Grace and peace to you in the name of the Risen Christ who is our Savior and Friend!

Yesterday Pastor Becky held a New Member Class. We are delighted to welcome to St. Paul Church Scott Dammeyer, Matthew Albers, and Amy Dicke! The Body of Christ at St. Paul UCC continues to grow and flourish!

Worship Team also met yesterday. We will restart Saturday night worship services beginning in September once a month-on communion weekends. This means that we will have 5:00 p.m. Saturday worship in the Chapel on September 3, October 1, November 5, and December 3. We will give you more information as we get closer to September.

As we've written before, the Discipleship Team is going through a reboot—seeking Champions for the many ministries of St. Paul Church. We are still seeking champions for: Father/Son Banquet, Bremenfest Float, Dayton Dragons Games, September Kick-Off Picnic, Field Trip to Do Good Restaurant, Trunk or Treating, Christmas Caroling, New Year's Eve Dinner, Coffee and Canvas (for adults), Cupcakes and Canvas (for children), Website Upkeep, Landscaping & Weed Pulling, Kitchen Upkeep, Nursery Coordinator, and Cookie Jar Champion We also need a Champion Team for our Open Table Community Meals. Pastor Becky has worked since January to solicit a volunteer team for this ministry and has run completely dry. Coordinating the meals takes more than one person. We do have a list of tasks that needs to be completed by this Team. If we don't have a Champion Team for the Community Meal, our meal on May 16 will be our last. If you are interested in serving as a Champion for any of these ministry areas, please contact Becky.

2022's Project of the Year includes various upkeep and maintenance at St. Church. Last week, Lima Pipe Organ Company let us know that part of the Pedal 32' Contra Fagotto stop is no longer working on our beloved organ. This particular stop is not connected to the pipes, but is part of the electronic tone generators that were added in 1994. The cost to repair this will be no more than \$4,500. Our hope is that we can raise these funds by summertime to have repairs completed before September. You can mark your giving for this project as "Project of the Year."

Another project we are seeking funding for is our upcoming Art Camp Festival. Instead of our traditional summertime Art Camp, St. Paul Church is hosting an Art Camp Festival on Wednesday, June 8 in the evening. This event draws children, youth and families from New Bremen and area villages and towns. We offer a free meal, bouncy houses, crafts, games, music, New Bremen's canine officer and New Bremen's fire trucks. Last year we easily fed 500 people at the Art Camp Festival. The cost for this year's Festival is just under \$5000. We have raised a portion of the funds, but we invite you to prayerfully consider donating to the Art Camp Festival. This fun-filled evening showcases St. Paul Church's hospitality and outreach to the community. We thank you for considering this opportunity to make a difference in our community.

As a reminder, Pastor Becky is having foot surgery on June 14. If all goes well, she will return to St. Paul on Friday, July 15 and will return to worship on Sunday, July 17. Bryan Trego and our two SALT interns, Elyssa Mullins and Eli Schmitmeyer, will fill in during her absence. While Becky is on medical leave, she will not respond to phone calls, text messages or Facebook messages. Our St. Paul folk will need to go through the church office for any pastoral needs. Thank you for your understanding!

Tell of a time something you did had unexpected consequences. What would you do if you were locked up for doing something good and right?


For the littles: Do you always do the right thing? It's ok. Nobody does.



People: We yell to God for help and God puts us back together.






SERVICE OF CONFESSION

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Acts 16:16-34

One day, as we were going to the place of prayer, we met a slavegirl who had a spirit of divination and brought her owners a great deal of money by fortune-telling. ¹⁷ While she followed Paul and us, she would cry out, "These men are slaves of the Most High God, who proclaim to you a way of salvation." ¹⁸ She kept doing this for many days. But Paul, very much annoyed, turned and said to the spirit, "I order you in the name of Jesus Christ to come out of her." And it came out that very hour.

