Dear St. Paul Church Family and Friends.

Grace and peace to you during this continuing Epiphany season! Last week's letter spoke of the upcoming pastoral transition and the announcement of the Pastoral Search Committee. Today we share with you a few more open staff positions:

- 1. Office Administrator & Bookkeeper beginning February 1, 2023
- 2. Sanctuary Custodian beginning February 5, 2023
- 3. Music Director/Bell Choir Director/Chancel Choir Director beginning May 22, 2023
- 4. Groundskeeper beginning Spring 2023
- 5. Technology Director beginning May 2023

You are welcome to prayerfully consider applying for any of these positions.

The Office Administrator and Bookkeeper position is near-full time position which includes payroll, bill paying, bulletin and newsletter creation, keeper of vital church records, and phone answering among other tasks. This position works closely with Church Council and the Financial Team. We will consider breaking this position into a couple of part time positions.

The Sanctuary Custodian position is part-time. It includes cleaning and sanitizing the sanctuary, bathrooms vestibules for all worship services. The Sanctuary Custodian unlocks and locks the sanctuary for all services-including weddings and funerals.

The Music Director/Bell Choir Director/Chancel Choir Director serves part time to recruit, rehearse and perform bell and chancel choir music. The Music Director works closely with the Worship Team.

The Groundskeeper position includes regularly moving, trimming, edging, blowing and other needed maintenance of all of St. Paul Church's grounds. This is a seasonal position.

The Technology Director serves part time at St. Paul Church to maintain and update all computer, networking and worship technologies. The Technology Director works closely with the Worship Tech Team and the Worship Team.

If you would like to apply for any of these positions, please send a resume, cover letter, and references to St. Paul Church office, attention Myra Hanenkratt, Council President.

Due to the upcoming staffing transitions, beginning in February, this weekly mailer will become a monthly mailer. This mailed packet will include worship information, Church Council minutes, financial report, nursing home list, and giving envelopes. We began the weekly mailings

in March 2020 when Covid19 lock-downs first began as a way to keep the congregation connected to one another and to St. Paul Church. Moving forward, we are simply unable to maintain these mailings on a weekly basis. We thank you for your understanding.

As a gentle reminder, our primary tasks as Christians is to love God and love our neighbors. This includes keeping one another safe and healthy. If you have symptoms and/or tested positive for Covid19, Influenza, RSV, or pneumonia, we kindly ask you to stay home. Thank you for your attention to this detail.





(NRSV)

Hear what the Lord says: Rise and plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the Lord as a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel.

"O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? Answer me for I brought you up from the land of Egypt, and redeemed you from the house of slavery; and I sent before you Moses, Aaron, and Miriam. O my people, remember now what King Balak of Moab devised, what Balaam son of Beor answered him, and what happened from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the saving acts of the Lord."

"With what shall I come before the Lord and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbling with your God?

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When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he sat down, his disciples came to him. ² And he began to speak and taught them, saying:

- ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- ⁴ "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- ⁵ "Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- ⁶ "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
 - ⁷ "Blessed are the merciful, for they will receive mercy.
 - 8 "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- ⁹ "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
- ¹⁰ "Blessed are those who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- ¹¹ "Blessed are you when people revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. ¹² Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.
- ¹³ "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything but is thrown out and trampled under foot.
- ¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. ¹⁵ People do not light a lamp and put it under the bushel basket; rather, they put it on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.
- ¹⁷ "Do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. ¹⁸ For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter, will pass from the law until all is accomplished. ¹⁹ Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. ²⁰ For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven.

We Reach For You

In this season of football playoffs and local basketball games, it is easy to get caught up in the glory of winning. Each game ends with a winning team and a losing team—the winners rejoice and the losers are left to review their plays and prepare to return to the field or the gym floor the following week.

Life has its share of winners and losers in all kinds of competitions: including competition for jobs, prestige, grades, financial security. In all of these, we win or lose as the world counts winning and losing. Far too often, it is easy to portray the winners as those who are blessed and the losers as those who have somehow missed out on God's blessings.

But Jesus, in our gospel lesson, turns this understanding upside down. We do NOT hear:

Blessed are the rich, because they can buy what they want.

Blessed are they strong, because they need not show weakness.

Blessed are the winners, because they get the prize.

Blessed are the talented, for they will be admired and loved by all.

Blessed are the educated, for they will have many opportunities.

Instead, Jesus declares blessing upon those who are poor in spirit, those who are meek, those who mourn, those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, those who are merciful, those who are pure in heart, those who are peacemakers, and those who are persecuted.

In our society that honors and glorifies the winners, the successful, the wealthy, and the talented, Jesus calls us to shift out thinking and enter the Kingdom of God—not by our own merit, but through God's grace.

The word "beatitude" is Latin that translated means fortunate, happy, and well off. With religious undertones, it also offers a sense of salvation. Scholars are very clear about the beatitudes found in the gospels—they are not meant to be practical advice for successful living. Instead, they are marks of discipleship, marks of the coming and ever-present kingdom, marks of a community that is living into the Kingdom of Heaven. Right here and right now.

