

The Stewardship Paradox

⁷ Each of you must make up your own mind about how much to give. But don't feel sorry that you must give and don't feel that you are forced to give. God loves people who love to give. ⁸ God can bless you with everything you need, and you will always have more than enough to do all kinds of good things for others. ⁹ The Scriptures say, "God freely gives his gifts to the poor, and always does right."

2 Corinthians 9:7-9, CEV



That's the surprising state of affairs in our society today, as we discover that cash cannot create contentment and possessions don't always provide us with a sense of peace. Yet, most of us expect that improvements in quality of life are going to make us feel better. But they don't — at least not by themselves. In his new book *The*

Progress Paradox, Gregg Easterbrook makes the point that life is getting better all the time: Our houses are bigger, our incomes are growing, our health is improving, and the environment is becoming cleaner. We are even enjoying a drop in crime rates, and decreases in certain problem areas such as divorce, teen pregnancy, drug use and abortion. So why isn't all this good news making us jump for joy? Easterbrook has some intriguing ideas about why we feel rotten in the middle of our nation's great riches, and how we can be simultaneously healthy and unhappy.

Writing to Christians in the wealthy Greek city of Corinth, Paul reminds them of their promise to give him a "bountiful gift" for the poor Christians in Jerusalem (2 Corinthians 9:5). Although he describes this as a completely voluntary gift, it is clear that he expects the Corinthians to be generous in their support, and he promises many rewards for their giving. For Paul, true happiness is found in what you give ... not in what you receive. "God loves a cheerful giver," he tells them, (v. 7). Paul asks the big question, "Are you looking for God to provide you with every blessing in abundance?" Then

Health & Wellness: From our Parish Nurse, Teresa Field

October is national hygiene month. Do not neglect your oral health. The best advice I can give is brush your teeth twice a day, floss once a day, and see your dentist regularly. This simple routine can help you maintain a healthy mouth for life. Did you know that the average adult between the ages of 20 and 64 has three or more decayed or missing teeth? Also, don't forget to replace your toothbrush every three to four months or sooner if the bristles are frayed. It is very important to floss because plaque that is not removed by brushing can eventually harden into calculus or tartar.

As we get older, we may enter a second round of cavity prone years. One common cause of cavities in older adults is dry mouth. Dry mouth is not a normal part of aging. However, it is a side-effect in more than 500 medications. This is just one reason why it is important to tell your dentist about medications you are taking, even non-prescriptions like allergy medication. Some recommendations to help dry mouth: use over the counter oral moisturizers, like a spray or mouth wash; swish water in your mouth, your mouth needs constant lubrication; use sugar free gum or lozenges to stimulate saliva production; get a humidifier

to help put moisture in the air; and avoid foods and beverages that irritate dry mouth, like coffee, alcohol, carbonated soft drinks, and acid fruit juices.

GUM DISEASE: Gum disease is often a painless condition until the advanced stages. Many older adults have gum, or periodontal disease, caused by the bacteria in plaque which irritates the gums, making them swollen, red, and more likely to bleed. Gums can begin to pull away from the teeth and make deepened spaces called pockets, where food particles and even more plaque may collect. This can lead to advanced gum disease, which can lead to tooth loss. The good news is that with regular dental visits gum disease can be treated or prevented entirely.

MOUTH CANCER: The American Cancer Society states that there are approximately 35,000 cases of

mouth, throat, and tongue cancers diagnosed each year, this is also why dental visits are important. In the early stages, oral cancer typically does not cause pain and early detection saves lives. Some symptoms you may see include open sores, white or reddish patches, and changes in the lips, tongue, and lining of the mouth that lasts more than two weeks. You know smoking is bad for you health, so there should be no surprise that cigarettes and chewing tobacco are also harmful to your oral health.

The question may arise, do I need to take antibiotics before a dental procedure? If you have a heart condition or artificial joint, be sure to tell your dentist. You may think it's not relevant, but there are conditions with a high risk of infection where an antibiotic is recommended prior and after some dental procedures.

Many retirees don't realize that medicare does not cover routine dental care. Begin to plan for your dental expenses in advance of retirement. You can search for a dental plan at the National Association of Dental Plans website. If you have concerns about continuing your dental care due to a limited

income, talk to your dentist. He or she may be able to offer solutions. Remember between the middle of the month and the end of the year is the time to look over your healthcare coverage and make changes for 2022.

For those of you who are >70.5
years old, this applies to you.
As the time to make our giving
commitment to the church for
2022 arrives, don't forget how
designating part or all of your
Required Minimum Distribution from your IRAs to Court
Street UMC can save on your Income Tax. It is a simple process.

Contact the church office for our Federal Tax ID number, which you then supply to your IRA account manager. Then decide what amount from your RMD you want to go to Court Street UMC. Your account manager will report this to the IRS, so it will NOT be counted towards your taxable income. A check made out to Count Street UMC will be supplied to you by your financial planner/account manager. You do NOT have to itemize taxes to get this benefit. This is one way to be good stewards of our money. Money saved on income taxes leaves you more discretionary funds to support other good causes. If you have questions, contact your financial planner/account manager.


