Bless: Close your devotion with a blessing. May God reveal Jesus to you daily. Amen.





NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 9:1-41

Narrator: As he walked along, Jesus saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him,

Disciples: Rabbi, who sinned? This man or his parents, that he was born blind?

Narrator: Jesus answered,

Jesus: Neither this man nor his parents sinned. He was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world.

Narrator: When Jesus had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him,

Jesus: Go, wash in the pool of Siloam.

Narrator: Then the man went and washed and came back able to see. The neighbors and those who had seen him before as a beggar began to ask,

Neighbor 1: Is this not the man who used to sit and beg? **Neighbor 2:** It is he.

Neighbor 3: No, but it is someone like him. **Narrator:** He kept saying,

Man: I am the man.

Narrator: But they kept asking him,

Neighbor 1: Then how were your eyes opened?

Man: The man called Jesus made mud, spread it on my eyes, and said to me, "Go to Siloam and wash." Then I went and washed and received my sight.

Neighbor 2: Where is he? Man: I do not know. **Narrator:** They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. Then the Pharisees also began to ask him how he had received his sight. He said to them,

Man: He put mud on my eyes. Then I washed and now I see.

Narrator: Some of the Pharisees said,

Pharisee 1: This man is not from God, for he does not observe the Sabbath.

Pharisee 2: How can a man who is a sinner perform such signs? **Narrator:** And they were divided. So they said again to the blind man,

Pharisee 1: What do you say about him? It was your eyes he opened.

Man: He is a prophet.

Narrator: The Jews did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they called the parents of the man who had received his sight and asked them:

Pharisee 2: Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How then does he now see?

Parents: We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. But we do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him. He is of age. He will speak for himself.

Narrator: His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews. For the Jews had already agreed that anyone who confessed Jesus to be the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. Therefore his parents said, "He is of age. Ask him." So for the second time they called the man who had been blind, and they said to him,

Pharisee: Give glory to God! We know that this Jesus is a sinner.

Man: I do not know whether he is a sinner. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see.

Pharisee 2: What did Jesus do to you? How did he open your eyes?

Man: I have told you already, and you would not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you also want to become his disciples? **Pharisee 1:** You are Jesus' disciple, but we are disciples of Moses. We know that God has spoken to Moses, but as for Jesus, we do not know where he comes from.

Man: Here is an astonishing thing! You do not know where he comes from and yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but he does listen to one who worships him and obeys his will. Never since the world began has it been heard that anyone opened the eyes of a person born blind. If Jesus were not from God, he could do nothing.

Pharisee 2: You were born entirely in sins and you are trying to teach us?

Narrator: And they drove the man out of the synagogue. Jesus heard that they had driven him out, and when he found him he said,

Jesus: Do you believe in the Son of Man?

Man: And who is he, sir? Tell me, so that I may believe in him.

Jesus: You have seen him and the one who is speaking with you is he.

Man: Lord, I believe.

Narrator: And the man worshiped Jesus. Jesus said,

Jesus: I came into this world for judgment so that those who do not see may see and those who do see may become blind.

Narrator: Some of the Pharisees near him heard this and said to him,

Pharisee 1: Surely we are not blind, are we?

Jesus: If you were blind, you would not have sin. But now you say, "We see" your sin remains.

SERMON

Today is Transfiguration Sunday. That in-between liturgical Sunday that shifts us from Epiphany: God's light coming into our world through Jesus and Lent which begins in a few days on Ash Wednesday.

Now if this were NOT a narrative lectionary year, our scripture reading for today would be from one of the synoptic gospels: Matthew, Mark or Luke with the story of Jesus and a few of his disciples going up a mountain where Jesus was transfigured into dazzling white and suddenly Moses and Elijah appeared with Jesus. The disciples: Peter, James and John were so stunned by this event that they wanted to create tabernacles or tents or dwellings to house Jesus and the prophets. Suddenly, echoing the moment of Jesus' baptism, the heavens opened up and God declared, "This is my Son, the beloved. Listen to him!"

And what makes this event: the transfiguration on the mountaintop, significant every year just prior to Lent is that, as Jesus walked down the mountain, he ordered his three closest friends to say nothing to anyone about what they saw and experienced until after Jesus' own death and resurrection.

