Great Love



⁴⁴ Then he turned toward the woman and said to Simon, “Do you see this woman? I came into your house. You did not give me any water for my feet, but she wet my feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. ⁴⁵ You did not give me a kiss, but this woman, from the time I entered, has not stopped kissing my feet. ⁴⁶ You did not put oil on my head, but she has poured perfume on my feet. ⁴⁷ Therefore, I tell you, her many sins have been forgiven—as her great love has shown. But whoever has been forgiven little loves little.”

Luke 7:44-47, NIV

Joseph M. Stowell in his book titled *Loving Christ* states; “I am struck by the fact that Jesus, in His last conversation with Peter, was most interested in whether or not Peter loved Him. If Christ were to talk with you today, there is no doubt that He would be interested in the same issue. Our quick reply would certainly be like Peter’s: “Of course, you know I love you!” But Christ would want things to go deeper than just our words. Our love for Him is best proven in the lives we live. And, we must add, loving Him is not a throwaway issue to be done or not to be done at our own pleasure. From the very first description of God’s intentions regarding our relationship with Him, it becomes apparent that it is not just to be another religious arrangement predominantly characterized by rituals and legally binding arrangements. Although aspects of those stabilizing functions will be involved, it is to be first and foremost a relationship built on mutual love. First there is *His* surprising and undeserved love for us, the offensively fallen ones, and then *our* love, which is to spring forth as a grateful response.”¹

The setting is a formal banquet, where the guests of honor would recline gracefully on low profile pillows or couches – an environment designed specifically for important figures to offer insights on moral and theological issues. The evident strain in the relationship between Jesus and the Pharisees did not prevent a Pharisee, Simon, from inviting Jesus to be his special guest at this public meal. But this proper, refined atmosphere is interrupted by the surprising entrance of a wholly inappropriate figure – a woman “who was a sinner” (v.37). Her behavior is unexpected and outlandish as is her presence. Although she herself does not speak throughout this entire episode, her actions and gestures communicate volumes. She is obviously an uninvited guest, although the generally public nature of such formal banquets allowed for the presence of others than the invited diners. Luke identifies her as one “who was a sinner” – a description which, coupled with her unescorted arrival and formally immodest behavior, certainly suggests she was a sinner.

Did You Know.....?

That the women of the fledging new church formed their own society, just one month after the Charter of the Church had been organized. In a Historical Sketch of Court Street M.E. Church, dated 1929, it was stated, "In 1852, the Dorcas Society was organized and like faithful Dorcas of Apostolic times, after whom they were named, has for more than seventy-five years been full of good works and alms deeds." Of course, it has by now been 150 years. The women's society has changed its name over the years and eventually divided into different circles; but its purpose has remained the same since its inception 150 years ago—service to others.

THEME: DISCIPLESHIP AROUND THE WORLD

Health & Wellness: *From our Parish Nurse, Teresa Field*

The term Metabolic Syndrome is a dangerous condition, and it is becoming more common in the United States. So what the heck is it, and how can one prevent it? It means that one has three or more of these five health factors:

1. High blood pressure, which is 130/80mmHg or higher. An elevated blood pressure makes one's heart work harder and damages one's blood vessels over time.
2. Excess body fat with a large waist, 40 inches or more for men and 35 inches or more in women.
3. High triglyceride level, which is 150 mg/dL or more. If one's level is high, one may have increased fatty deposits on the walls of one's blood vessels.
4. Low HDL cholesterol level, less than 40 mg/dL for men or 50 mg/dL or less for women. HDL is known as "good" cholesterol. I remember the H in HDL as Healthy. If one's level is low, one's blood vessels are not as protected.
5. High blood sugar levels, which is fasting blood glucose levels greater than 100 mg/dL or more. The extra glucose can damage the blood vessels.

Having three of these risk factors puts one at an elevated risk for heart disease, stroke, and diabetes, with the more risk factors, the greater one's quality of life is decreased.

