DEVOTIONS



Read: 1 Kings 17:8-16.

The story of Elijah and the widow of Zarephath in Sidon is remembered for the miracle of providing food for Elijah, the woman, and her son. However, the context of the miracle story is also important. In the previous chapter Ahab had taken Jezebel as his wife. She was from Sidon and a worshiper of the Canaanite god Baal. Ahab would also worship Baal in Israel. In contrast, Elijah goes to Sidon, the land of Baal worship and is received by a woman who was not a worshiper of the God of Israel. Elijah, the widow and her son are all blessed by the power of the God of Israel with food so that they would not die. God's power and compassion is demonstrated outside of Israel in the presence of a foreign god and a foreign people. God's power, love, and grace will know no limits. Where have you seen God's love and mercy happening in unexpected places?

Pray: Almighty God, help us to be open to the wideness of your love and mercy, even for people and places we would not expect. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

SERVICE



Serving others is at the center of our Christian life. It is a life of generosity. In Mark 12, the widow gave without the need to be noticed or praised for her generosity. How do you give generously to others?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



The reading from Mark 12 tells about a widow who placed two small mite coins (all that she had) into the offering box. Giving to the needs of others is an act of compassion. Set up a Giving Box in your home. Place money into the box and/or notes that promise to do acts of kindness for others. Each time you contribute to the Giving Box, offer this prayer: **Dear God, as you have been generous and kind to me, help me to be generous and kind to others through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

TIME FOR THE CHILD WITHIN US

Today marks the third week of our four-week stewardship series. For a few moments, I want to talk about how we spend our time—these precious seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months and years. God has gifted us with the time we have on this earth. It is a gift freely given and, as Christians, we are challenged to use our time in a way that loves God and loves our neighbors.

Just like a check register keeps track of how much money we spend (or a spreadsheet—depending on how you record your finances), a time log can show us how we are spending our time: how we are using it well and, perhaps, ways we might be squandering this precious gift. But let me say this: prayer, silence, meditation, walks—anything you add to your day to care for your spirit is time VERY well spent. Loving God and loving neighbors includes how we care for ourselves.

In your bulletin, you will find a time log. If you live alone, it can be your personal time log. If you live with others in your home, it can be a time log about how you, as a family, spend your time. But truly, either method works.

Then, at the end of the week, take time to evaluate your time spent. Then, in prayer, offer your time and your life to the Holy One who loves you forever and ever. Amen.

PASTORAL PRAYER. SILENT PRAYER. THE LORD'S PRAYER.

Let us pray. Holy God, we pray for this modern world in which faith comes hard, where people find it difficult to raise their eyes above the material things that are so necessary for life. We pray for those who find it hard to believe because they have too many things, and for those who find it hard because they haven't enough. SILENCE We pray for those who have more to eat than they need and for those who are dying from lack of food. Challenge us, O God, to feed our neighbors who are hungry. SILENCE

We pray for parents who, because of their poverty and lack of concern on the part of others, must watch their children die. Move us, O God, to be part of the solution to eliminate poverty so that no child must go to bed hungry or die from basic nourishment. SILENCE

We pray for those who suffer from disease, from confusion and guilt, from depression and fear. Remind us again and again, O God, that so many people around us suffer in silence. Open our eyes that we might see their suffering and, in response, offer real hope. SILENCE

We pray for those who are lonely, for whom life is robbed of its beauty and hope. Prod us, O God, to befriend those who are alone. Remind us to love all your children—including our enemies that all might experience your transformational love and grace. SILENCE

We pray this day for ourselves—for we stumble and fall more often than we would like to admit. We let our prejudices get the best of us. We harden our hearts against others. Offer us your soothing balm. Melt our hardened hearts. Teach us to reach out to those whose lives are vastly different from our own. SILENCE

We offer to you thanksgiving and praise for your presence in our lives as individuals and our lives as this particular Body of Christ. Continue to pour your Holy Spirit upon us that we might be refreshed once again by the gentleness of your wind. SILENCE.

We pray all of this with the prayer Jesus taught us...Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Luke 6:27-38 (The Message)

Jesus said, "To you who are ready for the truth, I say this: Love your enemies. Let them bring out the best in you, not the worst. When

someone gives you a hard time, respond with the supple moves of prayer for that person. If someone slaps you in the face, stand there and take it. If someone grabs your shirt, giftwrap your best coat and make a present of it. If someone takes unfair advantage of you, use the occasion to practice the servant life. No more payback. Live generously.

³¹⁻³⁴ "Here is a simple rule of thumb for behavior: Ask yourself what you want people to do for you; then grab the initiative and do it for them! If you only love the lovable, do you expect a pat on the back? Run-ofthe-mill sinners do that. If you only help those who help you, do you expect a medal? Garden-variety sinners do that. If you only give for what you hope to get out of it, do you think that's charity? The stingiest of pawnbrokers does that.

"I tell you, love your enemies. Help and give without expecting a return. You'll never—I promise—regret it. Live out this God-created identity the way our Father lives toward us, generously and graciously, even when we're at our worst. Our Father is kind; you be kind.

