

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: John 19:1-16a (NRSV) Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. 2 And the soldiers wove a crown of thorns and put it on his head, and they dressed him in a purple robe. 3 They kept coming up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and striking him on the face. 4 Pilate went out again and said to them, "Look, I am bringing him out to you to let you know that I find no case against him." 5 So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Here is the man!" 6 When the chief priests and the police saw him, they shouted, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him; I find no case against him." 7 The Jews answered him, "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die because he has claimed to be the Son of God." ⁸ Now when Pilate heard this, he was more afraid than ever. ⁹ He entered his headquarters again and asked Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave him no answer. 10 Pilate therefore said to him, "Do you refuse to speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" 11 Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore the one who handed me over to you is guilty of a greater sin." 12 From then on Pilate tried to release him, but the Jews cried out, "If you release this man, you are no friend of the emperor. Everyone who claims to be a king sets himself against the emperor."

¹³ When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus outside and sat on the judge's bench at a place called The Stone Pavement, or in Hebrew Gabbatha. ¹⁴ Now it was the day of Preparation for the Passover; and it was about noon. He said to the Jews, "Here is your King!" ¹⁵ They cried out, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!" Pilate asked them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but the emperor." ¹⁶ Then he handed him over to them to be crucified.

People: Jesus modeled surrender for us, that we may give ourselves up to God.

Leader: To love.

People: What do we surrender ourselves to? Leader: Do we ever surrender ourselves at all?

People: Or do we hold ourselves in, hold ourselves together, tight as a drum?

Leader: When do we just let go?

People: When do we accept, truly accept, Leader: That whatever happens, God's got it?

He pays attention and sees everyone as part of his Kingdom. He especially takes notice of those who don't get attention. Those on the outside, those not noticed by the rest of the world.
- 4.) He guides me throughout my journey. If I was entirely alone, God would still be there to guide me. While it may not seem like it, he has a plan for me, and he'll guide me through it.

While there are many other things I believe about God, these four are the most important to me.

Although they are outdated, you can interpret the meaning of the rule, and you can apply that to your life in a way that fits the time period and makes sense for you.
- 2.) Different versions, different interpretations. Since the Bible wasn't originally written in English, different versions can have different words, meaning a different interpretation and a different understanding of the lesson.

The fifth question was about what I believe about the church.

The church is more than a building. It's more about the people. Here, we help anyone, making them feel safe and comforted and accepted. A building can't create all those feelings. There are all kinds of people here, all holding the door open for anyone who wants to come in, holding no judgement towards anyone. It's these people that make the church

innovative and creative, adapting to the changes in the environment, all while learning from each other and worshiping God.

The sixth question was why I consider myself to be a Christian.

I'm Christian because all are beloved and good in God's eyes and all are under the protection of Jesus. Being Christian also gives me a sense of belonging. Belonging to something bigger than myself and bigger than my community. Anyone, anywhere, can be a Christian and follow God's call to help others and not judge anyone for being who they are.


