Journeying with Jesus

¹³⁻¹⁶ That same day two of them were walking to the village Emmaus, about seven miles out of Jerusalem. They were deep in conversation, going over all these things that had happened. In the middle of their talk and questions, Jesus came up and walked along with them. But they were not able to recognize who he was.

Luke 24:13-16 MSG

He Arose! Hallelujah! Yes, we celebrated Easter, and we are continuing the journey God has put before us. That is where we find two disciples of Jesus on a seven-mile stretch from Jerusalem to Emmaus, according to Luke. Two disciples of Jesus, one named Cleopas and an unnamed other, are walking away from the disaster of Good Friday and the bewilderment of Easter. Luke does not disclose why Emmaus is their destination. Are they fleeing to a hiding place? Do they have family there? Is it simply a significant place where people gather and share the most recent events? The other disciples had decided to lay-low and stay put in Jerusalem, according to other Gospel writers. Yet, these two keep walking, and the risen Lord and Savior, Jesus, joins them on the road.

Jesus comes to them as a stranger who joins them on the way. He is a traveling companion and gets in on their conversation. "What are you discussing with each other while you walk along?" he asks (v. 17). Cleopas wonders if their fellow traveler has been living like an ostrich with his head in the ground. Cleopas goes on to tell him the story of what happened to Jesus of Nazareth, and their hope about him as "the one to redeem Israel" to his tragic crucifixion and the puzzlement of the empty tomb (vv. 18-24). They had walked with Jesus on many miles, and all that time they thought they were moving toward a promised destination, a different outcome. Now they seemed to be just walking with no real purpose in mind.

As Jesus walks with them on this road to nowhere, he begins to tell them about a longer journey. Starting with the journey of God's people from bondage in Egypt to liberation under Moses to the time of the prophets and all the signs along the way, Jesus walked them through God's plan for his people and his own death and resurrection as both a destination and a new beginning. They invite this stranger to stay with them, and when sitting at table together, they suddenly recognize it's the risen Jesus they've been walking with all along. Jesus disappears, but they start walking back to Jerusalem and into a new future. Emmaus wasn't their finish line after all, just another stop on the journey of following the Lord.

If there's anything the Emmaus Road story teaches us, it's that the disciples of Jesus are at their best when they keep journeying with Jesus. Disciples are willing to journey with Jesus despite the dangers and potential risks they may experience, and they offer hospitality to others who may not yet recognize him. Disciples also know that *they can't walk the journey alone*.



Adult groups have not only met for Sunday study but functioned as *fellowship groups*. The *Better Living Class*, which existed past year 2000, had offices and gatherings for support, fellowship, and faithful *Better Living*. Room 209, on the second floor, has the name *Lamplighters* on its door. *Lamplighters* continues to

meet for fellowship and mutual support.



Many groups have existed as short-term study, learning, and discussion groups. They have had a variety of focuses: Bible & scripture, book & reading, mission learning, and support of missions. There is a place for each and everyone to join, share in, and even to develop anew.

A MATTER OF BALANCE

I'm planning to hold a Matter of Balance Class in May & June at the church. This eight-session course is sponsored by Lifescape through a grant. Please consider signing up for this informative and active exercising class through the church office.

Here are a couple facts concerning falls:

- About one-third of the senior population over the age of 65 falls each year. Not surprisingly, the percentage grows proportionately with age.
- More than half of the population who are 80 years old will fall at least once every year, but remember the flip side, there is still a strong percentage of seniors over 80 who do not fall in a given year.

In this class you will learn strategies to prevent falls and you will be given a free workbook with loads of tips and resources in fall prevention. In this class we discuss fears of falling and steps to combat fears along with evidence-based exercises to help prevent falls. Each week we will discuss a new topic pertaining to falls and safety and follow the evidence-based program. I will plan to have a guest speaker (physical therapist) to visit the class to teach us new information and how to get up from a fall properly.

Now I'm going to change gears and discuss how we can help Pastor Cal. An article was given to me recently, and I thought it was worth sharing with you. The article talks about calling the pastor. Most pastors will agree that one of the most frustrating experiences of pastoral care is when a church member in need will not call the pastor. And worse, sometimes, the pastor is then criticized for not making a hospital call or visiting the home. Pastors can do many things, but they cannot read minds. This is why it is important to encourage the homebound to call their pastor in times of need. Are you discouraged and worried? Call the pastor. Tell him or her about your concerns and let them pray for you. Your pastor likes to do this.

Are you going into the hospital? Please tell your pastor! The pastor considers hospital visitation an important part of pastoral care. Pastors are pastors because they are a channel of grace and support for people in their hour of need. But if pastors do not know about someone's hospital stay, they can't do what God has called then to do. Would you like some company? Pastors don't mind visiting the homebound. In fact, it's part of their job description, and they love to do it.

Perhaps you do not have a particular reason to see the pastor, but nevertheless, you feel it would be good to have some company, and perhaps it has been a while since you visited with the pastor. Put in the call......

The same goes for the parish nurse; if you would like a visit or have a concern that you think I can assist you with, please give me a call also. Don't think that Pastor Cal or I are too busy or that you don't want to bother us. Those are a couple remarks I have heard in the past. I know Pastor Cal loves what he does, and I can say I'm very blessed working also in pastoral care.....so give us a call.