¹⁹ But when her owners saw that their hope of making money was gone, they seized Paul and Silas and dragged them into the marketplace before the authorities. ²⁰ When they had brought them before the magistrates, they said, "These men are disturbing our city; they are Jews ²¹ and are advocating customs that are not lawful for us as Romans to adopt or observe." ²² The crowd joined in attacking them, and the magistrates had them stripped of their clothing and ordered them to be beaten with rods. ²³ After they had given them a severe flogging, they threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to keep them securely. ²⁴ Following these instructions, he put them in the innermost cell and fastened their feet in the stocks.

²⁵ About midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. ²⁶ Suddenly there was an earthquake, so violent that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were unfastened. ²⁷ When the jailer woke up and saw the prison doors wide open, he drew his sword and was about to kill himself, since he supposed that the prisoners had escaped. ²⁸ But Paul shouted in a loud voice, "Do not harm yourself, for we are all here." ²⁹ The jailer called for lights, and rushing in, he fell down trembling before Paul and Silas. ³⁰ Then he brought them outside and said, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" ³¹ They answered, "Believe on the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved, you and your household." ³² They spoke the word of the Lord to him and to all who were in his house. ³³ At the same hour of the night he took them and washed their wounds; then he and his entire family were baptized without delay. ³⁴ He brought them up into the house and set food before them; and he and his entire household rejoiced that he had become a believer in God.



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SERMON

Rev. David Long-Higgins

I want to begin this morning by saying again what a delight it is to be with you friends again, especially as this is the church of my great, great, grandparents. I want to say a special word of thanks to Pastor Becky for the kind invitation so that I could be with you in this fourth Sunday of Easter. So, we continue to say Christ is Risen, Christ is Risen indeed. More on that motion of God's love as set forth in our reading from Acts in just a minute.

But first I want to say a word about that motion of God's resurrecting power at work in our life together. First it is my great honor and privilege to bring you greetings from your relatives...that is the 322 other congregations which make up the Heartland Conference (formerly known as the Ohio Conference) of the United Church of Christ, which you may know includes two congregations in West Virginia and eight in Northern Kentucky just across the river from Cincinnati.

So, I would like to catch you up with what is going on with the fam these days. In COVID time, leaders from throughout the Conference have discerned that God has set before all of us as a vision of renewed collaboration where together in Christ's love, we work to reconcile and restore all of God's creation.

Now that sounds large – and the truth is, it is large. But, of course, you know it is not by our own strength alone that we engage this work. We trust that there is an alive Holy Spirit that empowers us to connect, equip and support our faith communities to grow as faithful disciples and responsible stewards, following Jesus' call to extravagantly love all God's children and creation.

I think of this as a garden that God is planting using each of us and the communities of faith to which we belong as a testimony to God's deep desire for beauty and joy to rise. I know that you know what I am talking about. I have scoped you out on your website. I have read about the Busy 12 (which is whole lot more than 12), your commitment to feeding the hungry and the work of your mission team, your connections to El Salvador through the Northwest Ohio Association, and so much more. Your commitment to servanthood that is at the core of the Christ life inspires me. What a blessing you are! Because of your shared commitment, ministry initiatives across our life in the Heartland Conference are being strengthened and new ministry networks are being developed to inspire, connect, equip and support individuals and congregations in their vocational discernment, clarity and engagement.

Because God yearns for full flourishing of every human being, an anti-racism network has been gathering across our life to build new understandings and commitment. Because we are most alive in selfgiving love, we have been building a network to cultivate the practice and calling of Christ to a generous life.

You may have noticed especially now the need for mental health ministry and increasingly accessible spaces, so a conference inclusion network has been formed. You may know that there is a quiet crisis among veterans: 22 of whom complete suicide on a daily basis. A first conversation about a veterans' network is going to happen this coming Wednesday via zoom at 7 p.m.

Because faith formation doesn't happen by accident, we have a network for sharing ideas and to offer encouragement. Also significant is our outdoor ministry at Templed Hills Camp and Retreat Center. If you want to change the world, send a child or youth to camp. Or better yet, volunteer to help out.

Because of the urgencies of the planet, we now have an emerging climate care network. Because drug overdose deaths reached an all-time record last year, we now have a harm reduction and drug overdose prevention network that has produced a curriculum to help churches engage this critical reality.

