11:00 p.m. Christmas Eve Candlelight/Communion Worship. We will worship both in the sanctuary and via Facebook Live at 11:00 p.m. Christmas Eve. All are welcome.

As 2021 nears its end, we offer a gentle reminder about your end-of-year giving. We ask that your 2021 financial support arrive at the church office by noon on Tuesday, December 28 so it can be counted and recorded. Thank you for your ongoing generosity.

Pastor Becky will be on vacation beginning December 25. She will return to the church office on Monday, January 3. She will not answer her phone while she is away, so please contact the church office if you are in need of immediate pastoral care. Thank you for your understanding.

We end with a reminder about Covid19 transmissions. Incidences of positive cases are going up in our congregation and community. If you have been in contact with someone who either tests positive for Covid19 or have been in contact with someone who soon after you've been with them tests positive, you need to quarantine yourself from St. Paul Church, its building, and its staff. CHRISTMAS EVE SCRIPTURE LESSON: Luke 2:1-20 (The Message) About that time Caesar Augustus ordered a census to be taken throughout the Empire. This was the first census when Quirinius was governor of Syria. Everyone had to travel to his own ancestral hometown to be accounted for. So Joseph went from the Galilean town of Nazareth up to Bethlehem in Judah, David's town, for the census. As a descendant of David, he had to go there. He went with Mary, his fiancée, who was pregnant.

⁶⁻⁷ While they were there, the time came for her to give birth. She gave birth to a son, her firstborn. She wrapped him in a blanket and laid him in a manger, because there was no room in the hostel.

⁸⁻¹² There were shepherds camping in the neighborhood. They had set night watches over their sheep. Suddenly, God's angel stood among them and God's glory blazed around them. They were terrified. The angel said, "Don't be afraid. I'm here to announce a great and joyful event that is meant for everybody, worldwide: A Savior has just been born in David's town, a Savior who is Messiah and Master. This is what you're to look for: a baby wrapped in a blanket and lying in a manger."

¹³⁻¹⁴ At once the angel was joined by a huge angelic choir singing God's praises: Glory to God in the heavenly heights,

Peace to all men and women on earth who please him.

¹⁵⁻¹⁸ As the angel choir withdrew into heaven, the shepherds talked it over. "Let's get over to Bethlehem as fast as we can and see for ourselves what God has revealed to us." They left, running, and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in the manger. Seeing was believing. They told everyone they met what the angels had said about this child. All who heard the shepherds were impressed.

¹⁹⁻²⁰ Mary kept all these things to herself, holding them dear, deep within herself. The shepherds returned and let loose, glorifying and praising God for everything they had heard and seen. It turned out exactly the way they'd been told!

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

This past Sunday in worship, I told the story of how a little girl, scared of the potential monsters in her bedroom at night, was reassured by her mother that God was with her. Without missing a beat, the young girl basically said, "That's nice, but I would like someone with a little skin."

Dear ones, on Christmas Eve, that is exactly the message. God comes to us in human form. Enfleshed. Incarnate. An itty bitty baby with all the wonder and joy of a newborn.

This is good news for us tonight. Many of us have been isolated for nearly two years. Many of us have known grief and sorrow. Many of us are fearful. Many of us have lost our anchors and moorings. Christmas bursts into our lives and into the pandemic to remind us that God's love for us is so real, so tangible, that he became human. Christmas breaks open our isolation, grief and sorrow and offers us a new way: a deep interrelatedness/interconnectedness because God comes to us as Baby Jesus.

We arrive at worship on this Holy Night expecting comfort and familiarity. We know the Christmas Story inside and out. We come to hear the familiar text from the Gospel of Luke and to sing Silent Night with our candles raised.

Many of us have shown up at this service weary—the weeks leading up to Christmas have been filled with obligations and expectations. For some of us, our goal this evening is to not fall asleep **too noticeably** during the sermon. ©

But tonight I'm going to take us in a different direction. I'm asking you to try on a new pair of glasses with sharper lenses for tonight's birth miracle. I'm asking you to set aside what you think you know about Christmas in order to hear the birth of the Christ Child in a new way.

About five years ago, the Rev. Ian Paul of the United Kingdom wrote a blog post before Christmas arguing that we English-speaking Christians have been misreading the Christmas story because of a fundamental mistranslation from the original Greek to English.

I invite you to hear me out. Rev Paul argues that Jesus was probably NOT born in a stable—isolated and alone with only his parents, farm animals and shepherds as witnesses. For centuries, we have mistranslated the story and in the misreading we have banked our Christmas theology and messages: that, from the very beginning, Jesus' birth in an isolated stable put him on the margins of society.

Ian Paul points to the Greek word *kataluma* which is often translated into English as "inn." And yet, it actually translates as a guest room in a home. Interestingly, the same word *kataluma* is used near the end of Jesus' life to describe the upper room (guest room?) where he and his disciples had the Last Supper. If we were to follow the Greek, "inn" would be *pandocheion*—a place where strangers were welcomed.

This might sound a bit knit-picky on Christmas Eve, but it is vitally important to our understanding of Jesus' birth AND his role in our lives. Here's the deal: we know from the Gospel of Luke that Joseph and Mary went to Bethlehem for a census since Joseph descended from King David. Joseph was required by law to return to the hometown of his ancestors.

In other words, Joseph was going home. He and his very pregnant wife were traveling to his ancestral home where presumably many others of David's lineage both lived AND traveled to the sleepy hillside village for the census. In all likelihood, Joseph and Mary would have not sought out a *pandocheion*—an inn—to spend the night. Instead, they would have stayed with relatives. We also know this about first century Judaism: hospitality was of upmost importance. Joseph and his young wife would have been welcomed into a home of his kinsfolk—even if they were not closely related. When families poured into Bethlehem for the census, we can conclude that the Bethlehem villagers who traced their bloodlines to King David would have thrown open their front doors to welcome any of their kin needing a place to stay.