"Don't pick on people, jump on their failures, criticize their faults unless, of course, you want the same treatment. Don't condemn those who are down; that hardness can boomerang. Be easy on people; you'll find life a lot easier. Give away your life; you'll find life given back, but not merely given back—given back with bonus and blessing. Giving, not getting, is the way. Generosity begets generosity."

RESPONSE

Leader: The word of God for the people of God!

People: God is still speaking! Thanks be to God!

MEDITATION

Rev. Becky Erb Strang Once upon a time, there was a man who took great pride in his automobile. He performed all the routine maintenance on schedule and kept the car clean inside and out. When he could afford to do so, he began to trade cars every couple of years so he always had a relatively new vehicle. He also traded up, getting a larger, and more luxurious car each time. Then he began to trade cars every year so that he would always have a current model. Eventually, he got to the point where he would buy a new car, drive it home, and leave it in the garage. He refused to use it because he did not want to put any miles on it or run the risk of it getting scratched. So, his new car just sat—never used, but looking pretty.

Just like the car that sat in the garage—beautiful, luxurious, but never used Jesus commanded his listeners (as he commands each of us) not to let our faith become something that looks good, but is empty inside. As Christians living in the United States, it might be easier to wear our faith as a sign of status rather than a badge of servanthood. Are we attending the right church? Do we wear the right clothes? Do we serve on the best committees and boards?

In his Sermon on the Plain, Jesus urges us, challenges us, and commands us to grow in our faith, to share our faith, and to offer mercy, forgiveness and love. Jesus beckons us to take our faith out of the garage, start up the motor, and fly down the highway of life—putting our trust in God that no matter what—God holds our life in his hands.

In the first part of Jesus' Sermon on the Plain from last week, we **might** have felt pushed out of the circle of Jesus' embrace—especially since Jesus' focused on the poor and needy rather than we who are more affluent. As I said last Sunday, the Beatitudes, as recorded in the Gospel of Luke are much, much more difficult to swallow for people who have all that we need and more. We tend to prefer the Beatitudes as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew—where blessedness is about poverty of spirit rather than just plain poverty.

In today's reading, the Sermon on the Plain has pivoted. What is Jesus saying now?

This is what Jesus says to his disciples (and that includes us): No matter whether we live in poverty, affluence or somewhere in between, Jesus offers to each of us tangible, real ways to live as his followers. We, who have been richly blessed by the world's standards, are challenged to extravagantly share God's love AND extravagantly share our lives with others. Yet, here we go again: what Jesus asks of us is hard—really hard.

Jesus tells us to love enemies. We are commanded to turn the other cheek—to set aside revenge and retaliation. We are challenged to forgive and forgive and forgive some more. We are commanded to set aside our judgmental ways—to accept ALL people regardless of race, gender, politics, religion or sexuality. We are to care for one another—all the one

another's around us, even if we MIGHT prefer to pick and choose who we love, who we minister to, who we feel is worthy of our time.

Using Eugene Peterson's rendering of today's scripture lesson, we hear the words of Jesus telling us, commanding us, instructing us to make generosity and giving a way of life. Stewardship, my dear ones, is not only about the money you place in the offering plate. Stewardship is also about how you spend your time, your talents, your skills AND your financial resources.

When we live with a generosity mindset rather than a scarcity mindset, we are more willing to stop mothballing our stuff and start giving it away, putting it to good use to make a difference in the lives of others.

But let's be honest: shifting from scarcity to generosity takes hard work and lots of practice. We have been conditioned in our nation to shut our doors to those who are different from us and to hold tightly to our stuff. We are instinctively afraid that if we are generous, we will be taken advantage of or we might lose the things that give us both comfort AND serve as sentimental reminders of people in our past.

Stewardship and generosity should be something we do in response to God's love for us. Stewardship and generosity must be something we do as followers of Jesus as we love God and love our neighbors. I am reminded of my friend, Gib Langdon, who had fallen away from life in the church and his faith journey for many years. When he came back to church, he was asked to serve on the Stewardship Team. Until that point, Gib saw financial giving on Sunday as a minor part of his life—toss in a few dollars that he had in his wallet. Once he became immersed in the joy of giving generously, Gib changed his tune. He became, what he called, a "born again giver"—someone who offered his best to God through the missions and ministries of the church out of gratitude and joy.

Next Sunday, you will be asked to pledge a dollar amount to St. Paul Church for 2022. Yes—the money you pledge keeps the heat on, pays your staff, provides music and curriculum, pastoral care and meals. That is all true. However, I also encourage you to stretch your imagination as you prepare to make a financial pledge. I challenge you write a number on your pledge card that comes out of joy, not out of fear. I ask you to challenge yourself to become a born again giver, a person of extravagant generosity.

Your financial gifts for 2022 will keep our doors and our hearts open. Your financial gifts for 2022 will broaden our wide welcome. Your financial gifts will help us continue our ministry to the least and the lost. Your financial gifts given in love, will also change **your** life from one of fear to one of joy. Amen.




