as Program Director for the Community Development Program at the Alliance Graduate School in Manila, resigning just this spring. I am currently in the midst of work on my doctoral dissertation working toward an EdD in Transformational Adult Education.









Pat Rouane (Ayers) - I was raised on a dry land farm south of Columbus, Montana. During my growing up years, I rode horseback four miles each way to a country grade-school. I loved riding horses and participated in the roundups, small rodeos and trail rides in the area. In 1963, I was 'Miss Stylon', representing a downtown Helena women's clothing store and was elected Miss Last Chance Stampede, 1963-64. I went on to represent Montana in the Miss Rodeo America contest held later that November, in Las Vegas. I was next in line into the arena for horsemanship competition when the announcement came over the loud speaker, "The President of the United States, John F. Kennedy, has been shot today in Dallas, Texas."

In July, 1965, I married Arthur W. Ayers, grandson of former Montana Governor, Roy E. Ayers in Arlington, Virginia. I was working for Montana's Congressman, Arnold Olsen, in Washington, DC at that time. In January, 1969, Arthur opened his private law practice in Red Lodge, Montana. We lived and raised our two children, Erika and Jonathan Roy, there for 28 years. After my experience as Miss Last Chance Stampede, I immediately originated the 'Home of Champions' Rodeo Queen Contest for that rodeo and it exists to this day. During our time in Red Lodge, Arthur and I served on many community fundraisers that included the creation of the present public tennis courts, swimming pool and raised money for equipment for the Fire and Ambulance Departments. During my Chair of the Carbon County Memorial Hospital Board of Directors, the Beartooth Hospital Foundation was created, which now is instrumental in building a new hospital and health care center for the Red Lodge/Carbon County area.

For Arthur's medical and health needs, we moved to Medford, Oregon, the fall of 1996, so he could be in a warmer climate due to dialysis for juvenile diabetes he was diagnosed with in 1944.

Unfortunately, Arthur died less than two years later in August, 1998, ending 33 years of a happy marriage. I chose to remain in Medford and am active in St. Mark's Episcopal Church and presently Chair the Outreach Committee. I co-chaired the creation of the first Community Garden in a Historical District of Medford and helped create and volunteer at St. Mark's weekly food pantry where clients can choose their own food. I also serve as a Director on the Interfaith Care Community that provides housing for U.S. Veterans in need. I am the very proud grandma of Ian (13) and Kathleen Grace (almost 10) Schulz that live on a mountainside outside of Clancy, Montana and Samuel (7) and Logan (4) Ayers residing in Happy Valley, Oregon, near Portland.

There are only 4 states in the U.S. that I have not visited; countries that I have enjoyed sight-seeing are: South Korea, Mexico, Ireland, Scotland, Denmark, Finland, Russia, Ecuador, Peru and the Galapagos Islands. I have had a loved and blessed life.

Bonnie Joy Peterson Revious - Bonnie was born in Helena, Montana February 25, 1947 to Doug and Floy Peterson. Bonnie graduated from Helena High School and later graduated from the College of Great Falls with a Para Legal Degree. At the time of her death she was employed by the law firm of Church, Harris and Johnson in Great Falls, Montana. She was previously married to A. W. Revious and they later divorced. Together they were the parents of four children, Lloyd, Jason, Darby and Douglas. Horsemanship continued as an interest and Darby went on to reign as the 1994 National Saddle Club Association O-Mok-See Queen at Fort Pierre, South Dakota.

Bonnie pursued her horsemanship career through the 4-H Clubs, the Helena Trail Rider's O-Mok-See and Junior Mounted Patrol, directed by Betty Jo and LeRoy Michaelson. Her two favorite horses were "Richy" and "Little Guy". "Little Guy" always thrilled the crowds by rearing up and pawing his front legs during introductions in front of the grandstands. Bonnie was ready and gripped her legs in preparation. "Richy" was her prize winning pole bending horse. His rhythm between the poles was graceful as a beautiful waltz. Each horse was a thrill to her and gave her endless hours of pleasure.

Bonnie's father Doug Peterson, served a the International Rodeo Director for the Rodeo Queens. Doug and Bonnie traveled many miles to rodeo's and queen contest events. Doug and his wife Floy worked with six different Miss Rodeo Montana Queens taking them to the National Finals in Las Vegas.

Bonnie Joy passed away in Great Falls, Montana in 1996, she will be missed.











