Dear St. Paul Church Family and Friends, Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen. Indeed!

As we move more deeply into the Easter season, our Christian faith reminds us that we are Easter People—no matter the season. For what God has done for us through Jesus, we offer him our thanks and praise.

This Thursday, April 28, Pastor Becky will begin a 5-week Bible Study series entitled Unafraid—Living with Courage and Hope in Uncertain Times. We will meet in the church library at 6:30 each Thursday. Because this Bible Study is video-based, we are only able to offer it in-person.

We are offering a Potential New Member Class on Sunday, May 1 from 4:00-5:00 p.m. in the Assembly Room. Attending the class does not obligate you to join—it simply provides information about St. Paul Church and the United Church of Christ. The class also offers the opportunity for folk to get to know one another better.

2022's Project of the Year includes various upkeep and maintenance at St. Church. Last week, Lima Pipe Organ Company let us know that part of the Pedal 32' Contra Fagotto stop is no longer working on our beloved organ. This particular stop is not connected to the pipes, but is part of the electronic tone generators that were added in 1994. The cost to repair this will be no more than \$4,500. Our hope is that we can raise these funds by summertime to have repairs completed before September. You can mark your giving for this project as "Project of the Year."

Another project we are seeking funding for is our upcoming Art Camp Festival. Instead of our traditional summertime Art Camp, St. Paul Church is hosting an Art Camp Festival on Wednesday, June 8 in the evening. This event draws children, youth and families from New Bremen and area villages and towns. We offer a free meal, bouncy houses, crafts, games, music, New Bremen's canine officer and New Bremen's fire trucks. Last year we easily fed 500 people at the Art Camp Festival.

The cost for this year's Festival is just under \$5000. We have raised a portion of the funds, but we invite you to prayerfully consider donating to the Art Camp Festival. This fun-filled evening showcases St. Paul Church's hospitality and outreach to the community. We thank you for considering this opportunity to make a difference in our community.

PASTORAL PRAYER, SILENT PRAYER, AND THE LORD'S PRAYER

Leader: Lights may not blind us nor voices thunder in our ears, but the waters of this blue planet are steadily rising, and the effects of our abuse and neglect are unmistakable. Teach us to recognize warnings while we have a chance to be part of the solution in preserving our cosmic home. Risen Lord,

People: Hear our prayer.

Leader: Sometimes the unenviable task falls on us, and you ask us to face what we fear most. Give us the courage of Ananias, who though he was terrified, obeyed your command and followed, to the benefit of millions. Risen Lord,

People: Hear our prayer.

Leader: Make the scales fall from our eyes and restore us to fullness of vision and strength by your Spirit, O God of hope and healing. Send your mercy upon all who are grieving, all who are sick, all who need touched by your love. Risen Lord,

People: Hear our prayer.

Leader: Following the trail blazed by the earliest carriers of the Good News, we take our place in the line of the saints in heaven whose joy it is to praise your name forever. Risen Lord,

People: Hear our prayer.

Leader: Mighty and merciful God, you have provided us with everything we need to carry out the work before us. Accept our prayers and fortify us for your ministries and missions set before us. All of this we pray in the name of the Risen Christ who taught us to pray...Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Acts 9:1-19a (NRSV)

Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest ² and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. ³ Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. ⁴ He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" ⁵ He asked, "Who are you, Lord?" The reply came, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. ⁶ But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." ⁷ The men who were traveling with him

stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. ⁸ Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. ⁹ For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

¹⁰ Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." He answered, "Here I am, Lord." 11 The Lord said to him, "Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, 12 and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." 13 But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; 14 and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." 15 But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; 16 I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." 17 So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." 18 And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, 19 and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

LITANY OF RESPONSE

Leader: This is one of the greatest dramas in Scripture.

People: The conversion of Paul.

Leader: It has everything: an evildoer, a fall from a horse, a blinding light, a voice from heaven, and a man whose life it utterly changed in an instant.

People: Saul, the greatest persecutor of Christians, becomes the great Christian evangelist.

Leader: But what of the people he had made to suffer? How did they react to his sudden change of heart?

People: Did they say, "Yeah, right. SURE he's different now."?

Leader: Did they still fear him?

People: After all, leopards do not change their spots.

Leader: If someone shows you what they are, believe them.

People: And Saul had shown the Christians hatred, and he had persecuted them.

Leader: By rights they shouldn't have trusted him for a second.

People: But then Jesus called his faithful disciple Ananias.

Leader: Jesus sent Ananias to restore Paul's sight.

People: And the faithful disciple obeyed.

Leader: In that miraculous act of healing, another miracle happened.

People: The Christian church forgave Paul.

Leader: They saw Paul through God's eyes. They understood that he had been redeemed.

People: They recognized him as a beloved brother in faith. They knew Saul no more.

Leader: They listened to Paul as he went out, not to kill, but to make disciples for Christ.

People: They hung on his words of wisdom as he wrote to churches all over the known world.

Leader: They welcomed him into their midst as a leader.

People: It wasn't just one heart that was changed on the road to Damascus, but many.