Some symptoms to look for in high blood pressure are fatigue, vision changes, headaches, and one may even become more anxious. With elevated blood sugars or diabetes, one may be extra hungry, extra thirsty, and one may be urinating more often. Undiagnosed or untreated sleep apnea increases one's risk for all of these factors also. Sleep apnea can be easily dismissed, so please let your healthcare provider know if you have

or have been told you have poor sleep habits.

Treatment for metabolic syndrome is to lower one's risk for heart disease, stroke, and to prevent or manage Type 2 diabetes. Can metabolic syndrome be prevented? In many cases it can be prevented and altered by having a healthy lifestyle. Making lifestyle changes isn't easy. One can try to decrease and finally eliminate junk food, and get help to stop smoking if need be, decrease alcohol intake, eat less processed foods, and cook fresh food more often. Eating healthy does not have to be a chore anymore. There are many websites and recipes geared to healthy changes that truly taste good. Ask your healthcare provider for a dietary consult for help if needed.

A website I like is Blue Zones, and there are books on the Blue Zone's lifestyle and secrets to living longer and with better health. You might like to know that having a strong personal faith is one of the components. Starting a regular exercise routine will also help. Start making small goals. You may want to find a person who you know to help you stay on track. Keep in mind that we all have times when it's hard to stick to the plan. Don't get discouraged; if you slip, you just have to start up again the next day. We need to work at it every day and not beat ourselves up when we slip. Change that negative self-talk to positive self-talk. Remember to modify the things we can modify. We need to be happy with our accomplishments, whatever they are, because making healthy choices are a big deal over time.

For lent many people give up something, but this year, like last, I have decided to think of lent as a gift we give ourselves as Jesus gave us the gift of His life and salvation. If you would like to make a plan and set healthy goals for lent, give me a call, and we can help each other to stay motivated and encourage each other, which we will need.

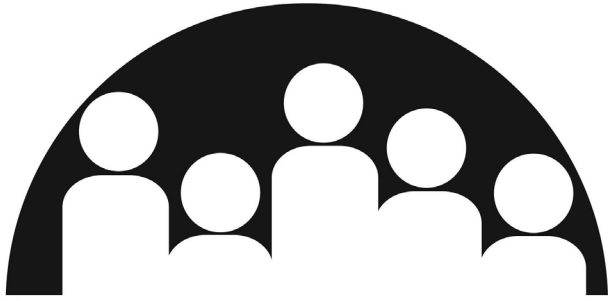

TRUSTEES' REPORT - MARCH 2022

Recent issues with the church's main heating system: We have since replaced one boiler and repaired a second, giving us three (out of five) operational units; this is sufficient to meet our heating needs for the remainder of the season. The units have also been updated to meet all current codes. We will be doing an assessment of costs related to replacing the two remaining non-operating boilers prior to the start of the next heating season.

Upcoming Projects:

- 🔑 Concrete repair and replacement. Remove and replace the ramp on the east (alley) side of the church, repair or replace the uneven slabs at the main entrance, and replace concrete at the handicap entrance that interferes with the exterior doors there. Approximate cost \$7000.00
- 🔑 Repair and painting water-damaged plaster and ceiling tile inside the handicap entrance. Cost TBD
- 🔑 Parsonage: interior painting and deck repair. Cost TBD
- 🔑 We are currently seeking bids for an annual contract from mechanical contractors to maintain the church's HVAC and plumbing systems as our current agreement with Northern Illinois Mechanical is set to expire in March.

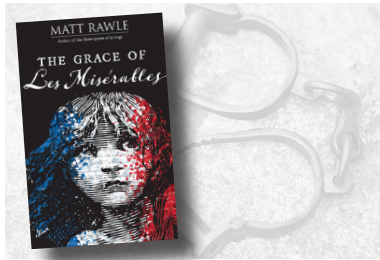

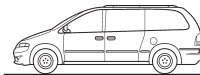
