All In!



In February 2008, Maj. Phil Packer was struck by a rocket blast while serving with the British Armed Forces in Basra, Iraq. He suffered major heart and spinal injuries — enough that medics told the now-paraplegic soldier that he would never walk again. But they were wrong — wrong by a whopping 26.2 miles. Last summer, Maj. Packer completed the Flora London Marathon — *on crutches* — only one month after a year's rehab allowed him to finally take his first step with them. Starting the marathon with the main race group, he finished it 13 days later. He covered roughly two miles a day, and the whole journey took him 52,400 steps. When you're told you'll never walk again, every step is worth counting. And when each race day consists of 4,000 painful steps, you probably count each limp and remember every one of them. For Packer, *limping in was actually all in*.¹

When Paul met Christ on the road to Damascus (Acts 9), he trusted Christ and was born again as a child of God. It was the manifestation of God's miraculous grace in the life of Paul. This same miraculous transformation is available today when any person admits their need (sinner) for Jesus and turns (repents) by faith. A wonderful transaction took place. Paul lost some things, but he gained more than he lost! Paul's past, with both its impressive religious résumé and its equally impressive social status was worth less than nothing. It was now useless information. It was of no use to him as he endeavored to know Christ fully. Paul was *all in*!

Why can't we surrender to that? Because it initially feels like a loss of power and importance! Whether we're pretty good or not good enough, we have to let go of the

sense of self-importance. Paul's hope for Philippi, and now us, is that we strain forward to what lies ahead (v.13) and press on toward the goal (v.14). The motivation for Paul is clear — sharing Christ's resurrection one day. In the meantime, there's a kingdom to help expand. We have a life to live as people who have been made Christ's own. When Christ is everything to us, the future is big. It's risky. It's creative. It's fulfilling. So what lies ahead for us? What goal are we supposed to press on toward? Maj. Packer had two ways he could have approached life. The first was to collect a disability check and a whole lot of sympathy because of his past. But that was limping in. The other was to call the past irrelevant regarding the future. To risk failing on big financial goals. To endure insufferable pain so he could change the experience of others such as himself. That is *all in.* Paul had a similar choice. We have the same today. Limp in or *all in?*

Health & Wellness: HYPERTENSION

Hypertension is perhaps better known as *high* blood pressure.

What is blood pressure? Your blood pressure is a measure of how much the blood moving through your

arteries pushes against the vessel walls. Your blood pressure is the highest during your heartbeats and lowest when your heart is resting.

High blood pressure can have one or more of several possible causes: genetics, obesity, too much salt (sodium) in one's diet, arterial stenosis, and even the stiffening of one's arteries as you age. Sleep apnea can contribute to high blood pressure, as can hyperthyroidism and other endocrine conditions.

Hypertension is not heart disease. However, hypertension can be a major contributing factor for heart disease, which is why hypertension is not something you want to ignore.

"In terms of your heart, there is a strong link between hypertension and coronary artery disease," said Dr. Kalvakuri, a cardiologist from OSF. "Blockages and coronary artery disease development can be accelerated by hypertension." A weak heart muscle is another consequence of uncontrolled hypertension.

Higher pressure on the vessel walls can damage them, making it easier for plaque to build up. It also forces your heart to pump harder to circu-


late your blood properly. This overwork can lead to a weakened heart over time.

If allowed to run unchecked, hypertension can damage not only the heart but also the brain, eyes, and kidneys. Hypertension has earned the harsh nickname, "the silent killer" because a lot of people show no signs that something might be wrong until they suffer a problem caused by the hypertension, which can be as severe as a heart attack.

Blood Pressure is the measurement of blood against the artery wall as it runs through your body. Your blood pressure is the highest during your heartbeats and lowest when your heart is resting. Systolic pressure measures your blood pressure during the heartbeats. Diastolic pressure measures your blood pressure while your heart is at rest. **1200** Systolic



Blood Pressures will vary depending on how you are feeling or how strenuous of a workout you are experiencing. Below is a chart for you to understand where you stand for a healthy heart with your blood pressure.



If you experience any symptoms related to blood pressure, it means your hypertension has already progressed beyond stage one to stage two, where your risk for a stroke and heart attack is increased. With stage two hypertension, headaches are common, fatigue, chest pain, and even episodes of dizziness or losing consciousness.

Hypertension can also lead to vision problems, kidney issues and blockages in your small blood vessels and extremities. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms, it could mean your uncontrolled hypertension has progressed dangerously. You need to see your healthcare provider right away.

Once a person's hypertension reaches stage two, that person usually needs to be on medication for the rest of their lives. The best was to deal with hypertension is to get screened regularly and to catch it early. I will be starting to have monthly blood pressure screenings at the church again. Look for announcements soon.

Eating healthy, avoiding too much sodium, and being physically active are simple things you can do

yourself to help keep your blood pressure in a healthy range.

Jeremiah Development has hit a very important milestone! Since I became Executive Director in 2018, my main goal has been to become secondary to the residents' work in the neighborhood. To do with the neighborhood rather than for the neighborhood. To be able to earnestly listen to what those in the neighborhood are saying, what they are not saying, and respond to their needs by letting them guide us with their own solutions. Jeremiah Development has spent the last four years

developing relationships through our newsletter, safety events, movies in the park, the garden, etc. Some of the programs JD does are birthed from the requests of our neighbors. These include:

- **Computer Center Access to the Internet is very limited in this neighborhood.** Residents were unable to make appointments for COVID vaccinations or learn new skills for job searches. We are currently partnering with Goodwill Industries and the Workforce Connection to provide software for self-guided classes and instructor led programs to assist our neighbors with job skills and job searches. These computers are used daily and provide access to work, IDs, social services, and a host of other needs. A BIG thank you to Cheryl Rogers who volunteered every Tuesday from January through June to teach Microsoft Excel to our neighbors!
- Take -A- Book Library This was an unplanned program that turned out to be well received. Goodwill offered books to us, and we just put them out around the office. Before we knew it, people were coming to take books home. Not a day goes by when we don't have several people here looking through the books.
- Neighborhood Safety Events After hearing the concerns of the neighbors, we are hosting quarterly safety events that focus on safety areas they expressed a desire to learn about. In April, we hosted the Rockford Police Department as they provided personal safety training and property safety tips. We then distributed personal safety "screamers" to all who attended. In May, the Rockford Fire Department gave an interactive training on fire safety, complete with hands on fire extinguisher practice. Those attending received two fire extinguishers, a smoke detector, and a carbon monoxide detector. The firefighters installed the smoke detectors for anyone who was unable to do it themselves. Our next event in August will be led by the Winnebago Health Department with a focus on environmental safety. Attendees will leave with either an outdoor trash can with a lid or a kitchen trash can, depending on whether they rent an apartment or own their home. Our final event will be in October. We will have an electrician talk about home maintenance: where the breaker box is, how to turn off the main water in an emergency, etc. At that event, attendees will be given a toolbox with basic tools needed around the house.
- The Pilfering Garden The Coronado Haskell Neighborhood is a food desert. With the exception of expensive convenience stores, residents are unable to get fresh, healthy produce. Jeremiah's 32-bed pilfering garden is handicap accessible. It is cared for by members of the three downtown churches, and all produce is free to anyone who has a need and would like to harvest from the garden.

Recently we had a meal with 10 neighbors who have agreed to be a leadership cohort. They have committed to engaging more neighbors and will be inviting those living next door to them. This is the beginning of the neighbors truly taking the reins and guiding the direction Jeremiah will be taking within the neighborhood and the projects that will address their concerns. This is a wonderful start to what I hope will become a new neighbor-led, neighbor-executed program.


