What do you want me to do for you? (Matt 20:32)



Why did Jesus ask questions?

- To set the context for learning
- To focus attention on something significant
- To promote self-examination
- To show an interest in others

Questions, among other things, give others the opportunity to learn, think, grow, and share.

Questions give us the opportunity to answer lovingly and carefully, knowing that our words may have eternal consequences. Honest questions can lead to faith-building answers.

Dave Gibbons in his book titled "the Monkey and the Fish" states that; **Questions, Instead of Answers, Will Guide Us.** Dave has a grid of questions that guides him in ministry, which are questions that become answers. These three questions are lights that guide us home:

- 1. Where is Nazareth? Can anything good come from Nazareth? Nathanael asked this question of his brother Philip about Jesus. (John 1:46) Can anything good come from the west side of the river? In other words, where are the most needy and marginalized? Those who are different from us (socially, financially, racially, etc...). Where should we be?
- 2. *What Is My Pain?* And we boast in the hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we also glory in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. (Romans 5:2b-4) Some people can't always relate to our successes but most people can relate to our pain or suffering. It supersedes those entities that so easily divide us (politics, culture, gender, economics, etc...). **How are we reaching the hurting?**
- 3. What Is in My Hand? Then the LORD said to him, "What is that in your hand?" "A staff," he replied. (Exodus 4:2) God gave Moses "Mission Possible" and Moses thought God had said "Mission Impossible." Moses hadn't figured in the "God factor" and he was more focused on what he didn't have than on what he did have. The staff he had, rendered in the service of God, becomes "Super Staff." Have we surrendered to God what we have in our hands?

It's not so much about the answers as it is about the questions!



Health & Wellness: Domestic Violence Awareness

Ctober is National Domestic Violence Awareness month. What is domestic violence? It's not just the degree of a visible sign, like a black eye or bruises from punches, that defines an act of abusive behavior. It is the presence of the behavior itself and the resulting atmosphere of power and control. Abuse and battering are all acts that harm, gain, or maintain power and control over another person. Domestic violence has many forms and includes, but is not limited to, physical, emotional, psychological, economic, sexual abuse, or sexual exploitation. It is any threatening behavior that holds back an individual's personal power and/or creates an atmosphere of fear and intimidation.

Domestic violence affects both men, women, and children of every race, religion, culture, and status. It is without a doubt that this behavior surpasses all demographics in all areas of our community and communities around the world.

Many private and public organizations have been working hard to bring more evidence-based programs and facilities to Rockford and the surrounding communities. In May of 2019, Mayor McNamara announced that the newest facility would be called the Family Peace Center: survivors of domestic violence informed city officials that the name should be warm and welcoming for survivors and their children. The Rockford Peace Center is an organization that has a multi-agency, multi-disciplinary, and co-located service center that provides services to victims of interpersonal violence, including intimate partner violence, sexual assault, child abuse, elder or dependent adult abuse, and human trafficking. Both public and private agencies provide services from one location. The center's goals are to reduce the number of places people must go for help, increase access to service, and support victims and their children.

It has been documented, and published outcomes show that Family Peace Centers like the Family Peace Center in Rockford have helped their communities. The statistics show reduced homicides, increased victim safety, increased autonomy and empowerment for victims, reduced fear and anxiety for families, reduced recantation, and minimization of victims when wrapped in services and support, increased efficiency in collaborative services to victims among service providers, increased prosecution of offenders, and dramatically increased community support for services to victims and their children.

The Family Peace Center in Rockford is the first Family Justice Center of its kind in Illinois. One of their goals is not to have anyone fall between the cracks.

Domestic violence calls to the police department are some of the most dangerous for police to respond to. First responders are trained to ask eleven critical questions of victims by helping victims to immediately call and connect them to a 24/7 hotline for help and shelter if needed. We are finding out that our society needs to reach children at an even younger age to help them make better choices and to not become involved in crime. Statistics show roughly 70% of juveniles are arrested for violent offenses either witnessed domestic violence in their homes or were victims themselves.

Since July of 2020, when the Family Peace Center opened its doors, they have seen approximately 1,700 clients. To date, violent crime that has been reported as domestic violence in nature has risen by 8.1% from 35.5% in 2022 to 43.6% in 2023. Even though the numbers are high, the hope is that more people are reporting to officials and seeking help to break the cycle.

Another agency that I would like to mention is Remedies Renewing Lives. Remedies is a non-profit organization that helps victims of domestic violence and offers outpatient addiction and mental health services as well as medication assistance treatments. Remedies also provides a safe and supportive environment with critical client centered services to promote healing of individuals and families. It has been helping the community for over 60 years and continues to evolve to help the community.

As a concerned and informed citizen, please continue to pray for our city, our officials, and all victims and survivors as we move forward. The church has a domestic violence committee; all are welcome to attend their monthly meetings. Please call the office if you would like to learn more and find ways to help.




