

ADVENT OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: John 1:1-18 (NRSV)

A Dramatic Reading of the Text. Readers: Two Narrators Narrator One: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All

things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

Narrator Two: There was a man from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed

in his name, he gave the power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

Narrator One: John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me."

Narrator Two: From his fullness we have received, grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God. It is God, the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

This story comes from author and theologian Ronald Rolheiser:

It happens in nearly every family, but this time the parents were astounded at the wisdom of their daughter. Paul and Judy, a young couple with a four year old and a two year old, were fast asleep when Darla, their four year old, decided to climb in bed with them. Judy woke up, realized what was happening and was determined to break her daughter of this habit.

"What's the matter, Darla?"

"There are monsters in my room. I want to sleep here."

"No, that's not a good idea," Judy said.

She took Darla back to her room, put on the nightlight and tried to reassure her with these words, "You need not be afraid. God is in this room with you."

The child replied, "I know that God is here, but I need someone in this room who has some skin."

Don't we all?

Right there, in a sleepy child's words we have the most basic reason for Christmas, the reason for the Incarnation. God has taken on flesh, because, like that four year old, we all need someone who has some skin.

We are human beings, not spirits without bodies. We eat the glorious food of the season. We sleep well on these long winter nights. We hug

our loved ones. We dance with joy. We smell the crisp winter wind. We hear the sound of the church bells. We are part of God's wondrous creation.

And really, it should be no surprise that God, who from the very beginning of time, who sought to be part of our lives, finally came to us in human form. Our Old Testament is full of stories of God's people worshipping God, then turning away: again and again and again. Prophets came and went. Judges came and went. Yet, God's people still could not grasp the incredible love God has for all of creation.

So, God came as a person. Not a grown up person. Not as a king wearing a golden crown. At Christmastime, we celebrate that God comes to us first and foremost as a tiny, vulnerable infant. God became one of us, took on flesh, became Incarnate. Or, to quote the Gospel of John, "And the Word became flesh and lived among us...full of grace and truth."

Why? Because God loves us beyond our reasoning, beyond our imagining, beyond anything words or songs or poetry can describe.

And the good news for Christians is that Christmas is only the beginning. Jesus was born for us. He taught and healed and reached out to people at the margins of life. He died for us; he rose and gave us his life, he gave us his Holy Spirit. And then the greatest part of the Christmas miracle: He remains with us forever.

Yet, we find ourselves asking: How is it that Jesus is with us forever—incarnate in our world?

The answer? Through us. My dearest friends: We are the Body of Christ. In the Apostle Paul's letters, we never hear that we replace Christ's Body or that we represent Christ's Body. Paul tells us that we are the Body of Christ. God is still here, in the flesh. He continues to dwell among us.

There is a beautiful poem attributed to St. Theresa of Avila. You have heard it, I'm sure:

Christ has no body now, but yours.

No hands, but yours,

No feet, but yours.

Yours are the eyes through which Christ's compassion must look out on the world.

Yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good.

Yours are the hands with which he is to bless us now.

We, the Body of Christ, proclaim the Word that Jesus spoke. We, the Body of Christ, render his presence real in our world. We, the Body of Christ, unite humankind to the Love of God.

Indeed, we are the Body of Christ. It is our sacred and holy task during Advent and into Christmas to find real, tangible ways to share Jesus' love, Jesus' peace, Jesus' hope AND Jesus' joy.

If there was ever a time the world needs joy, it is now. We, who have seen so much suffering, so much division, so much hatred, need to live into the "as if" of the kingdom of heaven—offering joy and peace in the midst of trauma.

At times, Christians take the word JOY to stand for

JESUS

OTHERS

YOURSELF

At Christmastime, we know that is true. Joy comes from service to Jesus/service to others. Joy, true joy, will never be found when we serve only ourselves, think only of ourselves, putting ourselves and our needs first. Yes: self-care is part of joy, but it cannot be the whole picture.


The joy we know at Christmas comes from God coming to us as a tiny infant—placed in a manger and visited by a bunch of scruffy shepherds. At Christmas, God turns joy upside down that we might choose joy by loving others.

Perhaps that is our task this coming week: to find ways to reach out to neighbors and strangers alike. Scatter some joy. Deliver some hope. Reach out to those who are often forgotten at holidays. At Advent, at Christmas, we are challenged to CHOOSE joy even when it is difficult: that we might increase joy all around us.

Friends: because of Jesus, God has skin and flesh and bones. Together, we are the Body of Christ—sent out to scatter joy in a world that so desperately needs that good news. Amen.



ince March of last year, our lives have been disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic, and many have experienced great loss. These months have also had a profound impact on United Church of Christ clergy and congregations—physically, emotionally, spiritually, and financially.

Christmas Fund gifts took care of the unexpected expense of a major car repair, helped a retired minister attend his brother's funeral, and assisted in paying for daunting medical expenses, prescriptions, and groceries.

When money is tight and stress is high, your gift to the Christmas Fund brings relief and hope to the clergy and church employees who have dedicated their lives to serving our churches and each of us. You help the people who have helped us. You make a huge difference and bring great joy!

In the words of an emergency grant recipient ...

"Your letter has brought great joy and relief. The grant is enough to allow me a little breathing room at the end of each month. Thank you for that gift.