So let's look at these beatitudes a little more closely. Scholars have long-argued that Luke's version of the Sermon on the Plain is a closer translation, speaking of "blessed are the poor." In Matthew, we hear

"blessed are the poor in spirit." Here, Jesus is not talking about literal poverty, but about people who do not depend on their own devices to get by—they place their entire trust in God.

"Blessed are those who mourn." For each of us who have mourned great losses in our lifetimes, this seems like an odd thing for Jesus to say. Yet, our biblical tradition is one that is filled with lament—crying out to God. As a community of believers, we are called to mourn with those who mourn AND to mourn that God's Kingdom is not fully here—that we still live in a world of hunger, homelessness, illness, violence, and despair.

"Blessed are the meek." Translated from the Greek, meekness is married to gentleness. Blessed are the gentle for they will inherit the earth. Blessed are those who approach others with gentleness of spirit rather than domination, competition, and oppression.

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness." Translated, righteousness means justice. Throughout the gospel of Matthew, we hear of righteousness and justice. Of the call to actively live within hope that is based in God's love and justice.

"Blessed are the merciful." Like the meek and the poor in spirit, those who are merciful are those who are DOING merciful acts and not just talking about it. We might want to ask ourselves, "When have I shown mercy this past week? How can I show mercy to others in the days to come?"

"Blessed are the pure in heart." We might like to think this means blessed are those who do not have impure thoughts. But really, it has come to mean a single-minded devotion toward God. Those who are pure in heart are those who place their entire trust in God and offer to God loving worship, stewardship, and praise.

"Blessed are the peacemakers." Once again, this is not a passive call. Just like the meek, the merciful, and the pure in heart who are actively living into humility and grace, the peacemakers are those who actively work for reconciliation—between family members, between neighbors, between enemies, between nations. Jesus continues by saying that the peacemakers will be called Children of God. Now how cool is that???

Finally, we have a blessing upon those who are persecuted. And what's more, in the midst of words about persecution, Jesus calls on them (and us) to rejoice and be glad.

This is a tough one. People are persecuted worldwide: for their religious beliefs, their ethnicity, their skin color. People in our own nation are persecuted for being seen as "different." And yet, Jesus calls upon the persecuted to rejoice. The rejoicing comes **not** from the persecutions themselves, but from the support of the community, the communion with Christ, the solidarity our prayers and support bring to those who live with persecution daily.

When Jesus turned the concept of happiness, success, and winning on its head, I do not believe he meant for each and every one of us to embody each of these beatitudes. Not at all. Truly, when our faith community, when St. Paul UCC, when this gathered Body of Christ, is living within Christ's embrace of humility and grace, **together** we embody these beatitudes. I may not be particularly gentle, but I do thirst for justice. You might not be particularly meek, but you might be a peacemaker. Together we work to bring and to celebrate that the Kingdom of God is emerging among us.

For here is the deal: Christianity is not a scheme to reduce stress, lose weight, advance our careers, or protect us from illness. Instead, Christianity is a way of living based on the firm hope that meekness and humility will prevail over cruelty, violence, and war. Blessed are those who live this life now, even when living such a life seems foolish to the world, for they will place their trust in God and God will call them beloved children.

Our Old Testament reading mirrors this call to live fully as children of God. The prophet Micah lived about 700 years before Christ. Yet, his words are fitting for us today. When asked what God requires of us, we first hear what is NOT required. God requires NOT our firstborn child, empty rituals, nor meaningless offerings. For Micah, the stakes are much higher. A life lived in God requires us to do justice, to love kindness, and walking humbly with God.

As I said earlier, justice is active. It is not wishful thinking or complaining when justice is not present. Instead, God's justice calls each of us to work for fairness and equality for all God's children and all God's creation. Justice involves taking a stand for the weak and powerless—those who often cannot speak for themselves.

And Micah pushes us further. We are also to love kindness. In the Hebrew, the word for kindness cannot be translated into a single word. It is multi-layered: Love. Loyalty. Faithfulness. Kindness is more than being nice to one another. It means entering fully and completely into relationships with others and with God. Kindness builds community, keeps covenants, and honors promises—not out of fear, but out of love.

Micah's call to new life in community and new life with God means walking humbly with God and with one another. Humbly, when translated, means "carefully" or "circumspectly." When we act humbly, we are careful with our words and our ways.

But it is this "walking" part of Micah's call that sets the tone and pace for living in a faithful community. When we walk with God, we put God first, living in conformity with God's will, living with humility and mercy and grace.

In a world that values championships and successes, we are called to humbly get onto our knees, placing our trust in God who loves us, forgives us, accepts us, and calls us his own. When we are on our knees—together, as a community—we will experience the Kingdom of God and the gift of blessedness. Amen.