Leader: Paul became as beloved as he had once been reviled,

People: And was recognized as a great gift to the church.

Leader: And now, today, who do we know who has had a change of heart?

People: A well-known sinner, a prisoner, someone hated and distrusted by the world.

Leader: Can we take a step forward in faith about this person?

People: Can we give this person a second chance, just as God gives us a million chances?

Leader: Again and again, the stories of Scripture tell of imperfect people used for good by a perfect God.

People: Paul was one of those people.

Leader: If God can forgive, if God can renew the spirit of someone so lost, can we do less for one another?

People: Can we do less for ourselves? Every story is a Saul/Paul story in one way or another.

Leader: Christ never stops reaching out to us to turn away from our willfulness, from our sin.

People: May we too, be blinded by the light of God's love.

Leader: And may we see with new eyes, with new hearts.

People: And then may we bravely go out into the world to share the incredible news of our hope and new life we have in Christ our Lord.

All: Thanks be to God!

SERMON

The purpose of life is not to be happy.

The purpose of life is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, to have it make some difference that you have lived and lived well. -Ralph Waldo Emerson

The extended Easter season is a reminder that because of Christ Jesus' resurrection, we are transformed by forgiveness and grace and love. We are transformed. We are made new. Like Saul, when we encounter the Risen Christ, our lives will never be the same.

Today, I share with you some stories of transformation.

Bryan Jarrett is a man who is changing the world one child at a time. He grew up in a small farming community in the rural south. As a child, his father would disappear for days or weeks at a time. Then one day, his dad left and never returned. Without his father's protection, young Bryan was sexually assaulted by an extended family member. As a teenager, he relied on alcohol to numb the pain. All told, Bryan's life was defined by abuse, abandonment and addiction.

When he was in his late teens, he learned about Jesus and became a follower. The love he experienced through Jesus and his newly formed faith healed and transformed his life. As he became an adult and married, Bryan realized that his heart was full of love for those who are the forgotten, the overlooked and the hurting. He and his wife, Haley, founded Lonesome Dove Ranch.

Located in Royce City, Texas—a tiny rural village on the northern edge of the Dallas/Ft. Worth metroplex—Lonesome Dove Ranch encompasses 120 acres of working ranch land. It is here that children who have been abused and abandoned can attend camp at the ranch for a week of play (fishing, archery, bonfires), ranch work, therapy and even equine therapy. The horses on the ranch have also been rescued from horrific situations. Together, the horses and the children grow in trust and love.

Trained professionals and adult volunteers work with the children at a ratio of 3 adults for every one child. Bryan and Haley understand that a week on the ranch cannot erase a lifetime of trauma, but it is a start. A very good start.

Bryan Jarrett jumped into the deep end of his Christian faith to transform his own painful childhood into an opportunity to bring healing and hope to children in similar situations.

Here's another story of lives transformed. After the devastating earthquake in Haiti in 2010, chef Jose Andres knew he needed to do something to address the dire needs of the Haitian people. Working closely with his wife, Patricia, and his business partners Rob and Robin Wilder, Jose founded the nonprofit organization World Central Kitchen. World Central Kitchen began with a simple idea—wherever people are

hungry throughout the world, send in cooks. Not tomorrow. Send them today.

World Central Kitchen is often the very first to the frontlines of humanitarian, climate and community crises, providing both meals AND systems so that ultimately local folk can be part of the solution to hunger. Jose's organization does not just arrive with food. They stay and cook and serve meals for people in disaster zones the world over.

In early March following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, Jose Andres and World Central Kitchen arrived on the frontlines of the conflict—one day after hostilities began. I invite you to watch this video: https://twitter.com/i/status/1500223377860186118.

Like Saul who became known as Paul after his encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus, Bryan and Haley Jarrett and Jose and Patricia Andres have dedicated their lives to making a difference in the lives of others—one child at a time, one meal at a time, (and in Paul's case) one letter at a time.

And what about each of us? Of this I am convinced: when we encounter Jesus' love, Jesus' forgiveness, and Jesus' grace, our lives are never going to be the same again. We are set on fire to share that love, forgiveness and grace with others. As Jose Andres once wrote, "Many complex problems have simple solutions. Sometimes you just need to decide to do something. Sometimes you just have to show up with a sandwich or some warm rice and beans. You'd be amazed at the power of a plate of food. It can change the world, and so can you."

I'll ask again. What about us? What about you? Now that you have experienced Jesus' love, how will you share that love and that hope with others? Perhaps you will volunteer at the school or teach Sunday School. Perhaps you will volunteer at the Blessing Pantry. Perhaps you will write and send letters or cards of encouragement. Perhaps you will cook a meal for a lonely neighbor. Perhaps you will lengthen your prayer list—offering to God the many burdens in our world.

Transformation happens one sandwich at a time. One child at a time. One letter at a time. One prayer at a time.


Today, I invite you to be bathed in the love of Jesus. You are loved. You are forgiven. You are precious. You are sent out to share his love with others. Amen.


