Because the Delta variant of the coronavirus has taken hold in our area, yesterday in worship Pastor Becky read the Mercer Health Urgent Message that was released on Friday, September 17. We have included this message in your packet. It serves as a reminder that part of Loving God & Loving Neighbor includes how we use medical resources that are currently strained and how we protect both ourselves and others. In our own congregation, just last week we had a family sent home from the ER twice due to over-capacity. Together, we can work to protect the most vulnerable in our community.

Youth programs began well last week. We offer Splash for 4th and 5th grade youth from 5:30-6:30 on Wednesday afternoons. These students are then invited to stay for dinner at 6:30. Junior high, senior high and confirmation all meet following dinner from 7:00-8:30 p.m.

The Busy 12 has made the difficult decision to disband at this time. The Busy 12 has been part of St. Paul Church for over a century and we celebrate the ministry of sewing they provided over the decades.

We are soliciting volunteers in the following areas:

- 1. Folk to coordinate bathroom renovations in the education building
- 2. Folk to call and send cards to our homebound folk
- 3. Digital greeters for Sunday mornings to greet the online worshipers at 10:15
- 4. Bible study leadership in a hybrid format: Zoom & inperson. (We have the technology in place for this)

This packet is mailed to approximately 510 households each week. Most of our recipients greatly appreciate the informationparticularly the worship bulletin that includes sermon and prayers. 
Read: Read the key verse from Sunday's reading.

May God give you God's best blessing. Amen.









OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Genesis 27:1-4, 15-23 (NRSV)

When Isaac was old and his eyes were dim so that he could not see, he called his elder son Esau and said to him, "My son"; and he answered, "Here I am."² He said, "See, I am old; I do not know the day of my death. ³ Now then, take your weapons, your quiver and your bow, and go out to the field, and hunt game for me. ⁴ Then prepare for me savory food, such as I like, and bring it to me to eat, so that I may bless you before I die."

Then Rebekah took the best garments of her elder son Esau, which were with her in the house, and put them on her younger son Jacob; ¹⁶ and she put the skins of the kids on his hands and on the smooth part of his neck. ¹⁷ Then she handed the savory food, and the bread that she had prepared, to her son Jacob.

¹⁸ So he went in to his father, and said, "My father"; and he said, "Here I am; who are you, my son?" ¹⁹ Jacob said to his father, "I am Esau your firstborn. I have done as you told me; now sit up and eat of my game, so that you may bless me." ²⁰ But Isaac said to his son, "How is it that you have found it so quickly, my son?" He answered, "Because the Lord your God granted me success." ²¹ Then Isaac said to Jacob, "Come near, that I may feel you, my son, to know whether you are really my son Esau or not." ²² So Jacob went up to his father Isaac, who felt him and said, "The voice is Jacob's voice, but the hands are the hands of Esau." ²³ He did not recognize him, because his hands were hairy like his brother Esau's hands; so he blessed him.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Gensis 28:10-17 (NRSV) Jacob left Beer-sheba and went toward Haran. ¹¹ He came to a certain place and stayed there for the night, because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of the place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. ¹² And he dreamed that there was a ladder set up on the earth, the top of it reaching to heaven; and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. ¹³ And the Lord stood beside him and said, "I am the Lord, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; ¹⁴ and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed¹ in you and in your offspring. ¹⁵ Know that I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." ¹⁶ Then Jacob woke from his sleep and said, "Surely the Lord is in this place—and I did not know it!" ¹⁷ And he was afraid, and said, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven."

SERMON

I only ran away from home once. I was maybe 8 years old and was tired of being the oldest child in a large household. I was angry at my parents and I wanted out. So, I packed a few things in a bag and walked (without telling my parents) a block over to my friend, Jan Jones', house. I figured I could live there until things got better at home.

Today's scripture lesson is a story of running away. Jacob was a man on the run. And while he is one of our faith fathers, he was not a saint by any means. Throughout his life, Jacob was either chasing or being chased.

Do you remember the story of his birth? It started in his mother's womb with his twin brother Esau. As Esau was coming out of his mother, there was Jacob's hand reaching for Esau's heel. It was as if Jacob was trying to push past his older brother. Their birth foreshadowed events to come.

And do you remember this? When Esau and Jacob were young men, Jacob tricked his older brother out of his birthright. Esau had come home from a day of hunting and was famished. Jacob had just prepared a delicious smelling stew, but offered it to his hungry brother in exchange for his birthright. Both young men were hungry: Esau for food and Jacob for power. Esau got that bowl of stew and Jacob got a birthright: his older brother's right to a double share of the inheritance and the title of number one son.

But even the birthright wasn't enough for Jacob. He also wanted his father's blessing, the blessing that rightfully belonged to Esau as the firstborn son. The first of today's lessons tells this story: about how Jacob's mother, Rebekah, helped trick her husband on Jacob's behalf. Esau was known to have hairy arms, so Rebekah dressed her son in Esau's best outfit and placed the skins of young lambs on his arms and neck. Jacob went into his father's room, and lied, saying, "Yes it's me Esau, your firstborn" Isaac gave Jacob his blessing—the blessing that was rightfully Esau's. Esau was left with nothing.

You need to know this. "Jacob" in Hebrew means "holder of the heel" or "supplanter", because he twice deprived his brother of his rights as the firstborn son. Jacob certainly lived up to his name as one who supplants. He deceitfully took a birthright and a blessing that did not belong to him. You can imagine Esau's reaction. He was furious and wanted to kill his brother.

