

# Stand Firm

And Moses said to the people, "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the LORD, which he will work for you today; for the Egyptians whom you see today, you shall never see again."

Exodus 14:13, RSV



### The Setting...

V 1–4: FOLLOWING The children of Israel are following God's plan and God's servant Moses. God reveals that Pharaoh will pursue them, believing that they are lost and discouraged in the wilderness. This is God's plan to overthrow Pharaoh and his army, and teach the Egyptians that He is the Lord. V 5–9: FICKLE Pharaoh continues

to break his word. He mobilizes all Egypt's chariots to pursue the Israelites. They catch up with the Israelites as they camp beside the Red Sea. **V 10–12: FEAR** Faced with the sight of the Egyptians coming after them, the Israelites fear and tell Moses that they should have carried on serving the Egyptians rather than coming to die in the wilderness. Like Pharaoh, they are also fickle, but for a different reason. They are fearful because of their "*lack of trust in God.*" **V 13–14: FIRM** Moses is rock solid in his trust in God. He tells them to *stand firm* and see God's salvation, which He will accomplish. The Egyptian army will be overthrown because God will fight for His people and give them peace.<sup>1</sup>

Before them was the Red Sea; behind them was the Egyptian army; so that there was no way out for them but "upwards." Paul writes these words to the church in Corinth; "<sup>7</sup> But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, to show that the transcendent power belongs to God and not to us. <sup>8</sup> We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; <sup>9</sup> persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed;" **2** Corinthians 4:7-9. In the above selected scripture, Exodus 14:13, Moses directs the people of God to; "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the LORD, which he will work for you today." The word "today" references their yesterday (past) and their tomorrow (future). Moses is reminding them and us that in the midst of our seemingly insurmountable circumstances, we need to remember God's past blessings and presence as well as God's plans for our future and a hope.

They decided to give themselves up for lost; as if God's arm were shortened all of a sudden, and he were not able to work miracles *to-day* as he has *yesterday*, they stressout and can count upon nothing but *dying in the wilderness*. How naive was their distrust! Did they not see themselves under the guidance and protection of a pillar from heaven? Has God's almighty power ever failed them? Moses directs them to leave it to God, in a silent expectation of the event: *"Stand firm*, and think not to save yourselves either by fighting or fleeing; wait and observe God's course to take. Compose yourselves, by having confidence in God, and the peaceful prospect of the great salvation God is now about to work for you.

# Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

ne of the health observances for November in America is Diabetes Awareness Month. The year 2021 marked the 100th anniversary of the discovery of insulin. Before insulin was discovered, people with diabetes did not live long lives. Even though there is no cure yet, people do live productive lives managing their diabetes. Today diabetes is considered an epidemic. It is estimated that 37.3 million people in the U.S. (about 1 in 10) have the disease and 1 in 5 don't even know they have it.

There are two main types of diabetes: Type 1 and Type 2. Also a small percentage of women develop diabetes during pregnancy which is called *gestational diabetes*. The good news is that if you are at risk of Type 2 diabetes you may be able to lower the risk by more than half by making healthy changes. Some of the changes will include:

- Losing Weight: Are you more than 20% over your ideal weight? Losing even a few pounds can help you prevent type 2.
- Making Healthy Food Choices: Follow simple daily guidelines, like eating fresh vegetables, fruits, and whole grains. Limit fat to 30% or less of your daily calories, and watch your portion sizes. Healthy eating habits can go a long way in preventing diabetes and other health problems.
- **Staying Active**: Regular exercise can help prevent type 2 diabetes. It can also help you lose weight, manage stress, and feel better.

Here is a brief introduction of how insulin works. As we eat our bodies break down the food we eat into simple sugars called *glucose*, which the body uses for energy. *Insulin* is a hormone that your body needs to get glucose from the bloodstream into the cells of the body for energy. Insulin is produced in the organ called the *pancreas*. Approximately 90% of all cases of diabetes are type 2. In type 2 the body does not use the hormone insulin properly. The glucose stays circulating in the blood stream and is unable to get into the cells where it is needed for energy. Hyperglycemia is the name for high blood sugar. Some symptoms of hyperglycemia one may notice is frequent urination, increased thirst, and blurry vision. Type 2 is treated with lifestyle changes, oral medications, and or insulin injections. Type 1 diabetes is usually

h injections. Type 1 diabetes is usually diagnosed in children & young adults. It was previously known as *juvenile diabetes*. Type 1 is caused by the body's autoimmune attack, which kills insulin producing *beta cells* in the pancreas. In type 1 the body does not produce insulin.

Most of us have heard of the A1C blood lab test. This test is a powerhouse of a test and helps you and your healthcare professionals know how you have been managing your health over the past two to three months. This test can be used to identify *prediabetes* and can also be used to diagnose diabetes. The higher the levels, the greater your risk of developing diabetes complications. Most healthcare professionals will test your A1C twice a year and more often if your goals are not being met. This test can show you how your choices and adhering to medication can make a difference in your control of blood sugar readings. This test should be a motivating factor for you in active management of your own care.



