Called

⁴ The LORD's word came to me: ⁵ "Before I created you in the womb I knew you; before you were born I set you apart; I made you a prophet to the nations." 6 "Ah, LORD God," I said, "I don't know how to speak because I'm only a child." 7 The LORD responded, "Don't say, 'I'm only a child.' Where I send you, you must go; what I tell you, you must say. 8 Don't be afraid of them, because I'm with you to rescue you," declares the LORD. 9 Then the LORD stretched out his hand, touched my mouth, and said to me, "I'm putting my words in your mouth.

Jeremiah 1:4-9, CEB

Jeremiah was a young priest in the land of Benjamin, a small settlement near Jerusalem. God spoke to him one day and called Jeremiah to be a prophet to the nations. I have said and I have heard others say, "If God would just speak to me! If God would just tell me what to do with my life, it would be clear to me." But when we look at other accounts in the Bible, where God speaks directly to others, they don't always jump at the opportunities. Almost every person responded with fear, questions, or excuses, when God called them to fulfill God's purpose. Jeremiah responded like most of us would, "I'm too young and I don't know how to talk." Jeremiah was not complaining exactly. He just didn't hear God's words of assurance, "Before I created you in the womb I knew you; before you were born I set you apart; I made you a prophet to the nations." God never calls anyone without first anointing them!

Verse five has a message that applies to all people and those who respond to God's "call." I would like to highlight some important truths in reference to God's call. First of all, God made you for a purpose. "Before you were born I set you apart;" that translates "set apart for a "sacred purpose" or "consecrated." Ephesians 2:10 states it this way: "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works which were prepared in advance for us to do." Secondly, God is with you, serve without fear; "Don't be afraid of them, because I'm with you to rescue you." In order for us to accomplish God's purpose and call we must desert fear! How many opportunities, blessings, or joy has fear stolen? I would recommend that we repeat the words found in verse eight to ourselves often. Finally, God equips us for His plan. "Then the LORD stretched out his hand, touched my mouth, and said to me, I'm putting my words in your mouth." Doing great things for God begins with us knowing God has given us what we need to accomplish the task. We need to trust God's plan and stay focused on the call God sets before us. I have a friend that reminded everyone who knew him, "It is not about you!" That means God's plan is not about you. It's not about me. It's about God working through us, by way of God's "call" on our lives. Everyone is "called" and God uses us all to God's glory! Amen.



170 YEARS OF COURT STREET

The Pastors and The People



Albert B. Wagner, Associate Pastor Served 1959 – 1974

Over its 170 years, Court Street Church has been served by more than 70 different preachers, pastors, associates, and assistants. Some pastors served only a short term (3 months, 6 months, a year or two) going to pastor churches in other communities in this area or in other parts of the country. A few served in the Civil War or became District Superintendent (also called Presiding Elders). Two became Bishops (John Heyl Vincent and William Or-ville Shepherd).

Rev. "Bert" Wagner served as Associated Pastor, becoming "Minister of the Parish" with Harold McElvany as Senior Pastor. Bert served Court Street for more than 15 years. You can see a plaque and picture of his outside the Church Library.

Sometimes gifted leaders (preacher, pastor, associate), male or female, are a critical factor in Church success and growth. Many times it is the gifted and responsive Lay Leadership (male and female) that has been the important element to the Church's vision, receptivity, and growth. Most often, it is the conjunction, the teaming together of Pastor and People, working together that brings the greatest success, progress, and growth as the Church responds to the call of Christ to love and serve each other, the outsider, and the world.

Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

ebruary is cardiovascular awareness month. Cardiovascular diseases continue to be the leading global cause of death. What is the difference between a heart attack and a cardiac arrest? A heart attack occurs when the blood flow to the heart muscle is blocked. A heart attack is a "circulation" problem. The blocked artery prevents oxygen rich blood from reaching a section of the heart muscle. Symp-

toms of a heart attack may be immediate, however, more often symptoms may start slowly and persist for hours, days, or weeks before a heart attack happens. If symptoms are immediate, they may include intense discomfort in the chest or other areas in the upper body. Shortness of breath, cold sweats, nausea and/or vomiting are also common symptoms of a heart attack. The heart attack symptoms in women can be different than men. Women are more likely to experience

feeling sick to their stomach, not being able to catch their breath, and/or pain in their back or jaw rather than extreme pain in the chest. Even if you're not sure it's a heart attack, the best action to take is to call 911. Every minute matters, the longer a person goes without treatment, the greater the damage.

What is a cardiac arrest then? A cardiac arrest is an "electrical" problem. Cardiac arrest is triggered by an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia). When a cardiac arrest happens, the heart cannot pump blood to the rest of the body. Within seconds a person becomes unresponsive, is not breathing or is only gasping. Death can occur within minutes if the person does not receive treatment. Most heart attacks do not lead to cardiac arrests, but when a cardiac arrest happens, heart attack is a common cause. The first thing to do in a cardiac arrest is to call 911 and start CPR. If a Automated External Defibrillator (AED) is available, use it as soon as possible. If two people are available to help, one should begin

CPR immediately while the other calls 911 and finds a AED machine. When you are out in public places, learn to be aware where an AED is located by looking for location signs. The AED machine is usually mounted on a wall. **FYI**: The AED at church is located in the hall outside the church office by the elevator.

Huge strides have been made in research toward treatments, and preventative measures have been

made, however, heart disease is still the number one killer in the United States and stroke is number five along with other cardiovascular diseases. It has been stated that

diseases. It has been stated that due to ongoing research since the 1940's, cardiovascular disease has dropped by 60-70%. The American Heart Association recommends the following as preventive measures for a heart attack: stop smoking, get yourself to a healthy weight by eating healthy meals, decrease your sodium intake, start exercising, consult with your doctor to know your blood pres-

sure, cholesterol, and blood sugar levels. Managing your condition through proper treatment and medication adherence is also key.

What is angina? Angina refers to symptoms (usually chest pain or chest discomfort) caused by ischemia, not enough oxygen reaching a portion of the heart muscle. This is a way your heart muscle tells you it needs more oxygen. Angina is not a disease but symptoms of an underlying heart problem, usually caused by coronary artery disease (CAD). There are different types of angina and different treatments. Remember ALL chest pain should be checked out by a healthcare provider. We need to listen to our bodies and be aware of what our bodies are trying to tell us to help keep us safe and productive. Treatments may include lifestyle changes, medications, cardiac procedures, and cardiac rehab to name a few.




