Expectations



So John summoned two of his disciples 19 and sent them to the Lord to ask, "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to expect someone else?"

Luke 7:18a-19, NRSV

The story of the incarcerated and doubting prophet John the Baptist reinforces the truth that Jesus failed to meet the expectations of many, even his cousin John. John had been in prison for months, and he knew what Jesus was doing because his own disciples kept him informed. I am sure it was difficult for John, accustomed to a wilder-

ness life, to be confined to a prison. The physical and emotional strain associated with his confinement was real, and the long days of waiting were trying. John decides to send two of his disciples with an amazing question; "Are you the one who is to come, or are we to expect someone else?" So unorthodox is Jesus' kingdom that John had doubts influenced by his expectations of the Messiah. This same John heard the voice of God, which stated; "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased." This is the same John who identified Jesus as; "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!" In his mind the Messiah of the kingdom of God would overcome the Romans by fighting fire with fire. Never could John have dreamed of a kingdom in which the King dies for those he loved. Never in John's wildest dreams would he expect the fire of hate would be conquered by the living water of love.

²⁰ When the men came to Jesus, they said, "John the Baptist sent us to you to ask, Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?" ²¹ At that very time Jesus cured many who had diseases, sicknesses and evil spirits, and gave sight to many who were blind. ²² So he replied to the messengers, "Go back and report to John what you have seen and heard: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is proclaimed to the poor. ²³ Blessed is anyone who does not stumble on account of me." Only Jesus would respond with a blessing in reference to John's doubt. Doubt is a matter of the mind; we cannot understand what God is doing or why God is doing it. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD.² Oswald Chambers states, "Doubt is not always a sign that a person is wrong, it may be a sign that they are thinking." John was perplexed about God's plan and his place in God's plan. Yet, John had the great privilege as God's messenger of introducing the Messiah to Israel and ultimately the world. Praise God!

I pray this short narrative will remind us that we all have times in ministry with God to doubt due to our expectations. And we forget that God is the originator and finisher of all our endeavors in ministry. Our expectations should expect God to complete what God planned not what we expect.



Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse

ne of the National Health Observances for April is IBS (Irritable Bowel Syndrome). IBS is a long term digestive condition. Many people remain undiagnosed and are unaware that their symptoms indicate a medically recognized disorder. What does "irritable" mean? It means that nerve endings in the bowel wall, which control muscle function and affect sensation of the gut, are unusually sensitive. The impact of IBS varies with each person and symptom episodes are often unpredictable. In the United States alone it affects over 30 million people. It can affect male, female, young, and old. This can relate to one in seven to one in ten Americans. The cause of IBS is not completely understood. Many times no structural abnormality that would explain symptoms shows up on tests. There are possible factors like genetics, infections, and trauma that may predispose someone to IBS. Although there is currently no cure for IBS, there are ways to improve symptoms and feel better.

If one's daily routine is often ruled by intestinal discomfort, you need to seek medical help and obtain a proper diagnosis. IBS is characterized by abdominal pain or discomfort associated with changes in bowel habit (diarrhea and/or constipation), bloating or a sense of gaseousness, along with other symptoms. The pain is often relieved by having a bowel movement and, at times, IBS can be worsened after eating. There can be times when symptoms flare up as well as times of remission when the symptoms can diminish or disappear. IBS may be complex, but there are ways to help manage it.

After a diagnosis, the first line of treatment for IBS includes general measures such as establishing and maintaining an effective patient-doctor relationship and obtaining education about IBS. IBS may not be easy to talk to your doctor about, but it is essential; do not be afraid to talk to your doctor. Good communication during the course of care has been shown to significantly increase patient satisfaction, symptom improvement, daily function, and quality of life. One also needs to make lifestyle changes that may be as-

sociated with symptoms. "Lifestyle" refers to things in your life you have control over. It means to evaluate dietary or stress related factors with your healthcare provider. Stress can often be a culprit with IBS flares. If lifestyle changes do not completely relieve IBS symptoms, a number of medications may be helpful and will need to be discussed.

IBS is often called a brain-gut disorder because it usually involves the large intestine (colon) and small intestine with disturbances of intestinal bowel (gut) motor function (motility) and sensation. These gut related activities are regulated by the brain. When stress hormones are released, they affect the mind and gut simultaneously.

"Stress" is a term doctors use to describe normal response in the body that are needed for health and survival. One way to understand IBS is that there is an increase gastrointestinal response to stress. Stressors are any factors that produce stress. People suffering with IBS have to work with developing a management plan to help decrease symptoms and improve quality of life. Since lifestyle choices and stressors are so individual, plans have to be made individually.

The digestive tract contains trillions of bacteria. Research is currently showing that the composition of these bacteria may affect health & disease. There is now some evidence that certain probiotics may help improve IBS symptoms. There is also a potential role for some "bad" bacteria residing in the gut to be associated with IBS symptoms in some people. Clinical trials have shown that antibiotics, which reduce or alter the bacteria in the gut, may relieve the symptoms of IBS.


