

CARING CONVERSATIONS

 is this a message about God's kingdom?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 4:26-34.

With Jesus' depiction of the kingdom of God, one would expect comparisons to something like spectacular cedar trees of Lebanon (Ezekiel 17:22 and Psalm 92:12) or some other vision of grandeur. Jesus chooses something more akin to a weed, a mustard bush that is prolific in Judea. It's an example that likely made his hearers chuckle, not gasp with indescribable awe; it's another example of getting people to see differently. Just as relentless as mustard bushes or weeds are, God's reign will not be deterred. It is like the seed planted that grows and grows without human intervention. As the Gospel of Mark gets underway, the message is that the kingdom is coming. The kingdom is viewed through surprising, even humorous comparisons. It will not be stopped, not by evil, not by scribes, not by disciples who fail again and again. Evil will be overcome, voices of the kingdom will be heard, and imperfect followers will keep pointing to Christ's victory over sin and death. How do you help others see the kingdom of God more clearly?

Pray: Almighty God, help us to see and believe with the eyes of faith that your reign will win the day through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The smallest of seeds planted can become the largest of plants. Likewise, the smallest acts of kindness can grow to make a very large difference in someone's life. Think of someone who is not so visible or lonely and reach out to them. In what way does reaching out to them grow the kingdom of God?


RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

TIME FOR THE CHILD WITHIN US: Parables of Jesus

Today, we will read about planting seeds-such as a mustard seed. Have you ever seen a mustard seed? I have a picture. Jesus described the Kingdom of God using mustard seeds as an example. Jesus said "It is the smallest of seeds, but it becomes the largest of all the plants in the garden." When Jesus taught his followers about the Kingdom of God, He said it had a small beginning. How many disciples did Jesus start with? Twelve! Jesus began his ministry on earth with a very small group of followers, but as they told others about him, the Kingdom grew and grew until it covered the whole earth. You might think you are too small to be an important part of the Kingdom of God, but when we tell others about Jesus, we help the Kingdom of God to grow and spread over the entire earth.

Let us pray: Father, we sometimes think we are too small to be important in the Kingdom of God. Help us to remember the parables we will learn today. If we tell others about what Jesus has done for us, we can be a part of the growing Kingdom. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Mark 4:21-29, 33-34 (NRSV)

Jesus said to them, "Is a lamp brought in to be put under the bushel basket, or under the bed, and not on the lampstand? ²² For there is nothing hidden, except to be disclosed; nor is anything secret, except to come to light. ²³ Let anyone with ears to hear listen!" ²⁴ And he said to them, "Pay attention to what you hear; the measure you give will be the measure you get, and still more will be given you. ²⁵ For to those who have, more will be given; and from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away."

²⁶ He also said, "The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷ and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸ The earth

produces itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹ But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come."

³³ With many such parables he spoke the word to them as they were able to hear it; ³⁴ he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

It began by looking like a typical day in the Antwerp, Belgium train station. Lots of people were milling around, talking to friends, waiting for trains, rushing from one stop to another. The wide open main floor, surrounded by stone staircases looked like a bustling place.

Then, the mood in the train station shifted. Over the PA system a song from the musical Grease. As the people in the train station began to perk up to the music, a few people ran out into the middle of the open floor and began to dance to the music. Within seconds there were six people dancing. Twelve. Twenty-four—all dancing with clearly rehearsed moves.

As the song progressed, so did the dancing. Children began pouring down one of the staircases to join the dance. The music shifted to a funkier beat. The crowd on the floor continued to grow and continued to dance in step with one another—filling the onlookers with awe and joy.

By the time the song ended, there were hundreds of people on the floor dancing in rhythm and harmony to a song beloved by people the world over. And then it was over. Dancers picked up their dropped bags and jackets and walked away—as if this indeed were a typical day in an Antwerp train station.

Watching the YouTube clip, I was struck by how this carefully-orchestrated-to-not-look-orchestrated dance in a commuter rail station is much like Jesus' parables. For indeed, the Greek form of the word "parable" means to cast aside—as if this seemingly spontaneous dance/as if the stories Jesus tells were no big deal, but WE know there is more there than meets the eye.

Jesus' parables were intended to jar the listeners out of complacency—something we often forget after a lifetime of hearing these stories in Sunday School and in worship. And, like the dancers in Belgium, despite all the conclusions we might try to make about a parable, the parable—and the dance—is its own unique work of art—complete and whole unto itself.

So let's look at today's parables. In the first story, Jesus reminds his listeners that lamps are meant to illuminate truth—and cannot/should not be hidden. In the second parable we learn of seeds that are scattered and, without no help from the farmer, grow and grow until the time of abundant harvest.

Over and over and over again, Jesus used parables to describe the Kingdom of Heaven. Today's stories are no exception. I am convinced that the Kingdom of Heaven breaks into community life when we are open to surprising and new ways of faithful living. When we welcome the stranger into our midst, when we care for the youth who seem to have lost their way, when we offer spiritual and physical shelter to those in need, the realm of God startles us as much as music in a train station or seeds that blossom and grow even when ignored.

Pastor and theologian Richard John Neuhaus elaborates on life in community by saying that, "Real community is not homogeneity. It is the discipline and devotion of disparate people bearing with one another—the hard tasks of love."

The kingdom of God does not ask us all to look alike, act alike, think alike, vote alike. Instead, life in community is about honoring our diversity and STILL finding ways to dance and sing in praise of our God who loves us and calls us to lives of loving service.

As we dance this dance together, we become ONE with the holy, ONE with the **other**, the stranger, the outcast, the lost and alone. Christ's dance is not a "dancing-with-the-stars-winner-take-all" sort of event. Instead, it **is** profoundly a community event—we move together, we move apart, and we dance to the music of Christ's song.

And what might that music be? The music that calls us to the dance floor, the music that transforms our diversity and our differences to create a harmonic glorious whole, is the song of love.

When St. Paul United Church of Christ chooses to act in loving ways, we are much, much larger than the sum of our parts. Love brings us together AND pushes us to seek justice and mercy for others. Love shows us how to dance and then sings joyously that we might move to her rhythm. Love challenges us to move away from the sidelines and into life's holy dance.

Today's parables call us to be people of the harvest, to be people of love, to be people of a new and surprising dance that welcomes all to share in the abundance of God's harvest and love. When we wear our Christian faith less as a badge of honor and more as a mantle of servanthood, the tiny seeds of faith find a place in our hearts to take root and grow in astonishing ways. When we plant seeds of love at the start of the growing season, we can trust that God's grace will create a harvest beyond our wildest imaginations.

And isn't that what we can presume happened in Antwerp, Belgium? What started out small—just a few dancers snowballed into a glorious dance of joy filling the entire atrium of the train station. Once the music ended and those hundreds of people left the center of the train station to head to work, to head home, to go on their way—they were changed.

When we commit to planting the seeds of the realm of God, when we create space for the Holy to grow in our midst, when we work together to harvest the fruit of love and justice, we are changed.


So, my friends, let us go forth from this place as people of the parable—shaken and stirred and uprooted that we might hear Christ's call to dance in the train stations of life. Amen.