# Mission POSSIBLE!

"With humans this is impossible, but with GOD all things are possible." Matthew 19:26

### The WORKS OF GOD DISPLAYED IN US!

Pastor Cal read a message about a ship, which when built, has a mission. But if that ship is built in a bottle, the bottleneck is too narrow and the ship is not going anywhere. We need to not be the bottleneck that is causing our ship to not fulfill its mission. We need to ask ourselves: where are we going, what are we doing, and why are we here at this location?

Theme for our ministry year 2022-23: Born 2 Change; Change 2 Be Born. Joan Tunnell, Chair of Administrative Council, narrated slides which showed what we are currently doing.

- Youth in Leadership Liturgists, Ushers, Acolytes, Tech Team, Facetime Hosts
- Nurture & Outreach Methodist Mondays, Hot Chocolate to passersby, Holiday bags to homebound, social time i.e. bowling, Rally Day invites to those not seen attending recently
- Domestic Violence dispersal of information, tour of Peace Center
- Adult Sunday School studying Matthew currently
- Music groups Handbells, Chancel Choir, Youth Choir
- United Women of Faith have speakers, social time, sales to support missions
- Local Missions since March 2022 distributed over \$800 to various organizations
- Strength & Balance Class lead by our Parish Nurse to promote health and wellness
- Quilters using sewing ability to create beautiful quilts and promoting closer relationships
- Journeymen weekly Bible study for men
- United Methodist Men help with manpower for many events, sponsor fund raisers
- Jeremiah Development serving as needed to help improve the neighborhood
- Thanksgiving Dinner distributing food on the holiday for those in need
- Trustees maintaining our physical space

Chair of Stewardship, Jeanine Wang, talked about what brought us to today. Stewardship Committee raised the question: are we being good stewards of our finances, our memorial funds, our building, our resources? Out of this they developed the survey asking the congregation about our Hopes, Dreams, Concerns, Suggestions, and Questions about Court Street UMC. Jeanine recapped the responses they had received and published in the September 2022 Chimes.

Chair of Trustees, DuWayne Stanis, presented what the Trustees had done and the costs for projects completed in 2021 costing \$35,500, and until now in 2022, costing \$12,000. He also presented a list of projects in process with the estimated costs totaling \$223,500, as well as a list of future repairs/replacements.

Church Treasurer, Gene Ferry, presented a summary of Income/Expenses/Net for the years 2017-2021. He gave us a summary of how we have made up the deficit each year as well as our funding coming from the Perry Trust (a

gift from the Perry Sisters, which we will continue to receive each year as long as we remain Court Street UMC). A summary of our Endowment Fund invested at Savant showed that, even though we ended in 2007 with a balance of \$1,603,000, and have withdrawn over \$2,227,000, we currently have a total balance of \$1,060,000, of which we have \$560,000, which we can use for anything. The remaining balance of \$500,000 is in dedicated or restricted funds. The Finance Committee is planning a Capital Improvements Campaign to begin in January 2023.

Jeanine Wang asked for questions of the leadership.

- What happens to the church building if we decide to sell? Pastor Cal stated he believed that the proceeds from sale of the building would go to the Conference and they would hold it for us as long as we stay a United Methodist congregation. Rev. Wang stated that there were lawyers in the Conference who would help us figure out how to go about selling and what would happen to the proceeds.
- Have we completed our mission at this location? Do we stay? Move on? Any time we say our church is the building it is a mistake. The people are the church something to consider in our groups.
- What is the purpose of this meeting? Brainstorming ideas as to what we can do in and for our future. Come up with an action plan. We know we want to stay together as we are family.

#### Small group discussion results:

- Formalized contract with another local church regarding shared space
- Worship in Chapel periodically
- Rent Chapel to smaller church
- Combine with other churches for social activities
- Set up Blessing Box (outside box of non-perishable foods) for our neighbors
- Set up Urgent Care with OSF at our church
- Fix roof
- Remain a connectional church
- Contact/invite new renters in Trust Building, Talcott, Lofts, etc.
- Invite people personally to help with worthwhile outreach projects
- Need to update Chapel sound/recording, and determine temperature needed to maintain Sanctuary organ if we move our worship to Chapel
- Ask city to buy building and we rent from them
- Desire to stay on west side of city, right here, where there's much need
- Reach out to young men of color
- Advertise in Chicago area as a wedding site
- Rent classrooms to Rock Valley College and Rockford Business College
- Repurpose gym for loft space or something else
- Remove gym altogether and use roof top of 2nd floor for outside events
- Serve breakfast before church for a price
- Bring in Gary Anderson or Justin Fern to advise on building ideas
- Bring building to code to do Preschool/Daycare modeled after Christ UMC
- Do some 'outrageous' activity to engage people
- Do Special Sundays see attached sheet
- Renew contemporary service, maybe in new format
- Reach out to black pastors' group and collaborate on a project
- Advertise on the outside of church banners/electronic sign/'projection' on Jefferson St. wall
