
### SERVICE OF CONFESSION


At this time, I invite our children to receive their Bibles. (Pause)

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Genesis 6:5-22 (NRSV)

The Lord saw that the wickedness of humans was great in the earth and that every inclination of the thoughts of their hearts was only evil continually. <sup>6</sup> And the Lord was sorry that he had made humans on the earth, and it grieved him to his heart. <sup>7</sup> So the Lord said, "I will blot out from the earth the humans I have created—people together with animals and creeping things and birds of the air—for I am sorry that I have made them." <sup>8</sup> But Noah found favor in the sight of the Lord.

These are the descendants of Noah. Noah was a righteous man, blameless in his generation; Noah walked with God. <sup>10</sup> And Noah had three sons: Shem, Ham, and Japheth.

<sup>11</sup> Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight, and the earth was filled with violence. <sup>12</sup> And God saw that the earth was corrupt, for all flesh had corrupted its ways upon the earth. <sup>13</sup> And God said to Noah, "I have determined to make an end of all flesh, for the earth is filled with violence because of them; now I am going to destroy them along with the earth. <sup>14</sup> Make yourself an ark of cypress wood; make rooms in the ark, and cover it inside and out with pitch. <sup>15</sup> This is how you are to make it: the length of the ark three hundred cubits, its width fifty cubits, and its height thirty cubits. <sup>16</sup> Make a roof for the ark, and finish it to a cubit above, and put the door of the ark in its side; make it with lower, second, and third decks. <sup>17</sup> For my part, I am going to bring a flood of waters on the earth, to destroy from under heaven all flesh in which is the breath of life; everything that is on the earth shall die. <sup>18</sup> But I will establish my covenant with you, and you shall come into the ark, you, your sons, your wife, and your sons' wives with you. <sup>19</sup> And of every living thing, of all flesh, you shall bring two of every kind into the ark, to keep them alive with you; they shall be male and female.<sup>20</sup> Of the birds according to their kinds and of the animals according to their kinds, of every creeping thing of the ground according to its kind, two of every kind shall come in to you, to keep them alive. <sup>21</sup> Also take with you every kind of food that is eaten, and store it up, and it shall serve as food for you and for them." <sup>22</sup> Noah did this; he did all that God commanded him.

OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Genesis 8:6-12

(NRSV)

At the end of forty days Noah opened the window of the ark that he had made <sup>7</sup> and sent out the raven, and it went to and fro until the waters were dried up from the earth. <sup>8</sup> Then he sent out the dove from him to see if the waters had subsided from the face of the ground, <sup>9</sup> but the dove found no place to set its foot, and it returned to him to the ark, for the waters were still on the face of the whole earth. So he put out his hand and took it and brought it into the ark with him. <sup>10</sup> He waited another seven days, and again he sent out the dove from the ark, <sup>11</sup> and the dove came back to him in the evening, and there in its beak was a freshly plucked olive leaf; so Noah knew that the waters had subsided from the dove, and it did not return to him any more.

SERMON

On Kick-Off Sunday, as we begin a new narrative lectionary year, today's readings are most appropriate. In them, we hear first of God's displeasure with humanity and his sacred call to Noah to save a remnant of creation. Our second reading comes at the end of the rains—before Noah, his family, and the animals have left the ark and before God promises never to flood the earth again. What most of us remember from Sunday School is that God's promise is accompanied by the rainbow—a sign and symbol of promises kept for all eternity.

The story of Noah's Ark is one of the longest stories in Genesis and for good reason. While far too often sermons are preached about how, if we do not toe the line, God's judgement will come upon us, that is far from the original intent of this story. The story of the flood, of God's judgement, and God's promise is a once-in-forever event. The rainbow in the sky is the promise that God will never ever destroy the earth again in anger. That we, as children of God, find our days shaped not by a judgmental angry God, but by a God who promises care and compassion for all eternity.

On Kick-Off Sunday, we seek **not** a god of anger and vengeance, but instead we celebrate God's mercy and grace. We are promised that once we leave the ark, our lives can start anew. We are given a fresh start. That fresh start is for us as individuals AND for this beloved Body of Christ.

The Good News is this: God is with us. God never leaves us. We are created to be in covenant with God always and forever. And that includes our life here at St. Paul. God has been calling us, beckoning us, challenging us to follow his path here in New Bremen and the surrounding communities for nearly two centuries. The rainbow serves as the promise of God's presence in our communal life as a congregation, in our collective lives as Christians throughout the world, and in our own individual lives.

What the flood story teaches us is that God is willing to stay with we imperfect humans and imperfect creation: no matter what. That God will no longer wipe out creation because of our wandering and broken ways.

Yet, even here we have to be careful. God, by vowing never again to destroy the world, changes how God will respond to human sin (and human evil). This is where we need to be careful when moving this story and our theology forward. The story of Noah's Ark tells us that God will engage evil in our world in new ways. Over and over again in our Old and New Testaments, we hear that God meets us and comes to us—God's flawed human children—by way of suffering, not vengeance. In Christian terms, we believe that God knows and experiences our suffering because of his suffering through Christ Jesus. That God redeems our suffering with the death and resurrection of Jesus.

In the midst of the deepest darkest evils on this planet, God comes to us as a suffering servant. In the midst of the most horrific of situations or diagnoses, God suffers with us. What's more, when it comes to engaging our enemies, God reminds us over and over again to love them and to pray for them that their own lives might be transformed. On this anniversary of 9/11, this is particularly poignant reminder.

In the past few years, on a global scale, we have known pandemic, death, and suffering. Horrific atrocities are begin committed in the name of peace and justice. Our world is both flooding AND dying of drought. Christian nationalism is on the rise as we demonize the "other." Suicides and hopelessness are rampant. But, we must not throw up our hands in despair, hoping and wishing God would wipe out the world again with a flood. Not at all.

As followers of Jesus, we are challenged by God to commit the rest of this one precious life we have been granted (with a nod to poet Mary Oliver), by partnering with God to usher in life where there is death, to show love where there is hatred, to offer acceptance where there is prejudice, and to bring peace where there is violence. As individuals, we most likely will not be able to make big changes in the world around us, but together as the Body of Christ in this community, we can work to transform lives that all might experience God's promises and grace and mercy.







