DEVOTIONS



Read: Deuteronomy 6:1-9.

When we consider teaching children the word of God, the commandments, and the good news of Christ's life, death, and resurrection, we usually think of Sunday school. However, that does not fulfill the directive in Deuteronomy. We are to "recite" God's word to our children, that is, our grandchildren, our neighbor's children, and those who may live within our own homes. To recite the message means all the adults in the community of faith need to know God's word. We tell the "old, old story" when we rise and when we go to bed, when we are home and when we are not at home. Why? Because the good news of Jesus Christ is too important to our lives and world not to recite, teach, tell, pray, sing, and live each day. Loving God with all our being and loving our neighbor is a way of life. Programs like Sunday school and confirmation support the role of primary caregivers as those who are to live and speak the faith aloud each and every day. When, where, and how often do you pray, read the Bible, and talk about Jesus with others?

Pray: Loving God, guide our words and our steps to give you praise and to direct others to the source of all life, love, and hope through Christ Jesus our Savior and Lord. Amen.



We are all teachers of what we value by how we live and by what we say and do. Those whose work is teaching help us in our own role as teachers. Think of someone you know who teaches in a school, congregation or other setting. How can you express thanks or show them gratitude for teaching and serving as a role model for others?


RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



TIME FOR THE CHILD WITHIN US

(adapted from the Evangelical Covenant Church; Submitted by Kerry Staurseth, Commission on Stewardship (ECC), Chicago, Illinois)

Today is the second of a four-week series on stewardship—what it means to be a good steward, how we are called by God to give our best out of thanksgiving, how we are called to be people to joyful generosity, how we are called to make giving a way of life.

I brought with me to worship two rocks: one rough and one that has been polished. Who here grew up with a rock polisher? I did. The polishing machine would tumble the rocks over and over through increasingly smaller grit that knocked the rough edges off of the stones. In nature, rocks are polished by water or sand running over them/tumbling them until they are smooth.

In other words, no rock can be polished by sitting still. In the New Testament book of James 1:22, we hear: *But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves.* As followers of Jesus, we are to put our faith into action—feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick. Faith is a verb. Following is a verb. Discipleship is a verb. When we put our Christian faith into action, we become like this polished stone. When we help others, our rough edges get smoothed out and we become more compassionate. We become kinder, more loving, more generous.

Truly, Christian stewardship is about allowing ourselves to be polished by God, polished by loving and serving others. This week, I encourage you to keep a polished stone in your pocket or near your devotional space, as a reminder to allow yourself to be tumbled and polished by service, by discipleship, by your generosity. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 6:17-26 (NRSV)

Jesus came down with them and stood on a level place, with a great crowd of his disciples and a great multitude of people from all Judea, Jerusalem, and the coast of Tyre and Sidon. ¹⁸ They had come to hear him and to be healed of their diseases; and those who were troubled with unclean spirits were cured. ¹⁹ And all in the crowd were trying to touch him, for power came out from him and healed all of them.

²⁰ Then he looked up at his disciples and said:

"Blessed are you who are poor,

for yours is the kingdom of God.

²¹ "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be filled.

"Blessed are you who weep now, for you will laugh.

²² "Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude you, revile you, and defame you on account of the Son of Man. ²³ Rejoice in that day and leap for joy, for surely your reward is great in heaven; for that is what their ancestors did to the prophets.

SERMON

That day may have been warm and sunny on that plain/that level place where Jesus spoke to the newly chosen Twelve, his wider circle of disciples, and the curious on-lookers. Word about Jesus had already spread near and far—and people came looking for cures.

This we know: Jesus did NOT have access to decent microphones and speakers on that sunny day. Teenagers were probably NOT sending text messages to each other during Jesus' sermon. Adults were probably NOT scribbling grocery lists and financial plans in their bulletins' margins. We can safely assume that not one set of earbuds was in sight and all cell phones had been turned to mute.