That foreshadowing of death is what brings us to this day of transitions. Today marks the end of Christmas, the end of Epiphany. Baby Jesus is all grown up. Now, in the weeks to come, he is heading to Jerusalem to face his death.

But we ARE in the narrative lectionary cycle, so today's lesson is not what we expect. Instead, it is the story of Jesus healing a man born blind. Now we EXPECT Jesus to heal blindness, but we probably don't expect the hoopla that followed the miracle.

The story began harshly. The man born blind was not treated as a person: he was an object of inquiry as Jesus' disciples, seeing the man, asked Jesus if the man's blindness was from his own sins or his parents' sins.

Keep in mind, in Jesus' day, blindness and other physical differences were seen as punishments and judgments for sin. With that worldview, the disciples merely wanted to know if it was the man or his parents who were the sinners.

Jesus turned their question upside down and inside out and even hinted for us his epiphany Light by saying that blindness is not about blame and that God is bigger and greater and more awesome than the limitations we have. He ends by reminding his disciples that he, Jesus, is the Light.

Jesus then mixed some of his own spit with dirt, placing that clay on the man's eyes. He asked the man to wash himself in the Pool of Siloam. We know what happened. The unnamed man washed off the clay and was able to see.

This is where the story gets interesting. This previously blind man was NOT BELIEVED—even though people could clearly SEE that he could SEE. They argued with him, saying that perhaps he wasn't the same man. They dragged him to the Pharisees who scoffed at the whole incident since Jesus had performed this miracle on the Sabbath (a huge Jewish no-no).

So then everyone began to argue about Jesus. Who was he? Was he bad? Was he good? Was he a prophet?

The whole episode became ridiculous when the Pharisees and other Jews went to the man's house to ask his parents about him. The parents were clearly rattled by the questioning and shoved the questions back onto their son.

So, when they questioned the man YET AGAIN with the exact same questions, the exasperated man pointed to God's work in Jesus—giving a powerful testimony right there in the street.

Clearly their ears and hearts were as closed as the man's eyes once were. They tossed the man out of his house and onto the street.

So, on this transition Sunday, when we shift from Epiphany's light to the journey to the cross, I ask you: are our own hearts and eyes and ears closed off from God's working in our lives?

Perhaps you are tired and sad and cannot imagine what new life in Jesus might look like. Perhaps the Bible stories you learned years ago in Sunday School no longer match your day-to-day living. Perhaps life is treating you well—so well that you have taken full credit for your blessings. Perhaps we have become like the Pharisees, so stuck in our ways that we cannot even see the hurt, the hunger, the blindness around us.

Transfiguration Sunday—whether we are reading the traditional scriptures or not—is meant to knock us off our feet and onto our knees

that we might look to Jesus as the source of Light and Life and Love. Transfiguration Sunday reminds us that God's light comes to us through Jesus and when we follow (really follow) Jesus, the scales fall off our eyes and we are able to see the world through the eyes of Christ.

On Transfiguration Sunday, we are each the man born blind. We are each in need of healing. We are each in need to seeing Jesus with fresh new eyes that we might shout our joyful testimony, "I believe!"

With that testimony, the healing is indeed complete. The man born blind sees not only the world around him with utter and complete honesty, also sees Jesus.

And it is the same for each of us. We enter Lent blind. Blinded by our guilt and shame. Blinded by our greed. Blinded by our prejudices. Blinded by our station in life. But Jesus doesn't leave us blind. He makes clay out of spit and dirt, and places it on our eyes, telling us to go wash in the Pool of Siloam.

On Wednesday, we will recreate that clay with the ash we place on our foreheads. Made of last year's palms and a tiny bit of oil, we are marked for the season that we might enter Lent clearly seeing Jesus. That we might again share our joyful testimony, "I believe!"

At the end of the ninth chapter of John, some Pharisees begin to see. The evidence of that sight is their own questioning. They question whether they can see at all. They ask Jesus, "Surely we are not blind, are we?"

And Jesus' response is sharp and clear: "If you were really blind, you would be blameless, but since you claim to see everything so well, you're accountable for every fault and failure."


The good news is that during Lent, we are walking with Jesus and he is walking with us. This journey is the opportunity Jesus needs to bring you healing and wholeness. Let Jesus touch our eyes; and we will see the Light of the World. AMEN.