Mary Jo Maierle (Smallwood) - Beginning with my life from the time I was crowned Miss Last Chance Stampede in July 1965 to reign for the 1966 year and taking you to the present day is a long story, but I will attempt to condense it for you. The title of MLCS gave me the opportunity to compete for the title of Miss Rodeo Montana at Dillon in August, 1965. I won the title over 3 other girls and went on to compete with 40+ girls from as many states in Las Vegas Nevada in November of that year. I was an odds on favorite going into the finals – at least according to the bookies – but walked away with a memorable experience that has stayed with me all these years. The many successes and marvelous friends and colleagues I had as a result of "running for Rodeo Queen" are too numerous to count. But I must especially thank Bonnie Joy Peterson, MLCS and MRM 1965 for all her help and guidance. Her parents and brother, Doug Sr., Floy, and Doug Jr. were my second family and lovingly taught me to ride in 45 days to help me win the title. The family still remains very special to me.

Following my Rodeo experiences I returned to College at Gonzaga in Spokane, ultimately graduating with a B.A. degree in Music, Vocal Performance. I then attended and graduated from Eastern Washington State College, as it was then known, with a B. A. degree in Music Education. 1971 brought me back to Helena where I began a nine-year stint as an Elementary classroom teacher, teaching at Rossiter, Ray Bjork and Hawthorne schools. A couple of years on the Board of the Helena Education Association gave me great background and wonderful friends.

I left the education world to try my hand at corporate America by working for Mountain Bell during the break-up, a very interesting time and eye-opening experience. In only two years with a total of one year spent in training away from home I had learned enough about the corporate world to know that it wasn't the kind of life I wanted. By that time I had married a wonderful man, Jack Smallwood of Helena, Blue Cloud Ranch and Real Estate Broker fame, and had become step-mother to Jack's young son, Jack Jr. I began to dive back into the music world I had left behind and started teaching Voice and Piano through the encouragement of my good friend and mentor, Fay Buness.

Music festivals at the High School level, recitals and many occasions to judge Vocal competitions took up my slack moments as I guided many, perhaps hundreds of young people through the world of music. I have been a member of the National Association of Teachers of Singing, a prestigious organization of professional Voice Teachers, for almost 30 years; and have held several different offices as a Board of Director member both in Montana and California.



She went on to be First Runner-up at the Miss Rodeo America pageant and won the Personality division. She gave her trophy to her sorority for safe-keeping. There probably are not a lot of sorority houses with a MRA trophy on their mantel!

Between music theory, piano practice and voice practice, there just was too little time for jitterbugging at the Silverado, Ft.Collins' cowboy 3.2 place. It was at the Silverado where she first danced with Lennard. A blind date gone sour resulted in being escorted home by Lennard instead; Lennard and Dee Dee danced their way to marriage in 1973.

Upon graduation from CSU in March of 1973, an opportunity for employment arose in the Animal Science Department. Dee Dee was offered a teaching position at the University, but not in her major! When he retired from orthopedic surgery, we bought a house in McCall, Idaho, and in Sarasota, Florida. We continued to have cutting horses, and played a lot of golf. I was pursuing my private pilot's license when he died in an airplane crash near the Big Hole in Montana. I moved back to the ranch after Mike's death, and became involved with Kris Kerpa, who then quit working for Placer Motors to help run my dad's ranch in the Deer Lodge Valley. We had a baby boy that we named Soren. After we worked for my dad for a few years, we moved to Weatherford, Tx, to run the Bar H Ranch, a prominent producer of cutting horses. They stand the stallions Dual Pep and CD Olena, two of the predominant studs in the cutting horse industry. However, we found Texas to be way too hot for a couple of Montanans. Kris then rejoined the military, and was based in D.C. for a year before serving in Africa, and Yemen. Soren and I stayed in Montana while he was abroad. When he got back, we moved to Colorado. We operated the Sleeping Indian Ranch in Ridgway. Quite a bit of the movie True Grit was filmed on the ranch and around Ridgway. In fact, the town scene was filmed right in Ridgway, and looks much the same as it did in the movie. Because of the way the economy was going, Kris rejoined the military two years ago, and is currently with NORCOM in Colorado Springs. We are living in Woodland Park, with Pikes Peak out our living room window. Soren is now 12 years old, and enjoying his summer off from school. My experience as Miss Last Chance Stampede has had a lasting effect on me, knocking off some of the rough edges, and giving me a lot of much-needed confidence.


