#### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: Isaiah 58:9b-14

At the heart of this text is honoring God by taking delight in the Sabbath. The word *sabbath* in Hebrew simply means "to stop." To stop, to rest from work is a way to honor God and your neighbor. The Sabbath protects community as it protects the vulnerable, including children, slaves, and animals. In Luke 13, Jesus understands the Sabbath as protecting the needs of a woman so she may stand upright in her community. When we refrain from "getting ahead" seven days a week, we can care for the hungry, the afflicted, and won't need to speak evil of one another (vv. 9b-10). Then, the people of God will "get ahead" and have real needs satisfied, real bodies strengthened, and real thirst quenched (v. 11). In other words, by giving honor to God and justice to others, we will truly make progress in life by restoring relationships, not bank accounts or egos. At the end of your days, will you regret not working more? How is the Sabbath a delight for you?

*Pray:* Dear Lord, it is not easy to stop to honor you and care for others. Give me delight in your presence that I may honor the Sabbath as I desire to honor you. For the sake of Jesus, the Lord of the Sabbath, amen.

The Lord is abounding in steadfast love (Psalm 103:8b). This Psalm is one that gives praise for all God has done for us. God forgives, heals, rescues, and redeems us. Is there someone you know who needs to hear about God's redeeming love? What can you do for them or say to them to show God's love?

#### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**





# **NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: Matthew 13:1-23**

(NRSV)

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. <sup>2</sup> Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. <sup>3</sup> And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. <sup>4</sup> And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. <sup>5</sup> Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. <sup>6</sup> But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. <sup>7</sup> Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. <sup>8</sup> Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. <sup>9</sup> Let anyone with ears listen!"

10 Then the disciples came and asked him, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" <sup>11</sup> He answered, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it has not been given. <sup>12</sup> For to those who have, more will be given, and they will have an abundance; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. <sup>13</sup> The reason I speak to them in parables is that 'seeing they do not perceive, and hearing they do not listen, nor do they understand.' <sup>14</sup> With them indeed is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah that says:

'You will indeed listen, but never understand, and you will indeed look, but never perceive.

15 For this people's heart has grown dull, and their ears are hard of hearing, and they have shut their eyes; so that they might not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears, and understand with their heart and turn—and I would heal them.'

<sup>16</sup> But blessed are your eyes, for they see, and your ears, for they hear. <sup>17</sup> Truly I tell you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see, but did not see it, and to hear what you hear, but did not hear it.

<sup>18</sup> "Hear then the parable of the sower. <sup>19</sup> When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. <sup>20</sup> As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; <sup>21</sup> yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. <sup>22</sup> As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. <sup>23</sup> But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

**SERMON** 

Rev. Becky Erb Strang

Vegetable gardening is part of my DNA. When I was a child, my father labored for hours every evening to turn the hard Texas clay into workable soil for tomatoes, corn (popcorn, actually), onions, zucchini,

cucumbers, broccoli, cantaloupe and watermelon. Many years, he would give me a corner of the garden to grow my own produce.

When Jim and I married and moved to Texas, our backyard was far too tiny and far too hot for a garden. So, I was delighted to move into our first house in Kettering—with a yard that was so filled with trees and bushes that we spent an enormous amount of time landscaping the yard to make it play-worthy for kids.

But before we even unfinished packing the boxes in the house, I had taken my shovel to the back corner of the yard to put in a vegetable garden. With memories of working alongside my father firmly in mind, I planted tomatoes, squash, peppers, cucumbers, zucchini, pumpkin, carrots, corn, beans and potatoes.

Truly, gardens are magical places. Our son Jimmy was in first grade at the time and I enlisted him to help me plant the seeds. Together we watered and weeded. And magically and mysteriously, up popped our plants. We were thrilled. Within a month, the garden was thriving.

Then the squirrels arrived. One by one, they systematically chomped off each and every corn plant at its base. A week later, I found chipmunk holes near my potato plants. A snail ate a huge hole through the only decent sized bell pepper. And, for some reason, my squash, zucchini and cucumbers were lush and flower-filled, but my only produce was one scrawny cucumber. If you could ignore the critters and lack of crops, my garden was beautiful.

