DEVOTIONS



Read: Matthew 18:21-35.

Jesus presents a very unreal story to make a very real point. In Jesus' day, each talent was worth more than 15 years of work. Therefore, one slave owed over 150,000 years of income while the other owed one hundred days of wages (a denarius was one day's wage). The differences are extreme to make the point that God's forgiveness of us is wildly out-of-this-world and wonderful. It leads the follower of Jesus Christ to sing or pray Psalm 103 that begins, "Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name" (v. 1). A concrete way to praise God is to "forgive your brother or sister from your heart" (Matthew 18:35) and do so again and again and again (v. 22). Or, as Jesus suggests, do you want to consider the consequences of not showing a little forgiveness to others? That lack of forgiveness Jesus says, would destroy your life (vv. 34-35). How can you praise God today by forgiving someone who has offended or hurt you? How does this parable help bring joy to your soul?

Pray: Merciful God, give me faith to remember how kind and generous you are to me and to praise you by being kind and forgiving to others through Christ our Lord. Amen.

SERVICE



Genesis 50:15-21 is the story of Joseph forgiving his brothers for throwing him in a pit and selling him into slavery. Forgiving someone who has hurt you is not easy. Think of someone who needs your forgiveness. Pray for that person. Reflect on God's love and mercy shown through people like Joseph and write a note of forgiveness to that person.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Forgiveness is the theme this week in Bible readings, caring conversations, devotions, and service. Breaking a plate, saying something mean, and telling a lie are things we may not mean to do, but they happen. Think of a time when you needed to be forgiven. God forgives us again and again. Think about what this means to you. Pray the Lord's Prayer, pause as you pray, "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us", then finish the prayer.



PASTORAL PRAYER, SILENT PRAYER, AND THE LORD'S PRAYER

Most Gracious God, you have given us the gifts which we know through the moving strains of music, through a smile and a tear, a sigh and a shout, through laughter and weeping, a prayer, silence, the beauty of such a day and place...God, for these gifts and the meaning of them for each of us, know our gratitude and our expressions of praise.

We pray for the church—sometimes triumphant and present, while at other times, seeming to be failing and distant. Sometimes we are able to be together and other times we are the Body of Christ virtually from our kitchen tables. We confess that there are times when we are scattered and divided: torn and hurting, afraid and self-righteous. Sometimes we are truly serving, while at other times we demand and want only to be served. Sometimes we are filled with your Spirit, which enlivens, empowers, and transforms, while at other times we are only a skeleton that settles for what is—afraid and yes, lazy. Holy One, your Spirit catches us, fills us, and frees us. Help us to be your church, to appreciate the gifts which we are given and share them gratefully that there may be a stronger, serving, empowering and transforming body in the world: your church!

Bless, dear God, this particular congregation and the worldwide church of which we are part. We pray for unity among Christians. We pray for the healing of breaches. We pray for peace where misunderstanding, violence, and prejudice try to have the final word.

We pray for our nation, O God, divided and hurting in so many ways. Remind us again that our perceived enemies are your beloved children.

Open our eyes that we might see Christ Jesus walking among us as the beggar, the crying child, the lonely elder.

We pray for our world—this one in which we live: one in which there is abundance and yet scarcity, one in which there is food, yet hungry people, one in which there is healing, and yet virus, disease and addiction. We pray for the world which you so love that you sent us Jesus to trust and follow that there might be life and freedom forever.

Gentle God, you know the particular concerns that lie heaviest in our hearts and minds. Receive these, our silent prayers, as we offer them to you. SILENCE

God of Grace and God of Glory—we thank you for the gift of this moment to offer to you our thanks and praise. Be with us as we navigate the coming days as your beloved children.

All of this we pray in the name of Jesus who taught us to pray...Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.

NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Matthew 18:21-35 (NRSV)

Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if another member of the churc¹ sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" ²² Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

²³ "For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. ²⁴ When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; ²⁵ and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. ²⁶ So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' ²⁷ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. ²⁸ But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' ²⁹ Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have

patience with me, and I will pay you.' ³⁰ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. ³¹ When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. ³² Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. ³³ Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' ³⁴ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. ³⁵ So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

SERMON

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

If the scene didn't start with profanity, I would be showing it to you on our big screens. Created by actor, comedian, and writer Jason Sudeikis, Apple TV's <u>Ted Lasso</u>, has taken the world by storm. If you haven't seen it, it is the story of an American football coach hired by a British premier soccer (football) team as their coach. But here's the rub: the main character, Ted Lasso, knows nothing about British football. What's more, the team owner hired him as a revenge move. The owner, Rebecca Welton, got her ex-husband's football team as part of their divorce settlement. Rebecca's ex-husband loved that team above anything else. When Rebecca became the owner, she was determined to run the team into the ground—to destroy not only the team, but also her ex.

