What To Do?



The priests who carried the ark of the covenant of the LORD stopped in the middle of the Jordan and stood on dry ground, while all Israel passed by until the whole nation had completed the crossing on dry ground.

Joshua 3:17, NIV

The people of Israel were standing on the banks of the Jordan River water edge, wondering **what to do**. Like their ancestors on the edge of the Red Sea, they wondered how they were ever going to get across. Moses was dead, so he couldn't, raise his staff and stretch out his hand over the sea to divide the water. But God was with them, and he had just made a promise to their new leader Joshua. "This day I will begin to exalt you in the sight of all Israel, God said, so that they may know that I will be with you as I was with Moses" (v.

7). The Moses generation was ending and the Joshua generation was beginning. God begins to exalt Joshua and promises to be with him. So what does Joshua instruct the Israelites to do? I would love to share three pivotal actions in reference to our journey forward with God:

Begin by listening. Joshua said to the Israelites, "Come here and listen to the words of the LORD your God" (v. 9). Joshua instructs the people to fall into formation behind God, not to march ahead of God. This is demonstrated when the people set out from their tents and "the priests bearing the ark of the covenant [are] in front of the people" (v. 14). The ark represents the presence and the power of "the living God," moving ahead of the people (v. 10). We are challenged to do the same today, that is, to listen to the word of God and follow where God leads us. God really wants to guide us in the path that is best for us, giving us words of instruction designed to help us, not to hurt us.

Move forward one small step at a time. "When those who bore the ark had come to the Jordan, and the feet of the priests bearing the ark were dipped into the edge of the water, the waters flowing from above stood still, rising up in a single heap" (vv. 15-16). Notice that the priests just dipped their feet into the edge of the water, instead of plunging into the deepest part of the river. Then the people crossed over the Jordan. We dip our feet into the water when we move forward, one step at a time. "Take the first step in faith," said the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. "You don't have to see

the whole staircase; just take the first step." Watch and wait for what God will do, both *for* you and *through* you. The help that God provides makes a huge impact, but comes in the form of small acts of healing, protection and peace.

Keep your eyes on the future, not the past. Joshua tells us that after the people had crossed the Jordan, "the priests bearing the ark of the covenant of the LORD came up from the middle of the Jordan, and the soles of the priests' feet touched dry ground, then the waters of the Jordan returned to their place and overflowed all its banks, as before" (4:18). As soon as the people crossed the river, it began to flow again. God takes the very circumstances that once seemed to impede our progress, and reconfigures those circumstances in such a way that we're now able to proceed and move forward into God's future!



Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse, Teresa Field

This month I would like to discuss keeping up with wellness checks, and I will be writing about glaucoma. Glaucoma is called the sneak thief of sight. Vision loss by glaucoma is caused by damage to the optic nerve. Increased eye pressure can damage the optic nerve. High eye pressure alone does not cause glaucoma. While eye pressure is important in glaucoma, it does not explain why glaucoma develops in patients. The optic nerve is responsible for carrying images from the eye to the brain. The optic nerve acts like an electric cable with over a million wires. Researches now view glaucoma as a disease of the brain, a neurodegenerative disease rather than just an eye disease. The understanding of one key to glaucoma is in the connections within the retina and the brain. This ongoing research is leading to advances and may well lead to new treatments and possibly a cure one day. A study shows that blindness ranks third (after cancer & heart disease) as people's major

It is estimated that over three million Americans have glaucoma but only half know they have it. The majority of patients diagnosed with glaucoma have minimal symptoms, and once vision is lost from glaucoma, it is permanent. Vision loss begins with peripheral or side vision. One may compensate and not notice this due to unconsciously turning ones head to see until significant vision is lost. The good news is that glaucoma is treatable. This is why it is so very important to be tested throughout one's lifetime. Glaucoma is the leading cause of preventable blindness. We all need to raise awareness about the seriousness of regular eye exams. Glaucoma can affect people of all ages; however, the most common forms primarily affect the middle-aged and the elderly. After cataracts, glaucoma is the leading cause of blindness among African Americans and people of African descent. It is six to eight time more common in African Americans than in Caucasians. A

fear.

person is six times more likely to get glaucoma if one is over sixty years of age. A family history also increases the risk. The most common type is primary open-angle glaucoma. If a member in your immediate family has the disease, you are at a higher risk than the general population. Research also shows the risk for Hispanic and Latinos is greater than for those with European ancestry, and the risk also increases among Hispanics over sixty. An eye health survey found that 76 percent of Hispanics did not know that their ethnicity is a factor for glaucoma. Another form of glaucoma

known as acute angle closure has traditionally been more common in people of Asian descent.

It is recommended that your eyes should be tested: before 40, every two to four years, from 40 to 54 every one to three years, from 55 to 64, every one to two years, and after 65, every six to twelve months. Anyone with high risk factors should be tested every year or two after age 35.

Tips to remember:

- 1. Tell everyone on your health team, including all your doctors, that you have glaucoma if you do. This will help them when prescribing medications and to be careful when using medications with cortisone.
- 2. Report any changes to your doctor, especially eye irritation, watering, blurring, scratchiness, unusual discharge, temporarily cloudy vision, or rainbows around lights at night.
- 3. When you go to see your doctor, write down questions before you go and write down your doctors answers.




