DEVOTIONS



Read: Colossians 3:1-11.

This passage begins with baptismal imagery ("you have been raised with Christ") that had already been established in verse 2:12: "When you were buried with him in baptism, you were already raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead." It is important to see the baptismal life in chapter three not as a rejection of bodily, earthly things, but affirming the higher calling in this daily life. In baptism we put to death—repent of—the sin that dwells within and among us (vv. 5-9). We are freed from looking for personal glory (v. 3) to care for others in a way that sees all as united in Christ whether "Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free" (v. 11). What a gift of life: in baptism we are freed from focusing on ourselves—from looking for personal recognition in life—so that the whole body can be served with love. Our lives are hidden in Christ yet also visible as a people united in Christ. Therefore, your life is freed from sin so that you are able to serve others. In what ways do you feel freed in Christ to serve others?

Pray: Gracious Lord Jesus, thank you for freeing me from the need for personal recognition so that I can recognize the need of others. Amen.

SERVICE



In Luke 12:12-21 we find the parable of the rich fool. "Rich toward God" (v. 21) means we are to be generous with the treasures we have and not keep everything for ourselves. The theme of this reading is, "Don't be greedy, give to the needy!" Begin a tradition of giving up some of the money you might spend going out to eat or to a movie and save it to give to a charity at the end of the year.


RITUALS AND TRADITIONS





Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." ¹⁴ But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" ¹⁵ And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." ¹⁶ Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. ¹⁷ And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' ¹⁸ Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. ¹⁹ And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' ²⁰ But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' ²¹ So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."

Jesus Loves Me

Jesus loves me, this I know:
For his stories tell me so.
Parables to him belong
Turned upside down, he can't go wrong.
Yes, Jesus loves me. Yes, Jesus loves me.
Yes Jesus loves me: his stories tell me so.

This is a true story.

Once upon a time there was a church camp that ran well—very well—on a tight budget. The camp was only open in the summer time and was run entirely by volunteers—good church folk who would give of their time, talent, and dollars to organize, publicize, and run the camp—from cooks & counselors to life guards & grounds keepers. The camp was much loved because everyone felt a part of the camping community.

Now this camp had a fair amount of acreage, so volunteers would bring their lawn mowers in the back of pick-up trucks and trailers to cut the grass. After years of doing things this way, it was decided that funds should be raised to purchase a riding mower so volunteers would not need to lug their equipment to and fro each week.

The mower was purchased and the problems began as the people asked, "Where would the mower be stored?" A shed was built on the campgrounds to keep the mower and its accessories. A lock was purchased to keep burglars at bay. Then the people asked, "But how can we know our lawn mower is really secure?" So, they hired a caretaker—one who would keep track of both the lawn AND the lawn mower. Then the people said, "It would be so much easier (and safer) if the caretaker lived on-site." So, the people built a house—a wonderful brick ranch home in which a caretaker would live.

What began as a simple outreach project—a way for children to grow in God through church camp experiences—turned into a high-maintenance year-round financial burden for all involved. The joy had been drained. What began as a fairy tale "once upon a time" did not end with "happily ever after."

In today's gospel lesson Jesus tells a parable to the man in the crowd who wanted a share of the family inheritance. Jesus, refusing to get involved with the politics of greed, sidestepped the man's request and told his own story: a parable that gets to the heart of the matter: that *far too often*, we make the STUFF of our lives matter *far too much*. We stockpile our stuff; we hoard our stuff; and we build and rent storage units for our stuff—certain that our lives will be given greater value because of the stuff we surround ourselves with.

It might be easy to see Jesus' parable of the rich farmer as a metaphor for the uber-rich of our nation. But truly, this story is meant to hold up a mirror to our OWN lives—calling each of us to account within our culture of greed. Truly, life is not a contest to see who has the most toys at the end of the day. For most certainly, we in the United States have more toys (and electronics, and clothes, and food, and cars, and books, and stuff and stuff) than most of the rest of the world.

The mirror Jesus holds up to our lives is not meant to condemn us, but to teach us. Jesus takes a request spoken out of greed and turns it into a teachable moment—that by looking into Jesus' mirror, we might ALL be transformed.

If we read and spoke Greek, we would immediately catch the intentional play on words between "merry" and "fool." The rich man planned to rest upon his riches and be merry, but was merely a fool.

When the mirror is held up we, too, are forced to ask if our own greedfilled merriment has become folly. We must ask: what IS at the root of our foolishness? What was the source of the rich farmer's folly? Biblical scholars tell us that Jesus' rich man was foolish in layers upon layers.

First, the rich farmer in Jesus' parable was preoccupied with his possessions. When reading the parable carefully, you get no sense of family or friends in the man's life—only his stuff. What's more, there is no indication from the farmer that he needed anyone in his life—that by storing up his riches, he could take care of himself just fine, thank-you-very-much. It never even occurred to him to SHARE his abundant harvest with anyone besides himself. Pleasure: eating, drinking and being merry were his highest good.

But, the foolishness of the rich farmer also has theological implications. By claiming the harvest entirely as his own, the man failed to acknowledge the Creator and Source of all life. God—our loving Creator—was the source of the abundant harvest in the parable and is the source of our harvests today.

Digging even deeper, because there was no acknowledgement of God in the man's life, he did not fulfill Old Testament Law—a law requiring that he offer back to God a goodly portion of his harvest in thanksgiving and praise for life itself. Whether his harvest had been measly and pitiful or delightfully abundant, God is still God—the source of all life. Instead of

sharing his bounty with others, he stored it away—probably with heavy padlocks to keep the "those people" away from his goods.

When Jesus tells the parable, he shifts the focus of the man's inquiry about his inheritance. Life, says Jesus, isn't found in how much stuff we accumulate, but in how we choose to live. No matter the amount of our harvest, we ARE richly blessed indeed. We have food, clothing, shelter, support of a faith community, and privileges beyond the imagination of most.

What Jesus seems to be telling the man who wanted his brother's inheritance (and what Jesus seems to be telling each of us) is that we each need to choose whom we will serve: the frantic-paced, stuff-acquiring culture that blares its continual commercials into our senses OR God: who calls us to a life of service and love. Wealth is not about loads of grain in our storage barns, but in richness toward God. The wealth we choose, the life we lead, is a choice we are called to make each and every day of our lives.

Jesus' parable of the rich farmer pushes each of us to choose that which we serve, that which we worship. Will we be rich in the ways of the world or will we be rich in God's love?

When I was a child, I was an avid reader of Laura Ingalls Wilder's "Little House" books, set in the mid-to-late 1800's. In her first novel, <u>Little House in the Big Woods</u>, young Laura and her older sister Mary were sometimes allowed to walk down the road to the neighboring farm to visit a woman who did not have children of her own. Now Mary and Laura loved their visits with this woman—partially for the company and partially for the homemade cookie she handed each girl for their walk home.

Mary and Laura would always walk home slowly—nibbling their cookies, savoring the flavor. Resources were scarce enough in their own home, making cookies a rarity, so the sisters always rejoiced in this delicious blessing.

Laura and Mary would each carefully eat half of her own cookie—saving the other half for their baby sister, Carrie, who stayed home. Then, when they arrived at home, they gave Carrie the two halves of their cookies. Mary and Laura understood that meant that Carrie was getting a WHOLE cookie versus their HALF a cookie, but the sisters weren't too

worried. What mattered most is that this delicious gift was shared joyously and generously.