One of the ways she did this was to hire Ted Lasso, a bumbling coach with no soccer experience who had a perpetual optimism about life. Then, when Ted began coaching, Rebecca worked tirelessly behind the scenes to trip him up at every turn—particularly by setting him up for bad press reports.

But her plans for vengeance did not work out the way Rebecca had planned. Ted's coaching style was one of team building and positive reinforcement. The team THRIVED under Ted's leadership and began to win more and more games. Ted Lasso was beloved by his players and the fans.

Near the end of Ted's first season with AFC Richmond (Rebecca's team), Rebecca showed up in Ted's office—confessing all the terrible things she had done to set Ted up for failure. She told Ted that she didn't care who she used or who she hurt to exact her revenge on her exhusband.

Rebecca ended her confession by saying, "If you want to quit or call the press, I completely understand."

How did Ted Lasso react? He frowned momentarily, got up from his desk and stood in front of Rebecca. Then he said to her, "I forgive you."

I forgive you. How often do those words come out of our mouths?

My suspicion is that most of us would prefer to nurture our bitterness and hardened hearts than forgive someone who did us wrong. Most of us are soooo far away from Jesus' correction of Peter's math—instead of forgiving someone seven times, we are to forgive 77 times (or 70 x 7—depending on your translation.)

Jesus then launched into yet another parable—this time about a king who wished to settle his accounts. The king began by asking a person who owed him a large sum of money for his money back. When the man couldn't pay, the king ordered that the man and his entire household be sold into slavery. Frantic, the man begged for more time to pay his debt. The king relented and offered the man time and mercy.

You'd think the man in debt would have learned something from this, but he did not. He went to the people who owed him money demanding immediate payment. He allowed no room for mercy. When the king heard what was happening, he summoned that man, showing his anger and frustration that mercy had not been shown.

Mercy and forgiveness go hand-in-hand. We WANT to believe in God's mercy and forgiveness, but like the man with large debts to the king, we generally do a lousy job of offering forgiveness to others. Or, perhaps, we are willing to offer someone forgiveness a few times, but once we've been burned again and again, we don't even attempt 77 times.

Jesus' math of 77 or seventy times seven is biblical. In Genesis 4:15, we hear God declaring that anyone who kills Cain will receive a sevenfold vengeance. Jesus turns vengeance upside down and calls instead for sevenfold mercy and forgiveness. And let's be honest here. Jesus isn't asking us to count to 77 before we stop forgiving others. He is saying that forgiveness needs to happen generously and beyond calculation.

Jesus reminds us again and again and again that forgiveness is key to life in community. That forgiveness is key to life. It is the key to life itself.

We certainly know forgiveness is not always easy. In fact, it is one of the most difficult things we will do in this life we have been given. Yet, if we are committed to following Jesus, to being disciples of Christ, we must make forgiveness a way of life. Every time we forgive the unforgivable, we are choosing the path of love.

Brandon Hatmaker, pastor and author of <u>The Barefoot Church</u> writes this:

Can't decide if you should give? Choose love.

Can't seem to swallow your pride on a foolish matter? Choose love. Having a hard time forgiving someone? Choose love.

Would you rather keep your time for yourself than helping someone in need? Choose love.

What would Jesus really do? Choose love.

Rev. Hatmaker reminds us that following Jesus is about choosing the most loving option. Not just sometimes. But always.

Now hear me well. Forgiveness 77 times does NOT mean you need to put yourself in harm's way. Forgiveness is a gift not only to the person you forgive, but also a gift to yourself. Forgiveness thaws your frozen heart, but it does not require that you walk again and again into harmful relationships or situations. As Frederick Buechner wrote in his delightful book Wishful Thinking: A Seeker's ABC, To forgive somebody is to say

one way or another, "You have done something unspeakable, and by all rights I should call it quits between us. Both my pride and my principles demand no less. However, although I make no guarantees that I will forget what you've done, and though we may both carry the scars for life, I refuse to let it stand between us. I still want you for my friend."

Jesus calls us to forgive, but that doesn't mean we need to forget.

It should be instructive to know that "forgiveness" in Greek means "untying the knot." When we forgive others, when we forgive ourselves, we untie the knots that tangle us up and hold us hostage.

When Ted Lasso forgave Rebecca Welton, he untied knots of bitterness and revenge. That scene of confession and forgiveness ended with Ted reaching out his hand to shake Rebecca's. With tears in her eyes, Rebecca skipped Ted's hand and wrapped him in a hug. Forgiven, Rebecca responded with love.

Friends, you are loved. You are forgiven. You are a beloved child of God. This week, I challenge you to take that knowledge to show love and mercy in extravagant ways. Amen.

Leader: After supper on that same night, Jesus took the cup saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this as often as you drink it for the forgiveness of sins."

Leader: Take and drink.

Leader: Let us give thanks to God in union with each other, with Christians everywhere, and with the poor and suffering neighbor, in whom we daily meet the living Christ.
