



### Nobody is a whole chain. Each one is a link. But take away one link and the chain is broken...Let's link up. -Chuck Swindoll

Christianity is a team sport. Seriously. Many of us like to think we can be Christian on our own, but I'm not at all convinced that is true. Christianity, following Jesus, is about living in community, worshiping in community, serving in community. Christianity, at its very best, struggles and rejoices and laughs and laments together. Together.

While Paul wrote the letter to the Christians in Philippi from prison, he used this letter, indeed all his letters, to stay connected to other believers. Paul's letters illuminate the struggles those young communities had in how to BE the Body of Christ in the midst of wildly divergent community members.

The church in Philippi was no exception. This particular community struggled with Table Fellowship—how people from very different faiths, socio-economic backgrounds and genders gathered around a common Communion table and meal table. In both Roman and Jewish cultures, people of different backgrounds did not mix. At all.

And yet, these Jesus People worshiped together, ate together, and lived together—breaking all of society's norms. I make this sound easy, but it was not. Bringing a wildly diverse mix of people together in the name of Jesus was difficult/dangerous and those early Christian communities struggled mightily.

But this is what was important about the believers in Philippi: they struggled **together**. They worked through their diverse backgrounds, politics, worldviews, as a community. From the very beginnings of Christianity, life in Christ was done together—never alone and solitary.

Today's scripture reading speaks to the struggle and the call to live and grow within community. Today's passage offers words of encouragement to a community who struggled (perhaps fought?) over Jesus' most basic message: that we are ALL welcomed and loved.

That "ALL" is important. For here is the deal—we can **believe** in Jesus at home alone. We can only **follow** Jesus together. Paul's letter uses language of inclusion and community. Did you catch all those

words? Consolation. Sharing. Compassion. Sympathy. Joy. Same mind/One mind. Love. Humility. The interests of others. There is not one word on this list we can accomplish on our own—each and every trait involves including others in our lives as we share ourselves fully in community.

So much for flying solo as Christians.

Leadership guru John C. Maxwell tells this amazing story of how communities can be transformed when we work together. On March 22, 2020, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine gave a stay-at-home order for our state. As you remember, so many people's jobs and livelihoods were affected by this order given to slow the march of Covid19.

One of the many people affected was Sam Yoder who owns Berlin Gardens, a manufacturer of patio furniture, fire pits and other outdoor items. When the shut-down order was given, he agonized about sending his employees home, but he was determined to continue to pay each employee for 40 hour weeks no matter the cost to his business.

Three days later, on March 25, Sam received a phone call from a business colleague out of Akron who owns TKM Printing Solutions—a company that prints, creates signs and does custom fabrication. Both of these men wanted to do something in the midst of the crisis. Knowing that millions of face shields were needed for medical workers, the owner of TKM Printing Solutions decided to shift his company's manufacturing. But he couldn't do it alone.

That's where Sam came in. That very afternoon, Sam, his management team and the staff from TKM drove to the parking lot of a nearby home improvement store to discuss their options. They learned that the need for face shields was greatest in Connecticut—which had requested 150,000 masks in less than a week.

The two companies put their heads together and came up with a solution. In Sam's case, he and his team shifted from manufacturing outdoor furniture to manufacturing face shields. They quickly set up a production line, made 40 masks, sending them to Connecticut to make certain they met medical standards.

The masks passed inspection, so Sam called back all of his employees. They didn't quite make the 150,000 goal in the first few days,

but they did manage to produce 90,000 face shields, shipping them off to Yale's New Haven Hospital.

Then they kept on working. Soon they were able to produce between 30,000-35,000 shields per day, along with boxing them and preparing them for shipping. And this is where the transformation took place. Until Covid, Sam's employees were scattered across seven facilities. Now, with everyone on face shield duty, for the first time they were all working together, forging deep connections and friendships, all the while making a real difference in those early days of the pandemic.

When we come together, the world changes. Again—Christianity is a team sport—we are at our best when we work together, worship together, learn together while making a difference in the wider community.

New Bremen and St. Paul Church did exactly this in the early months of the pandemic. We expanded our Blessing Pantry to include large quantities of food. We were open 11 shifts per week, staffed entirely by volunteers. And what is so incredibly cool is that the volunteers were not just St. Paul folk. They were people from the community and the area churches who wanted to be part of the solution in the midst of hunger, loss of employment and despair.

Our Christian faith is one that describes life on earth as almost-notyet. We have foretastes of heaven in this life we have been given. Jesus' many parables speak of the Kingdom being among us in small ways that blossom and grow and break all boundaries. Even our Lord's Prayer: Thy Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven.

As members of Jesus' team, Christians are challenged to dedicate our lives to working to bring God's Kingdom here on earth—especially for those who have known very little heaven in their lives.

Catholic theologian Richard Rohr once wrote, You do not think yourself into a new way of living as much as you live yourself into a new way of thinking.

Thinking and planning alone will not transform lives. Action does. And lives are most transformed when we come together to be the Body of Christ in this community, nation and world. Looking back to today's reading, when we do this together, our joy will be complete.

Time to scatter some joy. Together. Amen.