Clearly, Jacob's life was in danger. So he left Beer-Sheba and fled toward Haran. Jacob was a wanted man, not just by Esau but ultimately by God. This journey was not just about Jacob's physical survival. It was really a spiritual journey. Jacob was running for his life in all senses of the word.

Most of us, I suspect, know what it is like to live life on the run. Some of us are running from our past, trying to escape guilt, regret, failures, disappointments. Some of us are trying to get away from the pain, loss, and brokenness of life. Sometimes we just want to leave behind the parts of our lives we dislike.

Other times we are running toward the future. For some, life on the run is a search for something or someone new; a job, a new toy, a new relationship. Maybe it is the search for answers. Who am I? What is this life all about? What's my purpose? Others, driven by crisis, chase after meaning. We figure if we run purposefully toward the future, trying to buy our way to success, we might just make it. And so we run.

We could each tell a story of life on the run. The story may be specific to us but it is really just another version of Jacob's story. Life on the run keeps us living and running on the horizontal axis. Reality and life are limited to the physical universe; time, space, matter, energy. We miss the spiritual and transcendent aspects of life, the vertical axis, because we are so busy running. Like Jacob, we soon discover that we can run, but we cannot hide, from God.

Life on the run eventually takes us to that certain place somewhere between Beer-Sheba and Haran. This is not so much a geographical location as it is a spiritual location or orientation in our hearts and minds. Jacob had left Beer-Sheba, the people and place that were familiar. He was not yet in Haran, the new place. He was in a certain place, an inbetween place, neither here nor there. For here is the truth about inbetween places: It is in these places and spaces where we are most vulnerable and open to seeing and hearing God in new ways.

Today's second scripture lesson tells us that Jacob arrived at this inbetween place at nightfall. The sun had set and he could no longer see clearly to keep on running. Exhausted from his day, Jacob picked up a stone to use as a pillow and he fell asleep. And that is when he began to dream.

It is much the same for each of us. The in-between places and spaces of our lives are full of stones: waiting to trip us up.

Yet these are also places and spaces of grace. At the end of the day, we find ourselves exhausted by our constant running, so we stop in the darkness, pull up a stone and fall asleep. For that brief period of rest, we stop running from life, ourselves, and more importantly, from God.

The darkness teaches us that we are no longer in control of our own destiny. It is in the dark and deep night of our souls that we can hear God. It is in the deep and dark night of our souls that we see with new eyes and hear with new ears. The vertical axis of God's life, Jacob's ladder, intersects the horizontal axis of our life and our running. That point of intersection is always an awesome place, the house of God, and the gate of heaven.

Jacob's ladder reveals the connection between heaven and earth, divinity and humanity. Here is the good news: It appears at every moment in our life, even life on the run. The ladder Jacob saw was not in a physical location. It was within him. And that ladder to heaven's gate is also within us.

Through Jacob, God reveals that the ladder of his love, his life, and his connection to us is found deep within ourselves, a place so deep that it is seen in the gift of a dream. We call it Jacob's ladder but it is not possessed by Jacob. It is God's ladder placed in each one of us.

The miracle is **not** that God shows up and breaks into our lives. That is always happening. The miracle is that we recognize it when it happens within ourselves. The ladder is revealed in the dark places of life where the sun has set, in people who have lived up to their names, in the hard stony places, in the in between places – in places we never would have expected. We find ourselves saying, like Jacob, "Surely the Lord is in this place – and I did not know it."

So I ask you today: what parts of your life are lived on the run? What are you searching for? What are you running from?

This is what I have to say: Stop running.

Trust that holy place between Beer-Sheba and Haran. Let the sun set and do not be afraid. God's ladder is and always has been within you. No matter who you are, where you go, the circumstances you face, or where you run to, the ladder of connection goes with you. It is a part of you. Wake up and see that the dream has come true. "Surely the Lord is in this place and I **now** know it."

So what does that mean for us this coming week? This I believe: we are called by God to slow down from our frantically paced lives and walk with God, wrestle with God, climb the ladder with God. God is constantly, **constantly**, seeking you out, calling your name, sending you out to serve with love. And yet, we rarely take the time to slow down and listen.

This week, take time out of your busy life for God. Slow down. Mediate. Dig up your garden. Bake some bread. Read. Paint. Draw. Walk. Write. Listen to what he has to say to you. Be unafraid of her whispered word for your life. For the promise is sure: you are loved beyond measure by our God who calls you to stop running and to come home.

Remember my story of running away as a child? Well, it didn't turn out exactly as I planned. I arrived at Jan's house with my bag of clothes. She took me up to her room and listened to my sad story about why I was running away. Jan, who also had problems at home, was so charmed by my running away that she packed up HER bag and ran away to my house, with me in tow. I didn't get more than a block from home, and when I arrived back home, I had a friend with me.

Today, Jan and I laugh at our childhood selves. For this we know: we might want to run away, but wherever we run, we find ourselves at home with God. And you will, too.

WE RESPOND WITH OUR GIFTS

OFFERING INVITATION: No matter which way we run, God is with us. No matter whether we are running from something or to something, God is with us. No matter where we are in life, God is with us. We respond to God's presence with thanksgiving and joy—offering not only stones, but the precious treasure we carry with us. Let us take time to offer ourselves to God. Amen.






