Prayer



¹⁶ Rejoice always, ¹⁷ pray continually, ¹⁸ give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

1 Thessalonians 5:16-18, NIV

In the New Testament, there are two modes of prayer. One is **per**sonal and private prayer of the individual, and Jesus advises keeping it private: "But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your

Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Matthew 6:6). While the first purpose of personal prayer is personal fellowship with God, there is nothing to tell us that we shouldn't pray for others in our private prayer life. In fact, Paul urges praying for everything. He says, "In everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God" (Philippians 4:6), and that can certainly include prayer for others, even people we don't know.

The other mode of prayer in the New Testament is **public and communal**. It is the prayers of the church, the collective and corporate expression of believers gathered for worship, prayer and Bible study. There are several places where Paul asks churches to pray for him and his coworkers. There are also passages that show the early church praying for safe travel for others, for boldness to proclaim their faith, for the rescue of the persecuted and for the spiritual growth of others.

Yes, we all need to "pray continually," which stresses the urgency associated with acknowledging our need for God's will and desire to be done. The following quotes reflect that need

Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

Q. How does Monkeypox spread?

A. Transmission can occur from person-to-person or from an animal to a person. According to the Centers for Disease and Prevention (CDC), monkeypox spreads through "close, personal, often skin-to-skin contact." The virus can spread by: direct close personal/intimate (including sexual) contact with the infectious rash, scabs, or body fluids. Respiratory secretions during prolonged, face-to-face contact or during intimate contact. Touching meat of an infected animal as well as their body fluid secretions. Touching clothing, bedding or objects that have touched by a sick animal or person. From a woman who's infected to her baby *in utero* through the placenta.

It is important to contain monkeypox so it doesn't spread among animals that easily transmit viruses. This virus is spread very differently than COVID-19. Where COVID-19 spreads through droplets in the air that travels fast and wide, the monkeypox virus spreads through close contact with a person who's actively infected.

Q. What are Monkeypox symptoms?

A. The virus is associated with flu-like symptoms. Symptoms usually appear one to two weeks after initial exposure and can last five days to three weeks. The most common symptoms include: fever, chills, headache, muscle weakness aches, fatigue, painful rash with blisters, and swollen lymph nodes.

Q. What does Monkeypox look like?

A. Monkeypox looks like pimples or blisters that appear on the face, inside the mouth, and on other parts of the body, like the hands, feet, chest, and genitals.

Q. Can my pet get Monkeypox?

A. Rodents, like rats, mice, and rabbits are the most likely to be affected. If you're infected with the virus, isolate yourself from pets as a safety precaution.

As the current monkeypox outbreak is growing, Dr. Douglas Kasper, an infectious disease expert at OSF Health Care, answers the most frequently asked questions.

Q. What is Monkeypox?

A. It is a viral infection. Pox-related infections are nothing new. For example, chickenpox is something that most people have seen or had themselves. What makes a pox virus is the raised skin lesions that go along with the virus. This virus was actually first recognized in a study with monkeys in the 1950s and the first human cases were recorded in the 1970s.

Q. Is Monkeypox deadly?

A. For most people, it isn't a life-threatening disease, and symptoms will last from two to four weeks. However, it can lead to more serious illnesses like pneumonia or encephalitis (brain swelling or infection), particularly in people with poor immune systems, pregnant women, and children 8 and under.

Q. Is Monkeypox contagious?

A. Yes, it's contagious. However, it's not an airborne disease. Because of the way monkeypox spreads, it's not as contagious as other viruses, such as COVID-19. The risk level for the general population is low.

Q. Is there a vaccine for Monkeypox?

A. Yes, there is an FDA-approved vaccine. The vaccine can prevent and cure the virus. Monkeypox is known as a zoonosis. That means it is an infectious agent that originated with animals and spread to humans. Many viruses start out this way, which means we already have a proven and safe monkeypox vaccine that is effective at preventing the spread of the virus. These types of vaccines have been used for many decades

Federal health officials recently declared monkeypox a public health emergency. As a result, the vaccine and drug treatments will likely become more widely available as production ramps up. There is limited supply in the United States, and supply is managed by the CDC and the state health departments.

Other disease prevention tips are:

- Wash hands with warm water and soap 20 seconds or longer.
- Disinfect frequently touched areas.

Q. What do I do if I get Monkeypox?

A. Symptoms of monkeypox can be alleviated with over-the-counter medications like fever reducers and pain relievers. If you have a rash or skin legions, soaking in a warm bath with oatmeal can help alleviate the itch. With any illness, take other necessary precautions....get plenty of rest, isolate yourself from others, and stay home from work or school. If you're infected and have a lasting fever or swollen lymph nodes, call your health care provider. If you experience trouble breathing, a stiff neck, or chest pain, go to your nearest emergency department.


