

¹⁶ The longer Paul waited in Athens for Silas and Timothy, the angrier he got—all those idols! The city was a junkyard of idols.

¹⁷⁻¹⁸ He discussed it with the Jews and other like-minded people at their meeting place. And every day he went out on the streets and talked with anyone who happened along. He got to know some of the Epicurean and Stoic intellectuals pretty well through these conversations. Some of them dismissed him with sarcasm: "What a moron!" But others, listening to him go on about Jesus and the resurrection, were intrigued: "That's a new slant on the gods. Tell us more."

¹⁹⁻²¹ These people got together and asked him to make a public presentation over at the Areopagus, where things were a little quieter. They said, "This is a new one on us. We've never heard anything quite like it. Where did you come up with this anyway? Explain it so we can understand." Downtown Athens was a great place for gossip. There were always people hanging around, natives and tourists alike, waiting for the latest tidbit on most anything.

²²⁻²³ So Paul took his stand in the open space at the Areopagus and laid it out for them. "It is plain to see that you Athenians take your religion seriously. When I arrived here the other day, I was fascinated with all the shrines I came across. And then I found one inscribed, to the god nobody knows. I'm here to introduce you to this God so you can worship intelligently, know who you're dealing with.

of sky and land, doesn't live in custom-made shrines or need the human race to run errands for him, as if he couldn't take care of himself. He makes the creatures; the creatures don't make him. Starting from scratch, he made the entire human race and made the earth hospitable, with plenty of time and space for living so we could seek after God, and not just grope around in the dark but actually find him. He doesn't play hideand-seek with us. He's not remote; he's near. We live and move in him, can't get away from him! One of your poets said it well: 'We're the Godcreated.' Well, if we are the God-created, it doesn't make a lot of sense to think we could hire a sculptor to chisel a god out of stone for us, does it?

30-31 "God overlooks it as long as you don't know any better—but that time is past. The unknown is now known, and he's calling for a radical life-change. He has set a day when the entire human race will be judged and everything set right. And he has already appointed the judge, confirming him before everyone by raising him from the dead."

³²⁻³⁴ At the phrase "raising him from the dead," the listeners split: Some laughed at him and walked off making jokes; others said, "Let's do this again. We want to hear more." But that was it for the day, and Paul left. There were still others, it turned out, who were convinced then and there, and stuck with Paul—among them Dionysius the Areopagite and a woman named Damaris.

We rarely hear this story read in worship. And yet, it is a really awesome story. Paul had gone to Athens, Greece, to await the arrival of Timothy and Silas. The waiting was driving the Jesus-believer Paul crazy. Everywhere he looked in Athens, the city was filled with Greek and Roman gods and goddess. The city was literally filled with idols and Paul was appalled. While he waited, he talked to Jews and intellectuals of the city, trying to figure out the best way to reach the people of Athens with the good news of the gospel.

Athens was a city of highly educated people whose worship practices focused on a wide variety of gods and goddesses. Paul was going to have to take special care to reach out to the Athenians, that they might hear and receive the good news of Jesus.

As Paul began to talk to more and more people, they began to ask him to make a public presentation—a sermon of sorts—so that more people could hear his message. The place where Paul chose to give his speech is significant: the Areopagus—a prominent rock outcropping northwest of the Acropolis in Athens reaching 377 feet into the sky. In fact, the rocky area had two names: one Greek and one Roman. The Greek name was Areopagus—named after the Greek god of war. The Roman name was Mars Hill—named after the Roman god of war. Centuries before Paul, the hill's location was used for the Roman Senate.

But perhaps, even more significantly, this place Paul chose to preach from had an altar that was entitled: To the God Nobody Knows.

Indeed, that was all the invitation Paul needed. Tying his sermon to that unknown God altar, Paul told the crowd gathered that they needn't worship gods and goddesses because that unknown God was known by Paul: God Almighty, Yahweh, Creator of the universe and Father to the Risen Christ. In his sermon, he told the Athens intellectuals that the Lord God does not need shrines and cannot be found in idols.

Paul's sermon included those incredible words of promise: that God is not some distant god—far away and removed from our daily lives. Not at all. God, the Lord God, is among us and in us and around us. There is nowhere we can go that God is not already there.