The great thing about networks is that you don't have to sign up for a term. You can engage at the level that fits for you. If you want to find out more, go to heartlanducc.org. But there is more that God is at work doing in and through us that stretches beyond the geographical boundaries of the Heartland Conference.

You see this thing of ministry in the name of Jesus Christ as you well know is a work local and a work global. Two years ago BC... late January and early February I traveled on your behalf to Southern Asia, to Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and India as part of an initiative to bear witness and offer support our partners in that part of God's creation. You have been supporting Post Traumatic Stress Disorder treatment for people in the northern region of Sri Lanka in the Jaffna diocese. Pastors from Sri Lanka have come to Eden Theological Seminary gaining training in trauma treatment. Then they have returned to tend the emotional wounds of their people who for 30 years suffered due to civil war.

In Bangladesh, you have been supporting women's business development in an area of the world where climate change is cutting in half the growing season among the poorest of the poor. Daily you have been supporting internally displaced refugees in Syria with food and water relief through the work of our partners, the Forum for Development Culture and Dialogue.

And those are just a few of the stories from our nearly 300 global partners in 90 countries around the world who share in our response to the commission of Jesus Christ to meet all God's people at the place of deepest need.

Closer to home, right now, we are building hope for new beginnings as we are actually working together with the Christian Church/Disciples of Christ to form a long-term disaster recovery ministry right here in the Dayton area organizing work teams coming to build and rebuild houses for those rendered housing insecure by the tornados that hit this area two years ago. Your gifts to One Great Hour of Sharing support this effort. These opportunities to serve are being scheduled now and you can find out more about those by going to our website.

Just one more thing, I hope you will be part of the 2022 Challenge. Across our life we are working to put together 2022 hygiene kits and disaster buckets. Matching grants are available for this if you haven't already engaged this great opportunity.

If you haven't quite caught on, or in case you have forgotten, you and I are in a web of blessing and mutual encouragement and support that daily changes the lives of people near and far. Your gifts to Our Churches Wider Mission make these life-giving connections possible – right here in Ohio and around the world.

I could go on and on, sharing about church renewal, support of our Native American Congregations, and support of pastors who, in retirement, struggle to make ends meet because of their life-long commitment to serve smaller churches. I could share about our work with our designated health and human service ministry partners – Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi, UCH, Crossroad, Emmaus homes.

Now this is about more than just money. These gifts are about an energy and capacity for love to foster the hope of a new beginning to become real in the life of the world right here where you live and around the globe because that is the commission of Jesus Christ.

So I say, thank you from the bottom of my heart, dear friends for your faithfulness to this mission of love which we share together near and far. Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!

Now you know, all of this ministry has a starting point that begins with a call and a claim of God's agape love on our lives. It is not of our own making but by it, if we are willing to consent to this motion of Holy Love, we are remade again and again by this large Spirit which has the capacity to turn everything upside down and all around. It is the grand reversal of God's resurrecting power.

So, in our text this morning, Paul and Silas are in Macedonia, a province of Rome. And there is a woman whose life has been imprisoned by others who are making money off her fortune-telling ability. But there is something that cannot be imprisoned. It is her witness that Paul and Silas are servants of God's work of salvation – that is ultimate healing.

Strangely, Paul gets annoyed by this testimony and he orders the spirit of divination to come out of her and it does. But because of this those who were making money off her life hatch a scheme that gets Paul and Silas thrown into prison. But not just thrown into prison, flogged, and put in the deepest cell and placed in stocks.

But the story is not over. From the tomb of this prison, they begin to pray and sing songs of praise. And everything is opened up. The foundation of fear is split apart. The life-giving door of discovery that God's power can transform everything shakes through the whole system.

It would seem to be good news for everyone, except the jailer, who fears that his prisoners will have naturally escaped and so he prepares to take his own life. But the alive word of transformation comes from the depths of the prison, as an unshackled echo of promise, "Do not harm yourself." Which evokes a question, "What must I do to be saved?" And the answer is, "Believe"... which I would remind you means "trust" in the Lord Jesus Christ. Trust that the same power to resurrect Christ can and does hold your life.

And so, at midnight, at the darkest hour, in the deepest place of the prison, wounds get washed, and baptism forms a new creation. And strangely everyone is freed for a new life.

