## Memorial

<sup>7</sup> tell them that the flow of the Jordan was cut off before the ark of the covenant of the LORD. When it crossed the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan were cut off. These stones are to be a **memorial** to the people of Israel forever." Joshua 4:7, NIV

Human beings like to remember things, special things, and they do so in remarkably creative ways. And so we come to Memorial Day, a day to remember. Memorial Day is a federal holiday in the United States for remembering the people who died while serving in the country's armed forces. The holiday, which is observed every year on the last Monday of May, originated as Decoration Day after the American Civil War in 1868, when the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of Union veterans founded in Decatur, Illinois, established it as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the Union war dead with flowers. By the 20th century, competing Union and Confederate holiday traditions, celebrated on different days, had merged, and Memorial Day eventually extended to honor all Americans who died while in the military service. Yet for many, it's simply a day off work, a holiday, and each year the people that gather in cemeteries to honor the dead get a little smaller.

People of faith should appreciate a biblical perspective on memorials and the importance of remembering. Take a look at Joshua 4:4-7. It refers to a memorial: "Then Joshua summoned the twelve men from the Israelites, whom he had appointed, one from each tribe. Joshua said to them, 'Pass on before the ark of the Lord your God into the middle of the Jordan, and each of you take up a stone on his shoulder, one for each of the tribes of the Israelites, so that this may be a sign among you. When your children ask in time to come, "What do those stones mean to you?" then you shall tell them that the waters of the Jordan were cut off in front of the ark of the covenant of the Lord. When it crossed over the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan were cut off. So these stones shall be to the Israelites a memorial forever." The people of Israel were on the final leg of their journey to the Promised Land after fleeing from slavery in Egypt. One final barrier lay before them: the Jordan River. This was an event worth memorializing, and God told Joshua to have one man from each of the 12 tribes take a stone from the riverbed and carry it onto the riverbank on the side of the newly entered territory, the Promised Land. There, Joshua heaped the 12 stones up as a memorial – a monument – to commemorate God's intervention, parting the river for them.

But here is a key insight: The meaning of past events can't be quite the same for us as for those who lived through them. So our job is not to force our kids to bow at our

> memorials, but to do what we can to help them understand why they have meaning for us! We can help them see our piles of stones, both literal and figurative ones, as memorials or at least milestones on the journey of life with God!

## "OUR BELL"

By O.L. Shaw Reproduced from the October 31,1946 *Chimes* 

Did you ever see the bell in the tower? Well, the rector recalls looking it over when it rested on heavy timbers in front of the church and seemed very large. To freshen his memory he climbed the belfry the other day and with our caretaker took some measurements. It stands 4 ft. 3 in. high, the diameter is 4 ft. 10 in., and the circumference at the base is 15 ft. 2 in.

There is a large wooden wheel at the side, over which the bell rope passes, that is 9 ft. in diameter. There is an inscription reading: "Presented by Charles Fletcher and wife to the Court Street M.E. Church, A.D. 1892, Meneely & CO., West Troy, New York." Inasmuch as the church was dedicated in 1887 it will be seen that for five years our congregation was called to worship by the bells of other churches. The heavy financial burden of building a parsonage in 1884 and the church soon after, at a combined cost of \$82,000.00, was quite a strain on the congregation and the purchase of the bell was left for later consideration.

At a meeting of the official board the matter was being discussed when Mr. Fletcher arose and asked the members if they really wanted a bell. The answer was in the affirmative and he said, "Very well, I will give you a bell." This gift probably represented the greatest sacrifice made by any family in the church. Mr. Fletcher was not a moneyed man. He was a market gardener owning several acres just north of the present site of the Poor Clares Convent. In those days potatoes sold for forty to fifty cents per bushel, sweet corn brought ten cents a dozen, three for a quarter, and melons were five and ten cents each, provided there were any left after the boys had helped themselves. To save from \$1500.00 to \$2000.00 from

such sales meant a staggering amount of work and planning. Both Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher were very happy over the gift, however, and never regretted their action.

Mr. Walter Keyt, 815 Ashland Avenue, tells an interesting story regarding the installation of the bell (Mr. Keyt and his uncle, David Keyt, were the architects and builders.). He had the runways and hoists built and a force of men to do the work. The bell was swung into place and properly anchored. The men were all cautioned to keep hands off. Mr. Fletcher had ordered that the bell was not to be sounded until the formal ringing Sunday morning. One overly enthusiastic workman said, "Let's see how she sounds," and with that dealt a deafening blow with a hammer that he was holding. Simultaneously with his strike, the head of "Daddy" Fletcher (as he was endearingly called) popped up through a trap door. The conversation that followed is not recorded. Mr. Keyt added that anything we might say regarding Mr. Fletcher's qualities would not be amiss. He was a fine typical Christian gentleman. It is known that from 1896 to 1937 that the bell was rung every Sunday for worship services. After 1937 the bell was only rung on New Year's Eve.




# ALL MEETING