That was good news to the Athenians and it is good news for us today. We may look back at our lives and point to times when we walked

away from God or we think God walked away from us. But that is not God's nature. No matter which way we turn, no matter what path we choose, God is already there ready to walk alongside us.

There is a meme on Facebook that springboards off the classic footprints in the sand poem: the reminder that when we think Jesus has abandoned us, he is actually carrying us. The meme I saw recently says this: Jesus points to the single footprints to tell the man that is when he carried him. But then he added: see that long trail? That is when I dragged you kicking and screaming!

That is true. Sometimes Jesus calls us to places that are scary and uncomfortable. ALWAYS Jesus calls us to forgive even when we do not feel forgiving. ALWAYS Jesus calls us to serve him by serving others. Sometimes we serve Jesus willingly and sometimes we serve him kicking and screaming all the way.

According to Eugene Peterson's rendering of today's text, the Lord God calls each and every one of us to a radical life change. To completely turn around and follow God by following Jesus. To get to the root (the true meaning of "radical") of our lives and start over. To be radically rooted in the love and grace of God.

But Paul wasn't done with his sermon. He introduced the Athenians to the Lord God, but he had more to say. He now introduced them to Jesus: the judge of humankind whom God raised from the dead.

Mentioning Jesus was supposed to be the high point to Paul's sermon, but it was at this moment when he talked about God raising Jesus from the dead, that half the crowd walked away laughing. NO God, they said, is powerful enough to do that.

Others, however, were intrigued. They wanted to know more and so they stayed with Paul so he could continue to share with them the Easter good news.

Paul's sermon at Mars Hill in Athens was powerful, but it was also masterful. Paul had done his homework before he preached that day in 51 AD. He knew that the city of Athens had strict policies about starting new religions within the city walls. These policies included:

- 1. The speaker or sponsor must claim to represent the diety or god.
- 2. He must provide evidence that this deity is eager to reside in Athens AND

3. The deity's residing in Athens must bring goodwill to the people of Athens.

In his sermon that day, Paul addressed each of these points. He noted that he wasn't bringing a new god to the city, but he was giving a name to one already there. He demonstrated how the Lord God is everpresent with everyone and cannot be confined to a shrine or idol and that, through God's work in Jesus, all might experience new life.

Paul met the Athenians where they were, spoke their language and invited the listeners to follow the risen Christ.

Really, Pauls' sermon in 51 AD could be his sermon for us today. Our lives are surrounded by idols: the trimmings and trappings of our lives upon which we place so much money and energy and trust. We live in a culture that glorifies stuff and greed over faithfulness and humility. We need only to turn on our televisions to notice that the volume increases exponentially when commercials begin. We are as surrounded by stuff as Paul was surrounded by idols and shrines in ancient Athens.

Paul's sermon could be our sermon. When we begin a new life in Christ, when we follow Jesus all the way to the cross, the trimmings and trappings we've held onto have much less sway. We find ourselves becoming more generous. We want to share God's love with others. We want to help bring heaven on earth for everyone—not just a select few.

Following Jesus means setting aside competing loyalties and idols. It means worshiping God not just on Sundays, but through all that we do and say all week long. It means discovering that the God Nobody Knows is actually the Lord God of the universe who knows each and every one of us intimately and personally.

Now it is true: some people heard Paul preach at Mars Hill and walked away laughing. But some did not. One of the people who heard and believed was Dionysius: a prominent member of the Council of Athens. Legend tells us that Dionysius became the first bishop of Athens and ultimately died a martyr. Today there are ruins of the Church of St. Dionysius built in the 16th century in Athens.

And what about that other convert, Damaris? We know little about her, but that she was listed by Luke in this story in Acts, tells us she probably became a prominent Christian in Athens. Scholars have taken stabs of guesses about her life, but they are only that: guesses. But this we know: when Paul preached his sermon at Mars Hill, both men and women were present and both men and women began to follow Christ Jesus.

Dear Friends: Jesus is calling you to a radical life change—an Easter life—today and every day. This new life in Christ is yours for the taking AND yours for the sharing.


You've heard Paul's sermon. It is now up to you to choose: will you walk away laughing or will you follow Jesus? Amen.