Gardening is a true act of faith. You can plant the seeds, take care of the soil, chase away the critters, but beyond that you cannot MAKE a squash plant produce. It either will or it won't—and usually in the end, the harvest is much greater than expected.

Much of what we do as a congregation is like gardening. We plant seeds of faith, we plant seeds of love, we plant seeds of hope, but we cannot control the outcome.

And what about each of us? What seeds of faith have you planted this past week? Have you taken the time for Bible study? For Prayer? To reach out to someone in need? To give of your time and your treasure?

The seeds of love are planted every time we put away our hardened hearts, every time we reach out to a person who is different from us, every time we forgive and let go of our grudges. Seeds of love are not seeds of emotion, but of action. Love is a verb—it is something we do. Love moves us beyond ourselves that we might share of ourselves fully with others.

What seeds of love have you planted this past week? Have you forgiven a past injury? Have you hugged your loved ones and told them you love them? Have you been kind to your cranky neighbor?

The seeds of hope, of love are planted every time we help make life better for others. We do this by paying attention to the children and youth in our neighborhood. By donating time, toiletries and food or money to our Blessing Pantry. By writing a letter (yes! An actual letter!) to a longlost friend. By forgiving and loving and serving and caring.

I once read a terrific article in the Christian Century about seeds of hope. A husband and wife team, Sally and Peter Cunningham from Australia moved to Niger in Africa where they work with a project they have named "Sowing Seeds of Change." Teaching local farmers to plant nitrogen rich acacia trees around the perimeter of fields has enriched the soil. They also teach farming methods that emphasize biodiversity—a mixture of crops with acacia trees planted between sections.

What is wonderful about this program is that it is working. The farmers plant acacia trees along with a mix of sorghum, millet, cowpeas, peanuts, and sesame—along with a variety of fruit trees. The village of Magajin Kware has seen a 200 % increase in crop income and an overall increase in farm income of 502% compared to neighboring farms. Now how is that for hope???

Today's scripture lesson has Jesus telling a similar story of sowing seeds. Yet in his parable, many of the plants are choked out and die quickly. The weeds and thorns are abundant. Yet, the harvest from that which did take root was one hundred-fold.

This would have been surprising good news for the hearers of the parable. In Jesus' day a good harvest would be 4-10 fold of what was planted. A spectacular harvest would be perhaps 15 fold. Yet, Jesus tells a story of seeds planted, many not even making it to the harvest, and yet the harvest is still abundant beyond our imaginations.

When we reflect upon our own journey of faith, our stories are much the same. Seeds of faith, of love, of hope have been planted within. Yet, the weeds and thorns and critters of apathy, distrust, anger, disappointment, and betrayal have often threatened to destroy our garden of faith. Still, the harvest we reap of love, of hope, faith and of joy is often 100 times more than we expected in our wildest dreams.

Now hear me well. God does **not** send weeds and thorns and sickness and betrayal our way as a test of faith. Those things happen—just as easily as the squirrels ate away the tender shoots of corn in my garden. God does not wish hardship and pain upon us. But we all know there are times in our lives when our hearts are hardened, when we are angry, when we are sick, and it seems nearly impossible to open ourselves to God's grace.

Too often this parable has been preached that if WE work hard enough, we will become good and fertile soil for the seeds God plants. My friends, it is not what WE do that brings about the final harvest. We are already good soil—we are God's precious children. The good news is that even when God's seeds land on the thorny and dry and angry and hurt parts of ourselves, God's grace still abounds. When we open ourselves up to God's word, we begin to find joy in what had been difficulties, weedy, and thorny times.

We do not control the harvest—God does. If it were in our control, we would be unable to think beyond the expected 10-fold harvest of joy. But the good news is that God dreams bigger than our wildest dreams. God loves more fiercely than our most passionate love. God rejoices more joyously than our greatest happiness. With God in charge of the harvest, how can the harvest be anything but abundant?

My friends, God is sowing seeds among us. God is sowing seeds in our congregation, in our community, and in you and in me and in each person we encounter along life's way. Let us open ourselves to one another and to God that we might see God's grace taking root and growing in ourselves and others.

God is sowing seeds in us and we are good, good soil.




