Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse, Teresa Field

First off, I would like to wish everyone a Healthy & Happy New Year! If you have a question about the Covid Booster Vaccines, please let me know, and I will try to help you find an answer.

This month I'm writing about sleep apnea. This abnormality can affect people of all ages, even children. Sleep apnea can be a potentially serious sleep disorder in which breathing repeatedly stops and starts. There are different types of sleep disorders.

Obstructive sleep apnea is the most common. This oc-

curs when throat muscles in the back of the throat relax; this narrows the upper airway while sleeping. The narrowing causes a lack of air to enter the lungs, which results in less oxygen to your body and vital organs. The body tries to compensate with a greater effort to breathe air through the narrow airway. You can have loud snoring, snorting, choking, or a gasping sound. As your brain senses this inability to breathe, you will briefly rouse from sleep so

ability to breathe, you will briefly rouse from sleep so that you can reopen your airway. These brief awakenings can be so brief throughout the night that you don't remember them. These disruptions impair your ability to reach the desired deep sleep you need.

Central sleep apnea is a less common form of sleep disorder that happens when your brain fails to transmit signals to your breathing muscles. You make no effort to breathe for short periods of time. You may awaken with shortness of breath or have difficulty getting to sleep or staying asleep.

Complex sleep apnea syndrome, also known as treatment-emergent central sleep apnea is a third form of sleep apnea. This occurs when someone has both obstructive and central sleep apnea.

The most common signs and symptoms of obstructive and central sleep apnea include: loud snoring; episodes of breathing cessation during sleep witnessed by another person; abrupt awakenings accompanied by shortness of breath, which is more indicative of central sleep apnea; awakening with a dry mouth or sore throat; morning headaches; difficulty staying asleep (insomnia); excessive daytime sleepiness; attention problems;

and irritability.

Some major risk factors of sleep apnea are: Excess weight; the size of your neck circumference; a narrowed airway; being male (men are twice as likely to have sleep apnea); being older; family history; use of alcohol, sedatives, or tranquilizers; smoking (smokers are three times more likely to have obstructive sleep apnea); and nasal congestion.

Sleep apnea can cause other medical problems. Sudden drops in blood oxygen levels that occur during sleep apnea increases blood pressure and affects the car-

diovascular system. It also affects other metabolic conditions. It is very important to seek a medical diagnosis and to have a treatment plan you follow.


Your doctor may order a nocturnal polysomnography. In a sleep lab, you will be hooked up to equipment that monitors your heart, lungs,

brain activity, breathing pattern, arm and leg movement, and blood oxygen levels while you sleep. There are also tests that you may take from home. For milder cases of sleep apnea, your doctor may recommend only lifestyle changes. Lifestyle and self-care tips: Lose excess weight; exercise; avoid alcohol and certain medications such as tranquilizers and sleeping pills; sleep on your side rather than your back; treat your nasal allergies and keep your nasal passages open at night (you may need a saline nasal spray); and stop smoking.

If you are diagnosed with sleep apnea, you may need a continuous positive airway pressure machine (CPAP). With CPAP the air pressure is somewhat greater than that of the surrounding air; this is just enough to keep your upper airway passages open. If CPAP is a problem for you, there are other devices that may be used. There are even oral appliances to keep your throat open. You may also be referred to an ear, nose, and throat doctor to rule out any blockage in your nose or throat.

It is imperative to have good communication with your doctor and to find the right solution that will work for you. Remember, there are different options. Being able to sleep well and to wake up feeling refreshed is very important to your overall health.

In the words of Pastor Cal, "Giving is not something we *do*, but something we *are*. Giving is a way of life for the Christian who understands the grace of God." 