I wonder if you have ever had someone utter a life-giving word like this to you giving space for Love, capital L's, grand reversal? I wonder if you have been that person along the way who has offered a life-giving grace that has freed up someone else?

I must tell you that on this Mother's Day, I have been thinking of my mom who passed away twelve years ago this past week. She had colon cancer. As you may have discovered in your own experience, these kinds of things have a way of knocking the wind out of you, covering over your spirit, imprisoning you, and most days just hoping for one more day.

But on such journeys, you may know from your own experience, there is often a threshold that one approaches where the end seems too clear. My mom and I had birthdays in the same week of March. So, in that last year of her life, as she turned 80, the weekend of our celebration came to a close.

But before I left, I told her that I must have one more conversation. There is a poignancy as you likely know to such conversations, especially when the one you love has been the one who has dressed you in love for your whole life. So, we went into my parents' bedroom, and I named the terrible and precious moment in which we found ourselves. I dared to name out loud that this could well be the last face-to-face conversation we would ever have.

I told her how much I loved her and how I hoped I had not been too much of a disappointment to her (you know the story of your life runs quickly before you in such moments, the stupid stuff you did growing up). And what she did, I will never forget. Frail, yet strong, she took my head in her hands and said to me, "You have never been a disappointment, only a joy. And she looked into my eyes and said, "I love you". I offered back the same. We embraced in tears. You see, she allowed the Spirit to open the door of my prison.

And then she offered a word of encouragement as she so often had. "Do not let your words fall to silence," she told me, "The world needs encouragement." She was telling me, you know, that there is a largeness to life that extends beyond the chapter formed in the present moment.

As I headed to the airport I was aware of so many different things. I remembered that she had taught me a bedtime prayer as a child. Maybe you know it? *Now I lay me down to sleep, I pray the Lord my soul to keep. If I should die before I wake, I pray the Lord my soul to take.* As I remembered that prayer, I thought what an odd thing to teach a three or four year old.

But then I realized it wasn't odd at all. She was cloaking me both in the truth of my mortality, and that of all of us who walk on the earth, and also the truth of God's love that will never let us go. From the earliest years of my life she had been preparing me not just for my death but for hers.

In such threshold times, oh how we yearn for a few more days or years to savor the presence of God in each other. At other times, that presence will come in ways we do not expect from another direction. And it will be just enough. Just enough to open us up to the new thing that God is seeking to make known and to do in our lives, and by our response in the life of the world.

So that last day of my mother's life came. Four of us six children were gathered with my dad around my mother's hospice bed in their apartment. Her breathing slowed and my dad asked me to offer a prayer. And when I said "Amen" she breathed her last breath. And I remembered, if I should die before I wake, I pray the Lord my soul to take.

But then dad's phone rang. He ignored it. It rang again. He ignored it. It rang again. My brother suggested that he answer because maybe God was calling. It was their pastor who in that very moment was with members of the church choir outside their second story window and they were singing God of Grace and God of Glory, on your people pour your power.

And my sister, out in Portland, Oregon, who had been promised by my mother the sign of a rainbow as a confirmation of her alive presence, looked out her window on the sunniest of days saw a rainbow plain as day. I know it's not supposed to work like that but sometimes it does. And you discover in those moments that there is whole lot more going on than your post-modern mind can wrap itself around. No matter, because God is the one doing the wrapping, the healing, shaking the foundations of every prison that holds us, so that even in grief we may discover ourselves strangely inspired – filled with the Spirit of the Holy One. And not only inspired but freed to bear witness in word and deed and song, to a largeness of love that will not be imprisoned or entombed by anything.

I have a feeling you know what I am talking about. Keep spreading the word, first admitting to yourself, then saying it out loud to your family, then scatter it into the world. "Christ is Risen, Christ is Risen indeed." Thanks be to God!

I give thanks to God for you and for the opening of imprisoned hearts that God will make possible because of the testimony of your shared life which is a vessel of God's grand reversal made possible in, by, and for *agape* love. You are a gift and a blessing, dear people of St. Paul. And I give thanks to God for you and for our life together.

Godspeed. Amen and amen.