Instead, the wind was most likely blowing just enough that the crowds had to move in closer to hear this man who spoke with quiet authority. Babies were probably crying. Parents strained to hear Jesus' words above the poking and prodding of their bored children. Who knows? Perhaps not everyone there was listening. Could it be that someone might SLEEP through one of Jesus' sermons? (That would never happen here, right???) Might there have been some hecklers in the crowd? Perhaps, even young lovers were holding hands, lost in their own world.

Despite the earbuds and the crying babies, the grocery lists and the hecklers, this we know: people strained to listen to Jesus. Undoubtedly, Jesus' words surprised the people back then as much as his words surprise us today:

The Gospel of Luke has an uncanny way of making us uncomfortable. We, who live in the Western world, tend to resonate more with Jesus' Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel of Matthew rather than the nearly-identical Sermon on the Plain in Luke. Luke was written for an educated and prosperous people like many of us are here in the United States. Where Luke's version of the sermon says, "Blessed are the poor, Matthew's version says, "Blessed are the poor in spirit." We find ourselves getting uncomfortable with all these blessings that JUST MIGHT NOT be ours—we who do not worry about our next meal, the roof over our heads, or the many coats in our closets. Indeed, it is much easier to identify with being poor in spirit rather than being just poor.

Yet, Luke's entire gospel is written with the poor in mind. Luke places on Jesus' lips and within his scope of ministry those in society we try to ignore: the lepers, the widows, the poverty-stricken, the tax collectors. Even Luke's language of blessing is upside down. In the Greek, blessing or *makarios* pointed directly to the gods OR the dead OR the prosperous. Instead, Jesus pronounces God's blessings upon the lowly: the poor, the hungry, the crying, the hated.

Throughout the history of *makarios*, it had always been the other people who were considered blessed: the rich, the filled up, and the laughing. Jesus turns this all upside down. Scholars believe that Luke's reworking of blessing, of *makarios*, is the first time in Jewish literature that the poor had been spoken of as blessed. In other words, the elite in God's kingdom, the blessed ones in God's realm, are those who are at the very bottom of the heap of humanity.

I don't know about you, but this upside down blessing is a bit unnerving. Does this mean that we, who know comfort and relative riches, are outside of God's blessing? Does this mean that we, who have enough food in our pantries to sustain a quarantine, cannot know God's favor?

And then, to make matters worse, Jesus launches into his woes—that translates more directly from the Greek as an emotion of pain and anger—a sense of impending disaster, horror and anguish. According to

Luke, the rich already have everything they could possible ask for—or at least they think they do. Their focus is wealth and prosperity—the stuff of life rather than the Creator of all life.

Jesus stood in that hot field—calling out words of blessing & words of woe: completely up-ending the "way-we-think-life-should-be."

I'll be honest: I chose the Sermon in the Plain nearly a year ago for our stewardship series. I chose it OVER the Sermon on the Mount precisely because this version of the sermon makes us uncomfortable. Years ago (probably in seminary), I was taught, "Comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable." For here is the deal: even in these uncertain times, even in these times of sickness and death and political posturing, we are still people of privilege. We ARE Jesus' audience for the Sermon on the Plain.

So what does this mean for us today? This I believe: as followers of Jesus, we are called to sit lightly (very lightly!) on the stuff we surround ourselves with: always being willing to share what we have with others. Stewardship as a way of life is about what we give AND how we care about what we have. In the next two weeks, we will spend more time exploring what it means to be Christian stewards during a global pandemic and in this particular (and beloved!) community.

Giving/Stewardship/Tithing should be something we do out of thanksgiving and joy. I am reminded of my friend, Gib Langdon, who had fallen away from life in the church and his faith journey for several years. When he came back to church, he was asked to serve on the Stewardship Committee. Up until that point, Gib saw financial giving on Sunday as a minor part of his life—toss in a few dollars that he had in his wallet. Once he became immersed in the joy of giving generously, Gib changed his tune. He became, what he called, a "born again giver"—someone who offered his best to God through the missions and ministries of the church out of gratitude and joy.

Jesus calls us to do the same. Jesus beckons us to listen to himoffering to us words of blessing and words of woe. It is time to set aside our devices and our distractions that we might listen well and heed his words. Amen.