Here's something cool: First century Palestinian homes were built for family, guests, AND their livestock. The family would live together in a single room that had an area for animals to be brought in at night. Most of these homes had a separate room for guests or room on the roof for guests. The family living area/room had space for both humans and animals alike.

According to Rev. Paul, this means that Jesus would **not** have been born in a detached stable, but in the lower floor of a peasant house, where the animals were kept and where the family lived and ate. Jesus would have been born in the living room (which, by the way, probably also held the family's livestock).

When our English translation says there was no room in the inn or hostel, it is really saying there was no space in the guest room. We can presume that other relatives had claimed the guest room or guest roof. Mary may very well have given birth surrounded by relatives and support. Add the noise of the goats, sheep and chickens and suddenly our vision of Jesus' birth shifts radically.

This argument is really nothing new. Way back in 1584, Spanish priest Francisco Sanchez de las Brozas argued the exact same thing. The difference between now and then is that man was denounced to the Inquisition for his beliefs. Yikes!

So what does all this mean for us on Christmas Eve 2021? This I believe: in the midst of these years of isolation and sickness, Jesus is born right in our living rooms! We don't have to go out to the barn to greet the Christ Child. Jesus is with us tonight: in our sanctuary and in our homes, breaking into our melancholy, our sorrow, and our isolation to remind us that we are not alone.

What's more, God is born among us this night as a tiny baby. He probably both cried and cooed. Like all newborns, Jesus most likely, by

his very presence, became the center of attention in the living room that holy night.

It's the same for us now: Jesus needs to be at the very center of our attention, at the very center of our lives. We cannot, must not, push him outside to the barn or shed or outbuilding. He is born right here in our midst, demanding that we pay attention to what God has done for us in Jesus.



CHILDREN'S MOMENT

(adapted from <u>https://sermons4kids.com/joy-of-christmas.html</u>) I brought a Christmas gift with me to church today. I'm guessing most of you had presents underneath your Christmas trees. I'm also guessing that those of you who have children and grandchildren in your house may have found that, over the weeks leading to Christmas, the gifts under the trees got mysteriously rearranged. I heard about a little boy who checked the presents under the tree every day. As he checked to see if any new presents had been added, he grouped the presents together according to the names on the gifts. Then, after he had arranged them, he counted the gifts.

One day when it was almost Christmas, after counting the gifts, the boy discovered that his sister had more gifts under the tree than he did. He became very upset and ran into the kitchen where his mother was preparing supper.

"Katie has more presents under the Christmas tree than I do!" the little boy cried. Then, he turned and ran to his bedroom, closed the door and sat pouting. After that, the little boy did not enjoy the days leading up to Christmas because he was so upset that someone had more gifts than he did.

What that little boy did not understand was that the real joy of Christmas is not how many gifts we receive. Christmas joy comes from sharing what we have with others.

In today's scripture lesson, we hear of John the Baptist—a man who was sent to prepare the people for the coming of Jesus. He told the people to repent/turn away from their sins and to prepare their hearts for the promised Messiah.

In the Gospel of Luke, we hear this: "What then should we do?" the crowd asked. John answered, "The man with two tunics should share with him who has none, and the one who has food should do the same." (Luke 3:10-11)

This is the same message we need to hear today. In the United Kingdom, December 26 is Boxing Day. The day after Christmas is set aside to collect food and other necessities for those who are in need. After a day of celebrating the birth of Jesus, December 26 reminds us that we find our joy in sharing with others.

Let us pray: Dear God, help us to learn that it is in giving that we receive the greater gift—the gift of joy. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 1:19-34 (The Message) When Jews from Jerusalem sent a group of priests and officials to ask John who he was, he was completely honest. He didn't evade the question. He told the plain truth: "I am not the Messiah."

²¹ They pressed him, "Who, then? Elijah?"

"I am not." "The Prophet?"

"No."

²² Exasperated, they said, "Who, then? We need an answer for those who sent us. Tell us something—anything!—about yourself."

²³ "I'm thunder in the desert: 'Make the road straight for God!' I'm doing what the prophet Isaiah preached."

²⁴⁻²⁵ Those sent to question him were from the Pharisee party. Now they had a question of their own: "If you're neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the Prophet, why do you baptize?"

²⁶⁻²⁷ John answered, "I only baptize using water. A person you don't recognize has taken his stand in your midst. He comes after me, but he is not in second place to me. I'm not even worthy to hold his coat for him."

²⁸ These conversations took place in Bethany on the other side of the Jordan, where John was baptizing at the time.

²⁹⁻³¹ The very next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and yelled out, "Here he is, God's Passover Lamb! He forgives the sins of the world! This is the man I've been talking about, 'the One who comes after me but is really ahead of me.' I knew nothing about who he was—only this: that my task has been to get Israel ready to recognize him as the God-Revealer. That is why I came here baptizing with water, giving you a good bath and scrubbing sins from your life so you can get a fresh start with God."

³²⁻³⁴ John clinched his witness with this: "I watched the Spirit, like a dove flying down out of the sky, making himself at home in him. I repeat, I know nothing about him except this: The One who authorized me to baptize with water told me, 'The One on whom you see the Spirit come down and stay, this One will baptize with the Holy Spirit.' That's exactly what I saw happen, and I'm telling you, there's no question about it: This is the Son of God."


